C-USA BOWL INFORMATION

C-USA SENDING EIGHT TEAMS TO BOWLS

C-USA will be sending eight schools to play in bowl games this holiday season. C-USA Champion Florida Atlantic leads the group of eight teams, joined in the postseason by West Champion UAB, Charlotte, FIU, Louisiana Tech, Marshall, Southern Miss and WKU.

Florida Atlantic (10-3) heads to postseason play having won 10 of its last 11 games after capturing its second C-USA Championship in three years. The Owls will play in the familiar confines of FAU Stadium in the Cheribundi Boca Raton Bowl on Saturday, Dec. 21 at 3:30 p.m. EST/2:30 p.m. CST on ABC. Florida Atlantic will face SMU in the first meeting between the two schools. This will be the fifth time in the bowl's six years that it has featured the Conference USA Champion.

UAB (9-4) will make its third consecutive bowl appearance when it plays in the R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl. The Blazers will face Sun Belt Conference Champion Appalachian State (12-1) on Saturday, Dec. 21 at 9 p.m. EST/8 p.m. CST on ESPN. UAB will be the seventh different current member of C-USA to play in the New Orleans Bowl.

The Charlotte 49ers (7-5), who rode a five-game win streak to bowl eligibility, have accepted an invitation to compete in the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl in the program's first-ever bowl appearance. The game will kick-off the bowl season on Friday, December 20 (2 p.m. EST/1 p.m. CST). Charlotte will be meeting Buffalo (7-5), winners of five of its last six contests, for the first time.

For the first time in program history, FIU (6-6) will make a third straight bowl appearance. The Panthers will face Arkansas State (7-5) in the sixth annual Camellia Bowl, which kicks off on Saturday, Dec. 21 at 5:30 p.m. EST/4:30 p.m. CST on ESPN. This will be the ninth time that FIU will face Arkansas State, a former conference rival in the Sun Belt.

Louisiana Tech (9-3) will be in a bowl game for the sixth straight season when it participates in the Walk-On's Independence Bowl on Thursday, Dec. 26 at 4 p.m. EST/3 p.m. CST on ESPN). The Bulldogs, who are joined by Wisconsin as the only FBS programs to have bowl wins the last five seasons will face Miami in the 11th-oldest bowl game. LA Tech and Miami have met four times previously, including the 2003 season opener at Independence Stadium in Shreveport.

For the second straight year, Marshall (8-4) will represent C-USA in the Bad Boy Mowers Gasparilla Bowl on Monday, Dec. 23 at 2:30 p.m. EST/1:30 p.m. CST on ESPN. The Tampa Bay area bowl will feature the Thundering Herd and former C-USA member UCF (9-3) in its game at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa. Marshall is 12-2 all-time in bowl games, including seven straight victories, and this will be its fourth appearance in this bowl since 2011.

Southern Miss (7-5) will make its 26th bowl appearance when it plays for the first time in the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl in Fort Worth, Texas on Saturday, Jan. 4 at 11:30 a.m. EST/10:30 a.m. CST. The Golden Eagles will renew a long-standing rivalry with Tulane (6-6), as this will be the 31st all-time meeting, but the first since 2010. This will be the 12th time in the bowl's 17-year history that Conference USA has placed a team in the game.

After a one-year absence, WKU (8-4) is back in the postseason, as the Hilltoppers will play in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl in Dallas, Texas on Monday, December 30 at 12:30 p.m. EST/11:30 am CST. WKU will play in its sixth all-time bowl against Western Michigan (7-5) in a game played at Gerald J. Ford Stadium in Dallas. The teams met 15 times from 1923 to 1947, but this will be the first meeting in 72 years.

C-USA is 30-18 (.625) over the past seven years in bowls, which includes the best record of all the conferences four times in the past eight seasons.

NOTES ON C-USA BOWL OPPONENTS

*C-USA will face three of the top 10 FBS teams in scoring offense in bowl games: No. 6 SMU (43.0), No. 6 UCF (43.0) and No. 9 Appalachian State (39.4). *C-USA will face three former members this bowl season: SMU, Tulane and UCF. *C-USA will play bowl games against members of the ACC (1), American (3), MAC (2) and Sun Belt (2) Conferences.

BUFFALO

*Buffalo is making consecutive bowl appearances for the first time.

*Sophomore RB Jaret Patterson set single-season team records for rushing yards (1,626) and rushing TD's (17), including a MAC-record six scores in the regularseason finale vs. Bowling Green. After earning MAC Freshman of the Year honors in 2018, Patterson eclipsed 140 rush yards in each of his final five 2019 games. *The Bulls are balanced, leading the MAC in both average yards rushing (254.2) and average total yards allowed (293.1).

SMU

*At 10-2 SMU has already posted its highest win total since 1984. Only twice in their history have the Mustangs won more than 10 games in a season: 1982 and 1935. A win here would make it a third time.

*Head coach Sonny Dykes is a finalist for the Eddie Robinson and George Munger National Coach of Year awards after posting 10 wins in his second season at SMU. *WR Receiver James Proche led the American in receptions (102), touchdown receptions (14) and was second in receiving yards (1,139).

*RB Xavier Jones is tied for second in the FBS with 21 rushing touchdowns.

*The Mustangs are sixth nationally in scoring offense (43.0, currently a school record), ninth in total offense (495.3, school record) and 12th in passing offense (309.3, second all-time at the school).

*The SMU defense set school records with 50 sacks (2nd NCAA) and 105 tackles for loss (4th NCAA).

ARKANSAS STATE

*Arkansas State is playing in a bowl game for the ninth consecutive season. *Middle Tennessee defeated Arkansas State in the 2017 Camellia Bowl, 35-30. *Arkansas State WR Omar Bayless, who led the country in receiving through the regular season at 1,473 yards to go with his school-record 16 touchdown catches, was named Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year.

*Quarterback Layne Hatcher was named Sun Belt Freshman of the Year. He threw for at least 300 yards in five of his eight starts and completed multiple touchdown passes in each of those games. He ended the regular season by completing 177-of-259 passes for a 68.3 percentage that ranks as the second highest in school history.

APPALACHIAN STATE

*Appalachian State is the only program with a bowl win in each of its first four eligible seasons after the complete transition to the FBS level.

*For the second straight season, the Mountaineers lost their head coach following the Sun Belt Championship Game. Elijah Drinkwitz was named head coach at Missouri on Dec. 9. Offensive line coach Shawn Clark will serve as the interim coach for the bowl game.

*Junior QB Zac Thomas compiled just shy of 3,000 yards of offense to go with 33 touchdowns (26 passing, 7 rushing).

*Junior RB Darrynton Evans averaged better than 5.6 yards per carry en route to 1,323 yards and 17 touchdowns on the ground.

•After winning their fourth straight Sun Belt Championship, Appalachian State became the first team in league history to win 12 games in a season.

*The Mountaineers are the only Group of Five team with two Power Five road wins this year (North Carolina and South Carolina).

UCF

*This marks a program-record fourth consecutive postseason bowl appearance for the Knights, the seventh in eight seasons and the 11th in 15 years.

*This will be UCF's fourth appearance in the Tampa Bay area bowl since 2009.

*The Knights (9-3) will be attempting to post double-digit wins for the third straight year. UCF's three losses came by a combined total of seven points.

*The Knights rank fourth in the FBS in total offense, averaging 526.6 yards per game and topping the 600-yard mark in four games.

*Junior WR Gabriel Davis set the school single-season receiving record with 1,241 yards and had 12 touchdown catches.

*Senior S Richie Grant is a back-to-back first-team All-Conference honoree who totaled 68 tackles, 4.0 TFL's and eight pass break-ups, while helping the Knights hold opponents to 28% on third-down conversions, which ranks sixth in the nation.

MIAMI

*Miami will be playing in its second Independence Bowl (2014) and at Independence Stadium for third time (defeated LA Tech in the 2003 season opener).

*First-year Hurricanes head coach Manny Diaz served as LA Tech's Defensive Coordinator in 2014, as the Bulldogs led the nation in forced turnovers (42), won the C-USA West Division title and defeated Illinois in the Heart of Dallas Bowl.

*Freshman DE Gregory Rousseau was recognized as the ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year. He finished with an ACC-leading 14 sacks - a total tied for second-most in the nation - and was tied for 10th in the country with 18 tackles for loss. Rousseau had at least one sack in eight games and had five games with multiple TFL's.

*C-USA already has one win vs. Miami in 2019: FIU defeated them, 30-24 on Nov. 23.

WESTERN MICHIGAN

*WMU is making its 10th bowl appearance, but are just 1-8 all-time in bowls. *Senior RB LeVante Bellamy won the Verne Smith Leadership award, which is given to the best player in the MAC. Bellamy has run for 1,412 yards and an FBS-leading 23 touchdowns this season. He has at least one TD in 11 of 12 games.

*Senior QB Jon Wassink won the Wuerffel Trophy, college football's premier award for community service, athletic and academic achievement. Wassink has completed 222-of-371 passes for 2,904 yards and 19 touchdowns against seven interceptions.

*Tulane is making back-to-back bowl appearances for the first time since 1979-80. *Tulane will take on Southern Miss for the 31st time in program history. The last meeting was on Nov. 6. 2010 when both schools were members of Conference USA. *After a 5-1 start, the Green Wave dropped five of their last six games, all to bowlbound teams.

*Tulane scored at least 38 points in all six of its victories.

*Tulane enters the game featuring one of the nation's top rushing attacks, averaging 249.8 yards per game - a figure that ranks 13th in the nation. Southern Miss has the second-best run defense in C-USA, allowing 111.3 yards per game.

*Junior DE Patrick Johnson was named All-AAC Second Team for the second straight year after leading the team in sacks for the second consecutive year. He also finished second on the team in tackles for loss, while starting in all 12 games.

FLORIDA ATLANTIC WINS SEC-OND C-USA FOOTBALL CHAMPI-ONSHIP IN THREE YEARS

Florida Atlantic's offense showcased its firepower on Saturday afternoon against the league's top-ranked defense, as the Owls became Conference USA Champions for the second time in three seasons with a 49-6 victory over UAB in the 2019 Ryan C-USA Football Championship.

Florida Atlantic (10-3) scored five first-half touch-downs to take a 35-6 lead to the break and finished the game with a season-high 585 yards of total offense, the most allowed by the Blazers (9-4) since their program was reinstated in for the 2017 season.

Owls QB **Chris Robison** was named the game's Most Valuable Player after he went 17-of-29 for 267 yards and touchdowns to four different receivers, while adding 30 rushing yards on four attempts. Robison started the day hot, with his first five completions going for 121 yards and two TDs.

Only one signal-caller (Houston's Case Keenum in 2009 with five) has thrown more TD passes in a C-USA Championship Game than Robison and he joins WKU's Brandon Doughty (2015) as the only quarterbacks to win the award in the 15-year history of the title game.

Florida Atlantic produced a 100-yard rusher and a 100-yard receiver in the same game for the second time this season. Malcolm Davidson gained 128 yards on only 11 rushes, while Deangelo Antoine totaled 112 yards on five receptions, including a touchdown. That is the same duo that accomplished the feat in a win over FIU on November 9.

The Florida Atlantic defense turned in a strong allaround performance, allowing 223 total yards to UAB, including just 42 through the air. The unit picked off two passes, registered three sacks, six tackles for loss and forced one fumble.

Offensively for UAB, RB **Spencer Brown** rushed 18 times for 65 yards, while WR **Austin Watkins Jr.** had three catches for 43 yards. Defensively, S Will Boler had a career-high 10 tackles.

Florida Atlantic opened the game's scoring with a one-yard touchdown run by B.J. Emmons on fourthand-goal. That score capped a drive that started at midfield off a UAB punt.

Nick Vogel put UAB on the board with a 44-yard field goal that capped off an 8-play, 51-yard drive.

On the first play of Florida Atlantic's next possession, Robison threw a 75-yard touchdown pass to WR Antoine. That play tied the C-USA Championship record for the longest reception and gave the Owls a 14-3 advantage.

Florida Atlantic would extend that lead on the second play of the second guarter when Robison tossed an 18-yard scoring strike to WR John Mitchell.

The Owls special teams would make it 28-3 when RB Tyrek Tisdale blocked a punt by UAB's Kyle Greenwell that LB Eddie Williams picked up and returned seven yards for a touchdown. That was just the sec-ond time in C-USA Championship history that a team scored on a blocked punt.

Just before halftime, FAU scored its fifth touchdown of the day, an eight-yard TD throw from Robison to TE Harrison Bryant. The 35 first half points go down as the second-most in C-USA Championship history.

CHAMPIONSHIP GAME NOTES

**Florida Atlantic wins its second Conference USA Championship in three years with a 49-6 victory.

**Florida Atlantic becomes the fifth school to win multiple C-USA Championship Games since the event began in 2005. The Owls join WKU and former members East Carolina, Tulsa and UCF with two titles each.

** Florida Atlantic QB Chris Robison was named C-USA Championship MVP. He joins WKU's Brandon Doughty (2015) as the only guarterbacks to win the award in 15 years. Robison was 17-of-29 for 267 yards and four touchdowns, while adding 30 rushing yards on four attempts. Only one QB (Houston's Case Keenum in 2009 with five) has thrown more TD passes in a C-USA Championship Game. Robison started the day hot, with his first five completions going for 121 yards and two touchdowns.

**The 35 points scored by Florida Atlantic in the first half were the second-most ever scored in one half in the C-USA Championship. WKU scored 38 points vs. Louisiana Tech in 2016 in the highest-scoring half in Championship history (38-27 at halftime).

**In two C-USA Championship Game appearances, Florida Atlantic has outscored its opponents 90-23, including a 62-6 total in the first half. The Owls led North Texas, 27-0 at halftime in 2017 en route to a 41-17 victory. The Owls now own the two largest margins of victory in C-USA Championship history.

**Chris Robison's 75-yard touchdown pass to Deangelo Antoine in the first quarter tied the C-USA Championship record for the longest reception.

*Florida Atlantic's **Tyrek Tisdale** blocked a punt by UAB's Kyle Greenwell that Owls LB Eddie Williams picked up and returned seven yards for a touchdown in the second quarter. That was just the second time in C-USA Championship history that a team scored on a blocked punt.

**Florida Atlantic senior CB Meiko Dotson's first quarter interception was his nation-leading ninth of the season. The nine INT's are tied for the secondmost in a season in C-USA history and the most by any C-USA player since Louisville's Anthony Floyd set the single-season mark with 10 in 2000.

**Chris Tooley's fourth quarter interception was Florida Atlantic's FBS-leading 21st of the season, setting a new school record.

**With his fourth catch, Florida Atlantic TE Harrison Bryant went over the 1,000-yard mark in receiving yards on the season. With 1,004 yards in 2019, he is just the third player in both Florida Atlantic and C-USA history to have at least 1,000 in a single season.

** The host school is now 11-4 all-time in the title game that began in 2005.

WILLIE TAGGART NAMED FLORIDA ATLANTIC HEAD COACH

Florida Atlantic has named Willie Taggart the Owls' head football coach. A Florida native, Taggart is considered one of the best offensive minds in the country and has proven to be very successful on the recruiting trail. Taggart comes to FAU after serving as head coach at Florida State University for two seasons. In 2017, Taggart took over at Oregon, which had been 4-8 the previous season. He led the Ducks to a 7-5 mark and a selection to the Las Vegas Bowl. Taggart has led remarkable turnarounds at several of his previous head coaching stops, along with a track record of offensive success. From 2015-17, his offenses had the fourth-highest points-per-game average among FBS head coaches, behind only Mike Gundy, Kliff Kingsbury and Urban Meyer. Taggart also had four successful seasons as head coach at South Florida (including a Top 25 finish in 2016) and three seasons rebuilding his alma mater as they moved up to the FBS level, WKU, culminating in the school's first bowl appearance in 2012.

RICKY RAHNE NAMED HEAD **COACH AT OLD DOMINION**

Ricky Rahne, who served as offensive coordinator at Penn State, has been selected as the second head football coach at Old Dominion. For the past nine years, Rahne (pronounced ronnie) has developed an increasing national profile as a key component of Coach James Franklin's staff at both Penn State and Vanderbilt. The coaching staff has guided those teams to bowl games in each of the nine years and have won nine or more games in six of the last eight seasons. Rahne has spent six seasons at Penn State, including the last two as offensive coordinator. Despite having a new starting quarterback, Rahne helped lead the Nittany Lion offense to 34 points per game this season, while six offensive players earned all-Big10 honors this season. Known as a terrific offensive mind that can adjust to his personnel, Rahne demonstrated that in 2019. Despite the loss of the No. 2 overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft (Saquon Barkley), Penn State rushed for the most vards per game in the last 10 years at 204.9. PSU led the Big Ten with 42 red zone TDs, good for 16th in FBS.

JEFF TRAYLOR TAKES OVER AS UTSA HEAD COACH

UTSA has selected Jeff Traylor, former associate head coach at UT-Austin, Southern Methodist University and the University of Arkansas, as its new head football coach. Traylor has nearly 30 years of coaching experience including a highly successful 15-year career as head coach at Gilmer High School, where he led teams to three state championships and two state runner-up finishes, winning more than 87% of his games. Traylor has served most recently as associate head coach and running backs coach for two seasons at Arkansas. Prior to that, he served in the same role at SMU for the 2017 season. He began at the collegiate level as the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at Texas in 2015 before becoming the Longhorns' associate head coach for offense and wide receivers coach the following year.

QUICK HITTERS

CHARLOTTE TO THE BAHAMAS

The Charlotte 49ers, who rode a five-game win streak to bowl eligibility, have announced that they have accepted an invitation to compete in the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl in the program's first-ever bowl appearance.

"We are extremely excited for our university, our team and our fans to accept an invitation to the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl," said 49ers Director of Athletics Mike Hill. "We couldn't imagine a better setting for our first-ever bowl game. This team has demonstrated incredible resilience and earned this opportunity. Niner Nation can't wait to head to the Bahamas!"

The 2019 Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl will be held Dec. 20 at 2:00 p.m. ET at 15,000-seat Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium in Nassau, Bahamas. Charlotte (7-5) will face Buffalo, which went 7-5, this season, with a 5-3 mark in the Mid-American Conference. The Bulls have won five of their last six games.

Charlotte's school-record five-game win streak to close the regular-season came in Conference USA play as Charlotte finished a school-best 5-3 in the league.

"We are ecstatic to accept an invitation to play in the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl." said 49ers head coach Will Healy. "It means so much to me that this group, especially our outstanding seniors our Gold Standard — will have a chance to play together one more time. To do it in paradise? We couldn't ask for anything more. Nothing will ever change the fact that this team was the first to go to a bowl game in Charlotte Football history. That's incredible, and I am so proud of everyone who worked so hard to make this a reality."

The 49ers powerful offense is led by versatile guarterback Chris Reynolds and 1,000-yard rusher Benny LeMay. The 49ers defense is headlined by defensive end Alex Highsmith, the 49ers alltime sack king, and linebacker Jeff Gemmell, who recently recorded his program-best 300th career tackle.

"As proud as we are to be in this position after five consecutive wins, we aren't satisfied," Healy added. "We've been saying for weeks that our goal is to win a bowl game, not just to qualify for one. So we'll have to work hard in the coming weeks to prepare for an excellent Buffalo team. But we are so excited to have this challenge and an opportunity to share a bowl experience together."

This will be the first meeting between Buffalo and Charlotte. Conference USA leads the all-time Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl series. 3-2 over the MAC.

C-USA HAS ALL BEEN BOWLING

With Charlotte earning its first bowl bid, that means that all 14 C-USA schools have gone to a bowl game since the 2014 season. Twelve schools have gone to the postseason over the last four seasons.

FAU'S BRYANT WINS THE 2019 JOHN MACKEY AWARD

Florida Atlantic senior TE Harrison Bryant has been voted the winner of the 2019 John Mackey Award, given to the most outstanding tight end in college football. Bryant is the first Owl in the 19-year history of the FAU football program to receive a national individual accolade, and will be presented with the trophy on Dec. 12 during The Home Depot College Football Awards Red Carpet Show in Atlanta. Not only is Bryant the first Owl to earn such a prestigious national honor, he is the first non-Power Five player to ever receive the Mackey Award, which will be presented Thursday for the 20th time.

The senior and Gray, Georgia, native leads all tight ends nationwide with 65 catches and 1,004 receiving vards, and ranks fourth in the FBS with seven touchdowns (all coming in his last six games). Bryant has posted multiple catches in each game and six games with five or more grabs, including Nov. 23 at UTSA when he caught a game-high 10 passes for a careerbest 192 yards. In a Nov. 30 win over Southern Miss, he had a career-high three TD catches. Bryant ranks first among all tight ends with 26 explosive plays of 15 yards or more and has produced 46 first downs with his 65 receptions. Bryant became the third tight end in C-USA history to register 1,000 yards receiving yards in a single-season. Rice's James Casey holds the league record for receving yards by a tight end with 1,329 in 2008.

FIU IS NATIONAL TEAM OF WEEK

The FIU Panthers earned their first win over an ACC opponent and only the second win over a current Power-5 opponent, with an intra-city win over Miami, 30-24, at Marlins Park. The win gave the Panthers six wins in a season for a school-record third consecutive year, and earned them the FWAA Reveal Suits National Team of the Week honor for games of the weekend of Nov. 23. This is the first time for FIU to earn the Team of the Week honor and the second straight year a C-USA school has been recognized (Old Dominion on Sept. 24, 2018).

CHARLOTTE'S SACK MAN

Charlotte senior DE Alex Highsmith, the program's undisputed sack king, had a career-game in the 49ers fifth straight win in the regular eason finale, 38-22 at Old Dominion. Highsmith had a school-record 4.5 sacks, a school-record 5.0 TFL's and a career-best 12 tackles as Charlotte clinched a winning season with its seventh victory. Highsmith's big game landed him second in the FBS in sacks with a school-record 14.0 and second in the nation in TFL's with a school-record 21.5. He now owns the 49ers school-records for sacks in a game, season and career.

MOST MALONE

WKU junior DE Deangelo Malone had seven tackles. 1.0 sacks and 1.0 tackle for loss in the Hilltoppers 31-26 win over Middle Tennessee to close the regular season. With 21 tackles for loss on the season (third in C-USA and fourth nationally), Malone has set a new school mark in the FBS era (since 2009) and is only the 11th defender in WKU's 101-season history to have at least 20. He is second in C-USA with 11.5 sacks, third on the school's single-season list. Malone is only the 4th defender in WKU's 101-season history to reach double-digit quarterback takedowns in a single season.

MOLL LEADS UAB D

UAB junior LB Kristopher Moll is the only player in Conference USA to rank top 10 in tackles (T-7th), sacks (5th) and TFL's (5th) and he is the catalyst for the nation's sixth-ranked defense. In 12 games, Moll has 96 total tackles, 16.0 TFL, 9.0 sacks, four forced fumbles, six QB hurries, one interception, one fumble recovery and one pass breakup.

O'HARA ON THE RUN

Middle Tennessee sophomore QB Asher O'Hara ran for 144 yards in the season finale at WKU to become just the second QB in school history to reach 1,000 yards (Dwight Dasher 2009) and the third in C-USA annals. His total of 1,058 yards was the second-most in league annals. O'Hara led the Blue Raiders in rushing in 11 of 12 games this season and averaged 88.2 yards per game on the ground. His rushing average ranked fourth among all FBS quarterbacks. He leads the league in total offense (306.25 yards per game) with 20 passing touchdowns and nine rushing scores.

THE QUEZ FOR GREATNESS

Southern Miss junior WR Quez Watkins averages a league-high 102.4 receiving yards per game (ninth in the FBS), having posted four 100-yard games in 10 played. He also averages 18.6 yards per catch (20th nationally) with 55 receptions for 1,024 yards and five touchdowns. Watkins is third in C-USA in all-purpose yards with 1,096. He has the most plays from scrimmage of 40+ yards (tied at 7), 50+ yards (5) and 60+ yards (4) in C-USA and is second in 30+ yard plays (11).

QUICK HITTERS

AMIK THE PLAYMAKER

Louisiana Tech junior CB Amik Robertson was named a first team All-American by the FWAA. He became the third LA Tech player and 12th player in C-USA history to intercept three passes in a game against Southern Miss on Oct. 19 and has a total of five INTs this season (tied for sixth nationally). His career total of 14 interceptions is the most among all active FBS players. Robertson's 21 passes defended this season are the second-most for any player in the nation. He has also regostered 60 tackles, 8.0 TFL's and 1.0 sack.

JUSTIN TO THE END ZONE

Louisiana Tech junior RB Justin Henderson has been a scoring machine in his first season as a Bulldog. He has posted six multiple touchdown games and has a league-high 15 rushing scores on the season (tied for 12th nationally). Henderson's 16 total touchdowns lead C-USA and is three more than any other player. He ranks sixth in C-USA with 967 rushing yards and averages 5.83 yards per carry (third in the league).

KNOX OUT TO GAIN GROUND

Marshall sophomore RB Brenden Knox leads C-USA with 1,284 yards through the first 12 games, an average of 107.0 per game and has also rushed for 11 touchdowns. His yardage total is the eight-best inprogram history and 16th-best among all FBS players this season. Knox was been even better against league foes in 2019, averaging 123.5 yards against C-USA competition with seven scores in eight games. In 17 career games with the Herd, he has 1,862 yards (109.5 per game) and 15 TDs.

RICE'S ALLDREDGE IS BLAZIN'

Rice junior LB Blaze Alldredge closed out the season with a career-high 14 tackles and 3.5 TFL's at UTEP, as the Owls closed the year on a three-game winning streak. He finished 2019 with 21.5 tackles for loss (currently tied for second in C-USA and the nation). His total has shattered the school record for Rice linebackers (Larry Izzo had 17 in 1995) and ranks second on the Rice single-season list. Alldredge had at least one TFL in each of the last 10 games. In his last 13 games dating back to last season, Alldredge has amassed 126 tackles, including 21.5 for loss.

A FINE CAREER COMES TO A CLOSE

North Texas senior QB Mason Fine played his final game in a Mean Green uniform on Nov. 30 vs. UAB and will leave the school owning virtually every passing record, including:
