### MID-AMERICAN CONFERENCE 2017 BOWL SCHEDULE

#### Dec. 19: Cheribundi Tart Cherry Boca Raton Bowl – Boca Raton, Fla.;

#### 7:00 pm ET (ESPN); Akron (7-6, 6-2) vs. Florida Atlantic (10-3, 8-0, C-USA)

Note: Akron won the MAC East Division with a 7-6 overall record, 6-2 in the MAC and made its first trip to the Marathon MAC Championship Game in Detroit since 2005. Akron suffered a 45-28 loss to Toledo on Dec. 2nd in the 2017 Marathon MAC Football Championship Game. Six-year head coach Terry Bowden will be leading his Zips to the program's second bowl appearance in the last three seasons, which is a program best. Bowden led the Zips to the program's first-ever bowl win in 2015 with a 23-21 win over Utah State in the 2015 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

#### Dec. 22: Bahamas Bowl – Nassau, Bahamas 12:30 pm ET (ESPN)

#### Ohio (8-4, 5-3) vs. UAB (8-4, 6-2, Conference USA)

Note: Ohio ended the regular season second in the MAC East Division with a 5-3 league-record, 8-4 overall. Bobcats head coach Frank Solich is in his 13th year leading the Ohio football program and is the third-winningest head coach in MAC history with an 96-71 record at Ohio. Last season Ohio suffered a 28-23 loss to Troy in the Dollar General Bowl. The Bobcats have been bowl eligible in 11 of the 13 years under Solich and will be making their ninth bowl appearance during his coaching tenure. Ohio will be making its 11th bowl appearance in school history.

#### Dec. 22: Famous Idaho Potato Bowl – Boise, Ida. 4:00 pm ET (ESPN)

#### Central Michigan (8-4, 6-2) vs. Wyoming (7-5, 5-3, Mountain West)

Note: Central Michigan wrapped up the 2017 season on a five-game winning streak to finish 8-4 overall, 6-2 in the MAC West Division. Third-year head coach John Bonamego led the Chippewas this season to a non-conference win over Kansas. The program will be making its fourth consecutive bowl appearance, its fifth in the last six years and the ninth in the last 12 seasons.

#### Dec. 23: Dollar General Bowl – Mobile, Ala. 7:00 pm ET (ESPN)

#### Toledo (11-2, 7-1) vs. Appalachian State (8-4, 7-1, Sun Belt Conference)

Note: Toledo won the 2017 Marathon MAC Football Championship Game with a 45-28 win over Akron on Dec. 2, its first MAC Championship since 2004. Toledo completed the season with a 11-2 overall record, 7-1 in the MAC West. Second-year head coach Jason Candle led Toledo to another successful season and will be leading the Rockets to his third-bowl game. Toledo will be making its fourth consecutive bowl appearance and its seventh bowl game in the last eight years. Toledo will be making a MAC-best 17th bowl appearance (11-5 record).

#### Dec. 26: Quick Lane Bowl – Detroit, Mich. 5:15 pm ET (ESPN)

#### Northern Illinois (8-4, 6-2) vs. Duke (6-6, 3-5, Atlantic Coast Conference)

Note: Northern Illinois finished the 2017 season in second-place in the MAC West Division with a 6-2 league record, 8-4 overall. The Huskies return to the bowl season after missing a bowl appearance last year, which snapped a MAC record streak of eight consecutive bowl appearances (2008-15). Fifth year head coach Rod Carey and the Huskies defeated Nebraska from the Big Ten earlier this season. NIU is making its 12th bowl appearance (4-7 record in bowl games).

## MAC Storylines

- Toledo won the 2017 Marathon MAC Football Championship Game with a 45-28 win over Akron on Dec. 2. The win was Toledo's first championship since 2004 and the 11th football title in program history. The Rockets have been a model of consistency in winning as Toledo has won at least nine games in six of the last seven years, and this year's record of 11-2 is the ninth time in Toledo history to win at least 10 games in a season.

- Five MAC programs received bowl invitations this 2017 bowl season -- Toledo (11-2), Akron (7-6), Ohio (8-4), Central Michigan (8-4) and Northern Illinois (8-4). The MAC record for bowl invitations in a single-season is seven in both the 2012 and 2015 bowl seasons.

- Toledo (Dollar General Bowl), Akron (Cheribundi Tart Cherry Boca Raton Bowl), Ohio (Bahamas Bowl), Central Michigan (Famous Idaho Potato Bowl) and Northern Illinois (Quick Lane Bowl) will represent the MAC this 2017 bowl season.

- This marks the 10th time in MAC history to have five or more programs receive a bowl invitation (2004, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016 and 2017) in a single-season.

- In the previous six bowl seasons, the MAC has a record of 11-24 in 35 bowl games – 2016 (0-6); 2015 (3-4); 2014 (2-3); 2013 (0-5); 2012 (2-5); 2011 (4-1) as all 12 MAC programs have appeared in a bowl game during this span (2011-16).

- Akron (7-6, 6-2) won the MAC East Division for the first time since 2005. Akron secured its third MAC East Division title as the Zips are bowl eligible for the second time in the last three years, also a program record.

- Over the last three seasons, the MAC has witnessed six different programs participate in the Marathon MAC Football Championship Game. In 2015 Bowling Green defeated NIU, 34-14, while 2016 witnessed Western Michigan with a 29-23 win over Ohio and Toledo defeated Akron, 45-28 in the 2017 Marathon MAC Football Championship Game.

- This year the MAC has 11 FBS wins, including four wins over Autonomous Conferences with two wins vs. Big Ten opponents (Nebraska, Rutgers) and two wins over Big 12 opponents (both wins over Kansas).

**MAC BOWL HISTORY**

Since the conference inception in 1946, the MAC has played in 106 bowl games with a 42-64 (.396) overall bowl record. In the early years, bowl games were few and far between before the consistency of a single-bowl game became into existence in 1981. However, over the last decade the MAC has witnessed a significant increase in the number of bowl invitations both from primary and secondary bowl partnerships, but also several at-large bowl selections as well.

From 1946 to 1980, the MAC appeared in a total of 17 bowl games in the first 35 years of the Conference in operation. Then from 1981 to 2000, the MAC witnessed twenty consecutive years of receiving only one bowl invitation each football season.

The MAC forged a bowl partnership with Detroit from 1997-2013 (Motor City Bowl and Little Caesars Pizza Bowl). The MAC added Mobile in 2001 (GMAC Bowl, GoDaddy Bowl and now Dollar General Bowl) and Boise in 2010 (Humanitarian, now named Famous Idaho Potato Bowl) as primary bowl partners.

Beginning in 2004, the Conference witnessed increased bowl participation in at-large selections as the 2004 bowl season witnessed five MAC programs receive a bowl invitation and that number was matched during the 2008, 2009, 2011, 2013 and 2014 bowl seasons. The Conference sent four programs to bowls in 2006 and 2010. The MAC set a Conference record with seven bowl invitations in both the 2012 and 2015 bowl seasons.

MAC Commissioner Dr. Jon Steinbrecher joined the Conference in 2009 and added Boise as a primary bowl partner in 2010, while adding secondary bowl agreements ranging from Gildan New Mexico; St. Petersburg and the Birmingham Bowl in order to provide MAC members the opportunity to represent the Conference and receive additional bowl invitations.

The 2012 bowl season witnessed the conference earn its first BCS Bowl invitation with Northern Illinois gaining a No. 15 BCS ranking and an invite to the Discover Orange Bowl to face Florida State.

In 2014, the MAC announced primary bowl partnerships with the newly created Raycom Media Camellia Bowl (Montgomery, Ala.), Bahamas Bowl (Nassau, Bahamas) and the Boca Raton Bowl (Boca Raton, Fla.). In addition, the MAC secured a secondary bowl partnership with the Quick Lane Bowl (Detroit) during this span.

In 2016, Western Michigan's invitation to the Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic to face Wisconsin on Jan. 2nd was the MAC's second New Year's Six Bowl Game appearance.

In the last six bowl seasons, the MAC has an 11-24 overall bowl record in 35 bowl games -- 2016 (0-6); 2015 (3-4); 2014 (2-3); 2013 (0-5); 2012 (2-5); 2011 (4-1). In 2011 the MAC won the ESPN Challenge Cup with a 4-1 record for the best FBS Conference record in bowl games.

### TOLEDO WINS MARATHON MAC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The Toledo Rockets capped an historic season with a resounding 45-28 victory over Akron at Ford Field in Detroit on Saturday to claim their 11th Mid-American Conference Championship and first since 2004.

In the 100th anniversary season of their founding as a football program, and the two-year anniversary of the hiring of Jason Candle as head coach, the Rockets (11-2) dominated the game from start to finish, scoring three times in the second quarter to take a 28-0 lead into the locker room at halftime. The Rockets outgained the Zips, 561-396, holding them to just 98 yards of total offense in the first half. The 561 yards of total offense are the third-most by a team in a MAC Championship Game.

Senior quarterback Logan Woodside, who threw for 307 yards and four touchdowns, was named the Offensive Player of the Game. Sophomore Diontae Johnson led the receiving corps with nine receptions for 118 yards and two scores, followed by junior Jon'Vea Johnson (six receptions, 103 yards, and a touchdown). Senior running back Terry Swanson piled up 180 yards and two TDs

On the other side of the ball, senior defensive end Zach Quinn led the Rockets with 10 tackles, junior defensive end Olasunkanmi Adeniyi added three tackles for loss and a forced fumble, and senior cornerback Trevon Mathis came up with an interception and a key pass breakup.

### FOUR MAC STUDENTS TOPS IN THE NATION IN SACKS

The MAC is home to four of the top students in the nation in quarterback sacks. Northern Illinois sophomore **Sutton Smith** leads the nation with 14.0 sacks (1.17 per game), while Central Michigan senior **Joe Ostman** ranks third in the country with 12.0 sacks (1.20 per game). Ball State senior **Anthony Winbush** ranks tied for fourth in the nation with 11.5 sacks (0.96 per game) and Eastern Michigan sophomore **Maxx Crosby** is tied for sixth in the country with 11.0 sacks (0.92 per game).

In addition, NIU's Smith leads the nation with 28.5 tackles for loss for an average of 2.4 per game. Toledo defensive end **Ola Adeniyi** ranks tied for seventh in the country with 19.5 tackles for loss for 1.5 per game.

### THREE MAC STUDENTS CLIMB CAREER RECORD BOOK

Three MAC seniors continue to climb up the MAC career record book this 2017 season. Quarterback Logan Woodside (Toledo), along with running back Jarvion Franklin (Western Michigan) and defensive back Darius Phillips (Western Michigan) rank among career leaders in league history.

**146 STUDENTS NAMED TO ACADEMIC ALL-MAC TEAM**

The MAC announced its 2017 Football Academic All-MAC team as a total of 146 students were named to the 2017 Academic All-MAC team. Eastern Michigan topped the 2017 Academic All-MAC squad with 18 selections. Western Michigan was second with 16 selections, while Ohio was third with 14 selections.

There were 11 students named as four-time selections with Vinnie Palazeti (Ball State), Joseph Davidson (Bowling Green), Ryan Hunter (Bowling Green), Nate Locke (Bowling Green), Mark Chapman (Central Michigan), Jeff Perry (Central Michigan), Randy Heideman (Miami), Shane Wimann (Northern Illinois), Dorian Brown (Ohio), Cody Grilliot (Ohio) and Quentin Poling (Ohio).

There were 16 students named as three-time selections, while 43 students were named as two-time Academic All-MAC selections.

**SMITH MOST DECORATED DEFENSIVE PLAYER AT NIU**

The All-America honors continue to pile up for Northern Illinois' sophomore Sutton Smith, making the defensive end one of the most decorated All-Americans in NIU football's major college history.

Smith was named a second team All-American by the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA), becoming just the second Huskie ever honored by the AFCA, after LeShon Johnson in 1993. On Dec. 12, Smith became just the third Huskie, and the first since Michael Turner in 2003, to earn first or second team All-America recognition from The Sporting News when he was named to the magazine's second team.

Smith, who leads the nation and set NIU school records for both tackles for loss and quarterback sacks, has now been named a first or second team All-American by each of the five organizations considered for NCAA consensus status. The only previous NIU player named to the All-America team of the Walter Camp Football Foundation, the Associated Press, the Football Writer's Association of America, The Sporting News and the AFCA is Johnson, a tailback who was a unanimous first team selection in 1993.

USA Today and Bleacher Report placed Smith on their first team All-America teams, and he was named to CBS Sports' second team, giving him 11 total first or second team All-America honors this year.

In 2017, he broke an NIU school record for single season tackles for loss that stood at 20 since 1984 and finished the regular season with 28.5 TFLs. NIU's single season mark for quarterback sacks also fell by the wayside with the old mark of 12 held by Scott Kellar (1984) and Larry English (2006), surpassed by Smith's 14 sacks in 2017.

The 2017 MAC Defensive Player of the Year, who was also a finalist for the Ted Hendricks Award as the nation's best defensive end, Smith is 3.5 tackles for loss away from the NCAA single season record of 32, set by Western Michigan's Jason Babin in 2003. He and the Huskies will close out the season in the 2017 Quick Lane Bowl at Ford Field in Detroit when they take on Duke on Tuesday, Dec. 26.

More than half of Smith's 56 total tackles in 2017 went for losses. He scored on a 16-yard strip, sack and fumble return versus Bowling Green on October 21 and picked up a fumble and ran 58 yards for a score versus Western Michigan to break the NIU record for fumble return touchdowns in a season. He also ranks fourth nationally in fumble recoveries with three on the year and his 73 quarterback pressures lead the nation.

**WESTERN MICHIGAN'S OKORAFOR GARNERS AWARDS**

Western Michigan senior left tackle Chukwuma Okorafor was named by the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) First-Team All-American and Walter Camp Second Team All-American.

The 6-6, 330-pound Okorafor has been a three-year starter for Western Michigan. Prior to this season he was named the No. 4 tackle to watch in the nation by Mel Kiper. Towards the end of the 2017 season he was named one of six semifinalists for the Outland Trophy. Okorafor is a two-time Mid-American Conference First Team selection.

The Broncos have had one of the top rushing offenses over the last three years. WMU ranked 29th in the nation in 2015, 24th in 2016 and 23rd in the nation this season, averaging 224.8 yards per game.

It is the second year in the row that Western Michigan has produced FWAA and Walter Camp recognition. Last season Western Michigan wide receiver Corey Davis was named FWAA First Team All-American. For the Walter Camp award, Okorafor becomes the third Bronco ever to earn the honor. Wide receiver Corey Davis was a second team selection last season and wide receiver Jordan White was a second team pick in 2012.

Western Michigan finished the season 6-6 overall, 4-4 in the MAC, however were one of three bowl eligible teams not selected for a bowl game. Okorafor and Bronco teammate, defensive back/kick returner Darius Phillips, have both officially accepted invitations to play in the 2018 Reese's Senior Bowl on Jan. 27, 2018 in Mobile, Ala.

**Ohio Bobcats Notes:**

- Ohio became bowl eligible for the ninth straight year and will make its eighth bowl appearance in that span with a trip to the 2017 Bahamas Bowl to face UAB.
- This marks the first meeting between Ohio and UAB.
- Ohio sophomore quarterback Nathan Rourke set the single-season record with 21 rushing touchdowns for the Bobcats.
- Rourke needs one more touchdown to tie the Ohio record for touchdowns responsible for.
- Ohio RS senior cornerback Bradd Ellis recorded his 18th pass breakup to tie the Ohio single-season record with T.J. Wright.
- With his four solo tackles against Miami, Ohio RS senior linebacker Quentin Poling became the all-time leader in solo tackles at Ohio. Poling ranks 10th on the Ohio single-season tackle chart with 370 career tackles. He needs 18 more to move into a tie with Scott Zele (1990-92) with 388.
- Ohio has had a 100-plus yard rusher in eight of its last nine games (Rourke vs. CMU, BG, Toledo, Akron - Ouellette vs. UMass, EMU, Kansas - Brown vs. Kent State, Toledo).
- Rourke ranks second in the country in rushing touchdowns and is the top ranked QB on the list. He ranks third nationally with 20 total touchdowns (rushing+receiving).
- RS junior running back A.J. Ouellette needs 20 yards to become the first Ohio rusher to reach 1,000 -yards since Beau Blankenship in 2012.
- Head Coach Frank Solich is third in All-Time career MAC wins with 96. He will need 14- more wins to tie Bill Hess for No. 2 on the list.
- Ohio has 467 total points this season which set the single-season record. The previous record of 427 was set during the 2011 season in 14 games.
- Ohio landed 12 players on the All-MAC list led by RS senior LB Quentin Poling on the first team.
- Head Coach Frank Solich is the third-longest tenured head coach in the NCAA behind Kirk Ferentz (1999, Iowa) and Gary Patterson (2000, TCU).
- Ohio is the only program in the NCAA to have had the same head coach, offensive and defensive coordinator over the last 12 years.

**Ohio Bowl History:** This marks the 11th bowl appearance for the Ohio football program and the ninth under head coach Frank Solich. Ohio is 2-8 in those bowl games with its first bowl win coming in a 24-23 win over Utah State at the 2011 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl. Ohio's last bowl win was in 2012, 45-14, over Louisiana-Monroe at the Advocare V100 Independence Bowl. In last year's bowl Ohio dropped a 28-23 loss to Troy at the 2017 Dollar General Bowl in Mobile, Ala.

**Bobcats Vs. C-USA:** Ohio is 36-22-6 against the current membership of C-USA having played Marshall the most with a 33-20-6 record against the Thundering Herd. Ohio is 2-0 against North Texas, 0-1 against Southern Miss and 1-1 against Western Kentucky. Ohio has been paired up with a C-USA team three times facing Marshall, Southern Miss and Eastern Carolina. Ohio is 0-3 against the C-USA in bowl appearances including a 37-20 loss to Eastern Carolina at the 2013 Beef O'Brady Bowl.

**Record Year For Poling:** Ohio RS senior linebacker Quentin Poling has set two career records this season setting new marks with 219 solo tackles and 45.0 tackles for loss. Poling ranks 10th on the career tackle chart (370) and needs 18 more to move into ninth.

**Rourke's Records:** Ohio sophomore quarterback Nathan Rourke set the Ohio single-season record with 21 rushing touchdowns this season. The previous mark was held by Ohio hall of famer Calvin McRae. Rourke needs one more touchdowns to move into a tie with Tyler Tettleton with 38 touchdowns responsible for.

**Blazers Cap Historic 2017 In The Bahamas:** In one of college football's biggest stories this season, the UAB football team will cap off its historic 2017 season by playing Ohio University in the 2017 Bahamas Bowl. The Blazers are playing in just their second bowl game in program history along with the 2004 Sheraton Hawaii Bowl. If UAB wins, it will be its first bowl victory ever.

**A Year To Remember:** Led by Conference USA Coach of the Year Bill Clark, not only did UAB return to the field after a two year hiatus, but the Blazers re-wrote the record books, highlighted by setting a program record for single season FBS wins (8) and Conference USA wins (6). UAB led Conference USA in attendance with a school record average of 26,375. The Blazers finished 6-0 at home for the first time ever.

**Williams Among Nations Elite:** Senior cornerback Darius Williams put together an All-American worthy season as a lockdown corner. The Jacksonville native finished the regular season ranking second nationally in passes defended with 20 (1.7/game). He led Conference in both interceptions (5) and pass breakups (15). His five interceptions is tied for seventh nationally. Williams had a career-high four pass breakups at Florida. He was named a First Team All-American by Pro Football Focus and a First Team All-Conference USA performer.

**Brown Named C-USA Freshman of the Year:** Conference USA Freshman of the Year Spencer Brown shattered the UAB record books in his first collegiate season. Brown is the nation's third leading rusher among freshmen averaging 107.7 yards per game. His rushing total of 1,292 yards ranks third in a single season and UAB and he needs 97 yards to set the C-USA freshman rushing record held by Damien Fletcher of Southern Miss in 2006 (1,388 yards). Brown has six 100-yard rushing games this year with a career high of 209 yards coming at Southern Miss.

**Erdely Has Record Setting Year:** Quarterback A.J. Erdely accounted for 29 total touchdowns in the regular season with 16 through the air and 13 on the ground. He needs three total touchdowns to tie and four to pass Joe Webb for the most touchdowns accounted for in a single season (Webb, 32 in 2009).

**Redzone Efficient:** The Blazers have made 45 trips to the redzone this season and have come away with points on 41 of those trips, good for an 91 percent conversion rate. Of those 45 trips, 34 have resulted in touchdowns. UAB ranks 18th nationally in redzone offense.

Conversely, the UAB defense has also been very good in the redzone and ranks 25th nationally in that category. Opponents have made 37 trips to the red zone have scored on touchdowns on 19 of those trips.

**Moving The Chains:** UAB has done a tremendous job moving the chains on third down this season, converting 48 percent of its attempts. The Blazers are tied for 7th nationally in third down conversion percentage and are 81-for-170 overall. UAB leads Conference USA in that category and was 10-of-16 in its last game out vs. UTEP.

**30+ Points:** The UAB offense is on pace to put together one of its most prolific offensive seasons in program history. The Blazers are averaging 29.6 points per game and have scored at least 30 points in six of 12 games. The 2014 team has the record for averaging 33.2 points per game.
