POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL WEEK 3 NOTEBOOK

THIS SATURDAY: The entire Week 3 schedule for both the MAC and Conference USA will be contested Saturday. In the MAC, coming off two victories over Power Five schools, conference play begins with Ball State (1-1) visiting Eastern Michigan (1-1) in a West Division matchup. Toledo (1-0), which is receiving votes in both the *Associated Press* Top 25 and the *USA Today* Coaches' Top 25 polls after an upset of Arkansas, hosts Big XII foe Iowa State. Northern Illinois (2-0) travels to Columbus to take on No. 1-ranked and defending CFP national champ Ohio State. In C-USA, two conference games are on the docket as Rice (1-1) visits North Texas (0-1) in a West Division battle while Charlotte (2-0) plays its' inaugural conference game at Middle Tennessee (1-1) in an East Division tilt. WKU (2-0), receiving votes in both the *AP* and *USA Today* polls, looks to stay perfect with a visit to Indiana. In the only C-USA game against a ranked opponent, UTSA (0-2) plays at No. 25 Oklahoma State.

BIG DAY FOR MACTION: The MAC had a big Saturday with a pair of victories over Power Five conferences. Toledo upset the SEC's No. 18 Arkansas 16-12 on the road and Bowling Green beat Big Ten foe Maryland 48-27. The Toledo victory was the MAC's first victory over the SEC since 2004, and it was the Rockets' first victory over a ranked team since 2012. The Rockets held Arkansas to just 103 yards rushing and only three points in four visits in the red zone in the second half. Bowling Green extended the MAC's streak of seasons with at least one victory over the Big Ten to 10 consecutive by beating the Terps behind 42 second-half points.

WKU TOPS TECH: In a battle of teams picked to win their C-USA divisions, WKU held off Louisiana Tech 41-38, and the Hilltoppers moved to 2-0 for the first time since 2005. WKU senior QB **Brandon Doughty** threw for 441 yards and a touchdown in the victory. Doughty has now thrown a TD pass in 16 straight games, tying TCU's **Trevone Boykin** for the longest current streak in FBS.

KICKING INTO HISTORY: Kent State kicker **April Goss** became the second female ever to score in a FBS game during a 45-13 victory over Delaware State with a second-quarter PAT kick.

POLLING PLACE: Toledo and WKU received votes in both the *Associated Press* Top 25 and the *USA Today* Coaches' Top 25 polls this week.

C-USA vs. MAC: Ohio helped the MAC even its' record against Conference USA to 1-1 this season with a 21-10 "Battle for the Bell" victory over Marshall. This Saturday, there is one C-USA vs. MAC game on the schedule as Buffalo (1-0) visits Florida Atlantic (0-2).

WEEK 2 INDIVIDUAL HONORS

QB Brandon Doughty, WKU: The senior completed 28 of 38 passes for 441 yards and a TD in a 41-38 victory over Louisiana Tech for C-USA Offensive Player of the Week honors.

S Marcus Ward, WKU: The junior had a career-high 11 tackles (six solo), two tackles for loss, two pass breakups and a forced fumble in a 41-38 victory over Louisiana Tech for C-USA Defensive Player of the Week honors.

KR/PR Kylan Towner, WKU: The sophomore returned a kickoff 98 yards for a touchdown in a 41-38 victory over Louisiana Tech for C-USA Special Teams Player of the Week recognition.

QB Matt Johnson, Bowling Green: The senior threw for a career-high 491 yards and six TDs in a 48-27 victory at Maryland for MAC East Division Offensive Player of the Week honors.

S Nathan Carpenter, Ohio: The senior had four total tackles, a fumble recovery and an interception in a 21-10 victory over Marshall for MAC East Division Defensive Player of the Week honors.

P Joseph Davidson, Bowling Green: The sophomore averaged 50 yards on three punts, including a 56-yarder in a 48-27 victory at Maryland for MAC East Division Special Teams Player of the Week recognition.

QB Phillip Ely, Toledo: The senior completed 21 of 38 passes for 237 yards and one TD in a 16-12 victory over No. 18 Arkansas for MAC West Division Offensive Player of the Week honors.

DB Cheatham Norrils, Toledo: The senior had eight tackles and three pass breakups, including two in the final two minutes, in a 16-12 victory over No. 18 Arkansas for MAC West Division Defensive Player of the Week honors.

K Brendan Renius, Eastern Michigan: The junior had eight kickoff touchbacks in a 48-29 victory at Wyoming for MAC West Division Special Teams Player of the Week recognition.

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Each week in 2015, the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl will spotlight an alumni player from each of our partner conferences, Conference USA and the MAC.

RANDY MOSS (MARSHALL)



Former NFL wide receiver and current Fox Sports analyst **Randy Moss** was a two-time consensus All-American during his college career at Marshall from 1996-97.

Moss set several NCAA records as a redshirt freshman during Marshall's 1996 I-AA undefeated championship season. He caught 78 passes for 1,709 yards and 28 touchdowns.

In his sophomore season of 1997, he caught 96 passes for 1,820 yards and 26 touchdowns as Marshall moved up to I-A and won the MAC title. Moss finished fourth in voting for the Heisman Trophy and was the Fred Biletnikoff Award winner as the nation's top receiver.

Moss finished his two-year college career with 168 receptions for 3,467 yards and 53 TDs.

Moss was drafted in the first round of the 1998 NFL Draft by the Minnesota Vikings, and he immediately became one of the most prolific receivers in the NFL.

A six-time Pro Bowler and a four-time All-Pro, Moss set the NFL's single-season touchdown reception record with 23 in 2007 and is second all-time in career TD catches with 156.

He led the NFL in receiving TDs in 1998, 2000, 2003, 2007 and tied for the lead in 2009. He led the NFC in receiving yards in 1999 (1,413) and 2002 (1,347). Moss also led the NFC in receptions in 2002.

Moss played 14 NFL seasons with the Vikings, Oakland Raiders, New England Patriots, Tennessee Titans and the San Francisco 49ers.

He was voted to the 2000s NFL Team of the Decade by the Pro Football Hall of Fame's Selection Committee.

POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL PARTICIPANT SELECTION

The highest-ranked conference champion by the College Football Playoff Selection Committee from the American Athletic, Conference USA, Mid-American, Mountain West or Sun Belt will play annually in one of the College Football Playoff bowls (**VIZIO Fiesta** and **Chick-fil-A Peach** bowls for the 2015 season) if it is not selected for the Playoff Semifinals.

C-USA has 2015 tie-ins with the **Popeyes Bahamas, Arizona, Gildan New Mexico, Miami Beach, R&L Carriers New Orleans, St. Petersburg** and **Zaxby's Heart of Dallas** bowls, with a secondary tie-in with the **Camping World Independence Bowl** (if either the ACC or the SEC does not have enough eligible teams). There is no set selection order among C-USA's bowl partners

The **GoDaddy Bowl** has first choice of a MAC bowl-eligible team, and the remainder of the selections will follow, with no set selection order among the MAC's bowl partners. The MAC has 2015 tie-ins with **Popeyes Bahamas, Boca Raton, Famous Idaho Potato, GoDaddy** and **Raycom Media Camellia** bowls, with secondary tie-ins with the **San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl** (if Army is not bowl eligible), various ESPN owned-and-operated bowls and the **Quick Lane Bowl** (if either ACC or Big Ten does not have enough eligible teams).

The **2015 Popeyes Bahamas Bowl** participants will be announced **Sunday, December 6**.
