POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL WEEK 4 NOTEBOOK

THIS WEEKEND: League play dominates Conference USA this Saturday with four games as UTSA travels to Old Dominion, North Texas takes on in-state rival Rice, Louisiana Tech visits Middle Tennessee in a game that should feature plenty of offense as both teams are No. 1 and 2 in C-USA in total yards per game, and Southern Miss goes to UTEP. The biggest non-conference game in C-USA is No. 3 Louisville (AP) at Marshall while WKU hosts a SEC team at home as Vanderbilt visits. In the MAC, Kent State visits No. 1 Alabama, undefeated Central Michigan is at Virginia and unbeaten Western Michigan hosts Georgia Southern. The American has No. 6 Houston hosting in-state foe Texas State and unbeaten USF hosts No. 13 (AP) Florida State. The AAC also has two games against the ACC as undefeated East Carolina goes to Virginia Tech and UConn hosts Syracuse.

WEEK 3 REVIEW: The American picked up three victories against Power 5 schools as Memphis beat Kansas (Big 12) 43-7, UConn beat Virginia (ACC) 13-10 on a late field goal and USF pummeled Syracuse (ACC) 45-20. In AAC conference action, Houston rallied in the fourth quarter to beat Cincinnati 40-16 and Navy beat Tulane 21-14. The MAC picked up another victory over the Big Ten as Western Michigan won at Illinois 34-10. The Broncos are the fourth MAC program in league history to win two games against the Big Ten in the same season. Akron beat Marshall 65-38 and Eastern Michigan defeated Charlotte 37-19 for victories over Conference USA schools. In C-USA, previous Popeyes Bahamas Bowl participants WKU (31-24 over Miami) and Middle Tennessee (41-21 over Bowling Green) each won games over the MAC.

POLLING PLACE: Houston (AAC) is No. 6 in the Associated Press and No. 7 in the Amway Coaches' Poll after Week 3. Those receiving votes in the AP poll (in order of votes received) are Central Michigan (MAC), South Florida (AAC), Toledo (MAC) and Western MIchigan (MAC). Those receiving votes in the Coaches' Poll (in order of votes received) are South Florida, Western Michigan, Navy (AAC), Toledo. Central Michigan, Memphis (AAC), WKU (C-USA).

AMERICAN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE Offensive Player of the Week

Houston QB **Greg Ward Jr.**: The senior threw for 326 yards and a TD and rushed for two other scores in a 40-16 victory over Cincinnati.

Defensive Player of the Week

Houston LB **Steven Taylor**: The senior had nine tackles, two sacks and a 74-yard interception return for a TD in the victory over Cincinnati.

Special Teams Player of the Week

UConn K **Bobby Puyol**: The senior made a pair of field goals, including a 43-yard game-winner with 1:33 left, in a 13-10 victory over Virginia.

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Each week in 2016, the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl will spotlight an alumni player from each of our partner conferences: the American Athletic Conference, Conference USA and the Mid-American Conference.

RANDY MOSS (MARSHALL)



Former NFL wide receiver and current ESPN analyst **Randy Moss** was a two-time consensus All-American during his college career at Marshall from 1996-97.

Moss set several NCAA records as a redshirt freshman during Marshall's 1996 I-AA undefeated championship season. He caught 78 passes for 1,709 yards and 28 touchdowns.

In his sophomore season of 1997, he caught 96 passes for 1,820 yards and 26 touchdowns as Marshall moved up to I-A and won the MAC title. Moss finished fourth in voting for the Heisman Trophy and was the Fred Biletnikoff Award winner as the nation's top receiver.

Moss finished his two-year college career with 168 receptions for 3,467 yards and 53 TDs.

Moss was drafted in the first round of the 1998 NFL Draft by the Minnesota Vikings, and he immediately became one of the most prolific receivers in the NFL.

A six-time Pro Bowler and a four-time All-Pro, Moss set the NFL's single-season touchdown reception record with 23 in 2007 and is second all-time in career TD catches with 156.

He led the NFL in receiving TDs in 1998, 2000, 2003, 2007 and tied for the lead in 2009. He led the NFC in receiving yards in 1999 (1,413) and 2002 (1,347). Moss also led the NFC in receptions in 2002.

Moss played 14 NFL seasons with the Vikings, Oakland Raiders, New England Patriots, Tennessee Titans and the San Francisco 49ers.

He was voted to the 2000s NFL Team of the Decade by the Pro Football Hall of Fame's Selection Committee.
