POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL WEEK 7 NOTEBOOK

THIS WEEKEND: Week 7 begins in the American on Friday as Memphis (4-1, 1-0) visits Tulane (3-2, 0-1). Saturday, the American has three games as UConn (3-3, 1-2) heads to East leader USF (5-1, 2-0), Tulsa (4-1, 1-0) is at Houston (5-1, 2-1) in a key West contest and Temple (3-3) is at UCF (3-2 1-0) in an important East matchup. Four of the six Conference USA games on Saturday are league affairs, led by WKU's (3-3, 1-1) visit to East leader Middle Tennessee (4-1, 2-0) in a battle of the first two C-USA Popeyes Bahamas Bowl representatives. Also, East tri-leader FIU (2-4, 2-0) is at Charlotte (2-4, 1-1). In non-conference action, Southern Miss (4-2) visits ranked SEC foe LSU. In the MAC, all 12 teams are in action with six conference games, with the biggest one involving the current division leaders as unbeaten Western Michigan (6-0, 2-0) travels to East co-leader Akron (4-2, 2-0). The other East co-leader Ohio (4-2, 2-0) hosts Eastern Michigan (4-2, 1-1). Also, Bowling Green (1-5, 0-2) vists Toledo (4-1, 1-0) as the Rockets try to keep pace behind Western Michigan in the West race.

WEEK 6 REVIEW: In the American, Navy extended its home field winning streak to 13 games with a win against ranked Houston, the Midshipmen's first victory against a top-10 team since a 1984 win against No. 2 South Carolina, USF ran its' record to 5-1 overall with a 38-22 victory over East Carolina. In C-USA. Louisiana Tech survived a shootout 55-52 victory over WKU. UTSA established several school offensive records in a 55-32 win over Southern Miss, the most points the Roadrunners have scored against a FBS opponent. In the MAC, Western Michigan earned a 45-30 win over NIU to improve to 6-0 overall for the first time since 1941. WMU is the only team in FBS that has not committed a turnover. Akron had a 35-13 win over Miami, and the Zips have won nine of their last 11 games dating back to last year.

POLLING PLACE: Houston (AAC) is No. 12 in the Amway Coaches' Poll and No. 14 in the Associated Press Poll after Week 6, Western Michigan (MAC) is No. 23 in the Coaches and No. 24 in the AP while Navy enters the AP poll at No. 25. South Florida (AAC) is receiving votes in the AP poll. Those receiving votes in the Coaches' Poll (in order of votes received) are Navy, South Florida, Memphis (AAC), Tulsa (AAC) and Middle Tennessee (C-USA).

INDIVIDUAL ACCLAIM

In C-USA, Southern Miss WR **Allenzae Staggers** and WKU WR **Nicholas Norris** are the only FBS WRs to have multiple catches of 80 yards or longer in 2016.

The MAC features two of the top three quarterbacks in the country in pass efficiency as Toledo QB **Logan Woodside** ranks second in the nation with a 204.0 rating and Western Michigan QB **Zach Terrell** ranks third in the country with a 186.9 rating.

In the American, Tulsa RB **D'Angelo Brewer** is 4th in FBS with a 143.2-yard per game average, while East Carolina WR **Zay Jones** leads FBS at 14.0 receptions per game.

Central Michigan DB **Amari Coleman**: The junior had four tackles, an interception and three pass breakups in a 24-21 victory over Ball State.



ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Each week in 2016, the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl will spotlight an alumni player from each of our partner conferences: the American Athletic Conference, Conference USA and the Mid-American Conference.

JOE GREENE (NORTH TEXAS)



Pro Football and College Football Hall of Famer Ice Greene, a 1968 consensus All-American, played his college career at North Texas from 1966-68.

Greene, whose iconic nickname of "Mean Joe" referenced the Mean Green nickname of the then-North Texas State, was part of a 23-5-1 record by the school in his three seasons as a defensive tackle.

In his 29 games at defensive tackle, North Texas held the opposition to 2,507 yards gained on 1,276 rushes, a per-carry average of less than two yards per attempt.

A consensus All-American in his senior season of 1968, Greene was selected No. 4 overall by the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 1969 NFL Draft.

Greene was the NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year in 1969, and was selected to the Pro Bowl that same season.

A dominant defensive tackle, Greene became the lynchpin of the Steelers' famed Steel Curtain defense during the 1970s.

He was the NFL Defensive Player of the Year in 1972 as the Steelers advanced to the AFC Championship Game. In 1974, he won the honor again as Pittsburgh won the first of four Super Bowls with Greene, beating Minnesota in Super Bowl IX. He was also part of the Steelers' title teams in Super Bowls X, XIII and XIV.

He was a five-time All-NFL performer, 11-time All-Conference pick and a 10-time Pro Bowler.

The 13-year pro (1969-81), a 1970s NFL All-Decade Team and NFL 75th Anniversary Team selection, was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1984 and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1987.
