POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL WEEK 8 NOTEBOOK

THIS SATURDAY: The entire Week 8 schedule in both the MAC and Conference USA will be played on Saturday. The MAC has six league games, featuring undefeated and No. 19 Toledo (6-0, 3-0 MAC) at UMass (1-5, 0-2 MAC). East Division leader Bowling Green (5-2, 3-0 MAC) travels to a key division game at Kent State (3-4, 2-1 MAC). Western Michigan (3-3, 2-0 MAC) will try to keep pace with Toledo in the West Division race as the Broncos host Miami (1-6, 0-3 MAC). Ohio (5-2, 2-1 MAC), one game back in the East race, heads to Buffalo (2-4, 0-2 MAC). Northern Illinois (4-3, 2-1 MAC) hosts Eastern Michigan (1-6, 0-3 MAC) in a West Division battle, and Central Michigan (3-4, 2-1 MAC) is at Ball State (2-5, 1-2 MAC).

In C-USA, the West Division race is a three-way deadlock at 2-1, and two of the three teams involved play in conference action Saturday. Louisiana Tech (4-3, 2-1 C-USA) will host Middle Tennessee (3-4, 2-1 C-USA) and Southern Miss (4-3, 2-1 C-USA) is at Charlotte (2-4, 0-3 C-USA). The other team tied at the top of the West, Rice (3-3, 2-1 C-USA) hosts Army in a non-conference game. The East Division leader, WKU (6-1, 4-0 C-USA), plays out of conference at No. 5 LSU. Marshall (6-1, 3-0 C-USA) will try to tie the Hilltoppers atop the East as they host North Texas (0-6, 0-3 C-USA). The other two conference games have Old Dominion (3-3, 1-1 C-USA) at FIU (3-4, 1-2 C-USA) and Florida Atlantic (1-5, 1-2 C-USA) travels to UTEP (2-4, 0-2 C-USA).

POLLING PLACE: Toledo (6-0) moved up to No. 19 in the *Associated Press* Top 25 and the Rockets are No. 20 in the *Amway USA Today Coaches'* Top 25 poll. WKU (6-1) is receiving votes in both polls, while Marshall (6-1) and Bowling Green (5-2) are both receiving votes in the *USA Today* poll.

HERD ON THE MOVE: Marshall sophomore RB **Hyleck Foster**, a converted wide receiver, ran for 122 yards and a touchdown in Marshall's 33-17 win at Florida Atlantic. He is the third Thundering Herd running back to top 100 yards in a game this season, as senior **Devon Johnson** and sophomore **Tony Pittman** each have a pair of 100-yard outings. Rice is the only C-USA school to have more than three players reach the century mark in a game this season with four.

D-FENSE: A big reason for Toledo's success is that the Rockets rank second in FBS in red-zone defense (40%), as Toledo has allowed only six scores (2 TD/4 FG) on 15 opponent attempts. Toledo ranks seventh in the nation in scoring defense (13.2 ppg), and the Rockets are one of only two teams in the country to not allow a sack this season.

During the NFL’s 2015 Kickoff Weekend, both Conference USA and MAC were well-represented on rosters (active, practice squad or injured reserve) across the 32 teams. C-USA had **79 players** on NFL rosters (Louisiana Tech led with 11), while the MAC had **78 players** among the current 13 institutions (Toledo - 12).

WEEK 7 INDIVIDUAL HONORS

WR Zach Pascal, Old Dominion: The junior had 11 receptions for 231 yards and three touchdowns in a 37-34 win over Charlotte for C-USA Offensive Player of the Week honors.

LB TJ Ricks, Old Dominion: The junior had 18 tackles (two for loss), a sack, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery in a 37-34 win over Charlotte for C-USA Defensive Player of the Week honors.

K Stephen Brauchle, Southern Miss: The junior kicked four field goals and two PATs in a 32-10 win over UTSA for C-USA Special Teams Player of the Week honors.

QB Matt Johnson, Bowling Green: The senior completed 25 of 30 passes for 357 yards and five TDs in a 59-10 win over Akron for MAC East Division Offensive Player of the Week honors.

DB Nick Cuthbert, Kent State: The junior had an interception and made five tackles in a 15-10 victory at UMass for MAC East Division Defensive Player of the Week honors.

P Anthony Melchiori, Kent State: The senior put three punts inside the 10-yard line and five total inside the 20 in a 15-10 win at UMass for MAC East Division Special Teams Player of the Week honors.

RB Jamauri Bogan, Western Michigan: The redshirt freshman rushed for 135 yards and a TD in a 49-14 win at Ohio for MAC West Division Offensive Player of the Week honors.

LB Bobby Jones, Northern Illinois: The sophomore had 11 tackles (two for loss) and a sack in a 45-12 win at Miami for MAC West Division Defensive Player of the Week honors.

LB Ja’Wuan Woodley, Toledo: The sophomore blocked a field goal that was returned for a TD in a 62-20 win over Eastern Michigan for MAC West Division Special Teams Player of the Week honors.

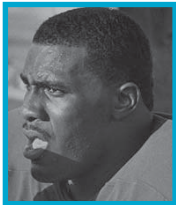

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Each week in 2015, the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl will spotlight an alumni player from each of our partner conferences, Conference USA and the MAC.

JOE GREENE (NORTH TEXAS)



Pro Football and College Football Hall of Famer **Joe Greene**, a 1968 consensus All-American, played his college career at North Texas from 1966-68.

Greene, whose iconic nickname of "Mean Joe" referenced the Mean Green nickname of the then-North Texas State, was part of a 23-5-1 record by the school in his three seasons as a defensive tackle.

In his 29 games at defensive tackle, North Texas held the opposition to 2,507 yards gained on 1,276 rushes, a per-carry average of less than two yards per attempt.

A consensus All-American in his senior season of 1968, Greene was selected No. 4 overall by the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 1969 NFL Draft.

Greene was the NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year in 1969, and was selected to the Pro Bowl that same season.

A dominant defensive tackle, Greene became the lynchpin of the Steelers' famed Steel Curtain defense during the 1970s.

He was the NFL Defensive Player of the Year in 1972 as the Steelers advanced to the AFC Championship Game. In 1974, he won the honor again as Pittsburgh won the first of four Super Bowls with Greene, beating Minnesota in Super Bowl IX. He was also part of the Steelers' title teams in Super Bowls X, XIII and XIV.

A five-time All-NFL performer and a 11-time All-Conference player, Greene was selected to 10 Pro Bowls.

The 13-year pro (1969-81), a 1970s NFL All-Decade Team and NFL 75th Anniversary Team selection, was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1984 and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1987.

POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL PARTICIPANT SELECTION

The highest-ranked conference champion by the College Football Playoff Selection Committee from the American Athletic, Conference USA, Mid-American, Mountain West or Sun Belt will play annually in one of the College Football Playoff bowls (**VIZIO Fiesta** and **Chick-fil-A Peach** bowls for the 2015 season) if it is not selected for the Playoff Semifinals.

C-USA has 2015 tie-ins with the **Popeyes Bahamas, Arizona, Gildan New Mexico, Miami Beach, R&L Carriers New Orleans, St. Petersburg** and **Zaxby's Heart of Dallas** bowls, with a secondary tie-in with the **Camping World Independence Bowl** (if either the ACC or the SEC does not have enough eligible teams). There is no set selection order among C-USA's bowl partners

The **GoDaddy Bowl** has first choice of a MAC bowl-eligible team, and the remainder of the selections will follow, with no set selection order among the MAC's bowl partners. The MAC has 2015 tie-ins with **Popeyes Bahamas, Famous Idaho Potato, GoDaddy, Marmot Boca Raton** and **Raycom Media Camellia** bowls, with secondary tie-ins with the **San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl** (if Army is not bowl eligible), various ESPN owned-and-operated bowls and the **Quick Lane Bowl** (if either ACC or Big Ten does not have enough eligible teams).

The **2015 Popeyes Bahamas Bowl** participants will be announced **Sunday, December 6**.
