PASSPORT STAMPED (BOWL-ELIGIBLE TEAMS): AAC-Houston (6-2), USF (6-2); MAC-Western Michigan (8-0), Toledo (6-1). **AT CUSTOMS (ONE VICTORY SHY):** AAC-Navy (5-1), Memphis (5-2), Temple (5-3), Tulsa (5-2); C-USA-Louisiana Tech (5-3), WKU (5-3); MAC-Akron (5-3), Central Michigan (5-3), Eastern Michigan (5-3), Ohio (5-3).

THIS WEEKEND: Week 9 starts the mid-week #MACtion contests with a pair of Thursday games as East co-leader Akron (5-3, 3-1) visits Buffalo (1-6, 0-3) and the other East co-leader, Ohio (5-3, 3-1), is at Toledo (6-1, 3-0) as the Rockets try to keep pace with Western Michigan in the West. Friday, the American has one game as West leader Navy (5-1, 4-0) is at East co-leader USF (6-2, 3-1). The remainder of the schedule is Saturday. In the American, Tulsa (5-2, 2-1) visits Memphis (5-2, 2-1) in a West Division showdown. In the MAC, Miami (2-2, 2-6), which trails by a game in the East race, goes to Eastern Michigan (5-3, 2-2). In Conference USA, six games are on the docket, led by an important East Division game as Middle Tennessee (4-2, 2-1) goes to division co-leader FIU (3-1, 5-3) and North Texas (4-3, 2-1) goes to UTSA (3-4, 2-2) in a key West Division game.

WEEK 8 REVIEW: In the American, Temple drew into a tie for the East Division lead after a 46-30 victory over USF. The Owls are one victory shy of bowl eligibility after beating the Bulls. Navy stayed unbeaten in conference play after a 42-28 victory over Memphis and SMU shocked Houston 38-16. In C-USA, UTEP's 52-49 win at UTSA was the longest game in conference history. C-USA also got a pair of non-conference wins as Middle Tennessee beat Missouri and North Texas beat Army. In the MAC, Toledo defeated Central Michigan 31-17 to become bowl eligible for the seventh-straight season.

POLLING PLACE: Western Michigan (MAC) is No. 20 in the Associated Press Poll and No. 21 in the Amway Coaches' Poll after Week 8, Navy (AAC) is No. 22 in both the AP and Coaches polls, while Houston (AAC) is No. 24 in the Coaches poll. Houston and SMU (AAC) are receiving votes in the AP poll. Those receiving votes in the Coaches' Poll (in order of votes received) are Middle Tennessee (C-USA), South Florida (AAC) and Tulsa (AAC).

AROUND THE CONFERENCES

In the American, The top four teams in The American's West Division (Navy, Memphis, Tulsa, Houston) have a combined record of 21-7 this season. USF and Houston became the first two teams in The American to clinch bowl eligibility in 2016.

In Conference USA, Southern Miss junior RB Ito Smith has scored at least one TD in 12 consecutive games, WKU senior WR Taywan Tay-Ior has caught at least one TD in four straight outings.

In the MAC, Western Michigan's 10-game winning streak is the second longest active streak in the country behind Alabama (20), and tied with Washington (10).

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Each week in 2016, the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl will spotlight an alumni player from each of our partner conferences: the American Athletic Conference, Conference USA and the Mid-American Conference.

T.Y. HILTON (FIU)



Current Indianapolis Colts wide receiver **T.Y. Hilton** was a standout for FIU from 2008-11.

Hilton scored 37 touchdowns as a Panther, and he broke several FIU and Sun

Belt career records, including receiving yards, receiving touchdowns, all-purpose yards and kickoff return yards.

As a senior in the 2011 Beef O'Brady's Bowl, Hilton was named the team's MVP for the game as he caught eight passes for 88 yards to go along with three carries for 23 yards and a touchdown.

Hilton's eight catches in the game allowed him to set the single-season FIU record with 72 receptions.

He was a first-team All-Sun Belt selection in all four years, a 2011 honorable mention All-America by SportsIllustrated.com and a freshman All-America in 2008.

He was drafted in the third round by the Indianapolis Colts in 2012. In three seasons with the Colts, Hilton has become one of quarterback **Andrew Luck's** favorite receivers.

Hilton had 82 receptions for 1,345 yards and seven touchdowns in 2014 on the way to a Pro Bowl selection. In 2015, he caught 69 passes for 1,124 yards and five touchdowns on the way to his second straight Pro Bowl appearance.

So far in 2016, Hilton has 45 catches for 689 yards and four touchdowns.

He was an All-Rookie selection in 2012 by the Pro Football Writers of America.
