2018 MAKERS WANTED BAHAMAS BOWL: The 2018 Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl features FIU (8-4) from Conference USA and Toledo (7-5) from the Mid-American Conference. The game will be played Friday, Dec. 21 (12:30 p.m. ET) in Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium (15,000). The game will be televised on ESPN (Steve Levy - play by play; analyst Desmond Howard; sideline reporter Laura Rutledge) and carried on the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl Radio Network (Kyle Wiggs - play by play; color analyst Rob Best).

TICKETS: Tickets to the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl are \$50 through the ticket departments of the two participating institutions. Local tickets for the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl are available through the Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium box office.

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MAKERS WANTED BAHAMAS BOWL STORYLINES

2018 MATCHUP

For the fifth consecutive year, the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl features a Conference USA vs. Mid-American matchup as the FIU Panthers (8-4, 6-2 C-USA) takes on the Toledo Rockets (7-5, 5-3 MAC). The Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl series is tied 2-2, as WKU (C-USA) won the 2014 title with a thrilling 49-48 victory over Central Michigan, Western Michigan (MAC) captured the 2015 bowl with a 45-31 victory over Middle Tennessee, Old Dominion held off Eastern Michigan 24-20 in the 2016 game and Ohio beat UAB 41-6 last year. This is the third time that FIU and Toledo have met, and the second time in a bowl game. FIU leads the all-time series 2-1, with the last meeting coming in the 2010 Little Caesars Pizza Bowl in Detroit, a game FIU won 34-32 in the Panthers' first-ever bowl appearance.

NEW TITLE SPONSOR - MAKERS WANTED

Elk Grove Village, Illinois, using its business slogan – **Makers Wanted** – was announced July 31 as the title sponsor of the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl. The tagline Makers Wanted is Elk Grove Village's slogan and serves a call-to-action for a thriving community and the thousands of businesses based there. It is home to the largest contiguous industrial park in the United States, featuring six square miles and 62 million square feet of inventory. Over 5,614 businesses, including 300 manufacturers specializing in metal, plastic, rubber and food manufacturing, call Elk Grove Village their home. 15 COMBINED VICTORIES

The **15** combined victories by FIU (eight) and Toledo (seven) was one shy of tying the most coming into the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl. Every team that has participated in the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl has had at least seven victories coming into the game.

BOTH TEAMS LIGHT UP THE SCOREBOARD

Toledo has scored 50 or more points a school-record six times in 2018, while FIU scored 40 or more in four games. In the first four years of the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl, there have been **264** points scored, eighth-most among all bowl games played from 2014-17.

MORGAN FIRST NEWCOMER OF THE YEAR PLAYING IN MAKERS WANTED BAHAMAS BOWL

FIU junior quarterback **James Morgan** was named Conference USA Newcomer of the Year. Morgan is a graduate transfer who became the fifth passer to win the C-USA award in the last six seasons. Morgan started every game under center for the Panthers, throwing for a school-record 26 passing touchdowns and 2,764 yards, which ranks second in a single season at FIU. He is the first C-USA Newcomer of the Year to play in the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl.

TOLEDO KNOWS BOWLS

Toledo is making their eighth bowl appearance in the past nine years as the Rockets play in this year's Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl. This will be Toledo's 18th all-time bowl appearance. The Rockets have an all-time bowl record of 11-6 in previous bowls.

FOURTH TIME BOWLING FOR PANTHERS

FIU is making their fourth all-time bowl appearance, as the Panthers play in the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl. FIU is 1-2 in its previous three bowl games, and the victory was in the 2010 Little Caesars Pizza Bowl over Toledo 34-32, in the Panthers first-ever bowl game.

LOTS OF HONORS

FIU earned a school-record 17 C-USA selections, with two first team, two second team and 13 honorable mention members. The pair of first teamers earned for FIU is the most for any Panther team since 2015. The junior duo of **Sage Lewis** and **Maurice Alexander** highlighted the C-USA First Team list for FIU. Lewis earned a school-record 126 tackles in 2018, while Alexander

was electric in the punt return game after averaging a league-best 13.6 yards per return. FIU also earned an individual award as junior quarterback **James Morgan** was the league's Newcomer of the Year.

Toledo earned 10 All-MAC selections, including three first-team nods, two second-team honors and four third-team selections. Rockets junior wide receiver **Diontae Johnson** was one of eight to earn all-conference honors and, for the second straight season, he did so at three different positions: wide receiver (first-team), punt returner (first-team), and kickoff returner (second-team). Senior wide receiver **Cody Thompson** was also named a first-team selection. Toledo also earned an individual award as Johnson was the MAC Special Teams Player of the Year.

BAHAMAS STATE OF MIND

FIU is the first team from the state of Florida to play in the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl. FIU (Florida) represents the fifth state from C-USA joining UAB (Alabama), WKU (Kentucky), Middle Tennessee and Old Dominion (Virginia). For the MAC, Toledo is the second-straight team from Ohio to participate in the bowl (Ohio, 2017). In the first three years, teams from the state of Michigan (Central Michigan, Western Michigan and Eastern Michigan) represented the MAC.

THE PRIME MINISTER'S TROPHY

The Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl renamed its championship trophy to the Prime Minister's Trophy in 2016, in honor of the highest elected office in the Bahamas. A new championship trophy makes its debut in 2018. Designed and manufactured by Levy Marketing & Awards of Tampa, Fla. (who designed the original trophy that was used from 2014-16), the Prime Minister's Trophy stands 30 inches tall and weighs nearly 30 pounds. The media attending the bowl select an Offensive and Defensive Player of the Game.

BOWL GAMES ARE BETTER IN THE BAHAMAS

The Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl is the first FBS bowl game played outside of the U.S. or Canada since the 1937 Bacardi Bowl in Havana, Cuba (Jan. 1, 1937), a 7-7 tie between Auburn and Villanova. The last international bowl game outside the U.S. before the Bahamas Bowl was the 2010 International Bowl in Toronto, won by South Florida 27-3 over Northern Illinois.

UNI-WATCH

Toledo is the designated home team and will wear gold helmets with the Rocket logo on the sides, midnight blue jerseys with gold numerals and midnight blue pants. FIU, as the visitor, will wear white helmets with the Panther logo on the sides, white jerseys with blue numerals and white pants.


Both teams will wear the traditional Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl patch on the jerseys. For the third-straight year, both teams will also wear flag stickers of the United States and the Bahamas on the rear of the helmets in a nod to the host country.

Nassau & Paradise Island

With the lure of a big city and the ease of a tropical utopia, Nassau & Paradise Island are considered by many as, well, paradise. Nassau, the capital of The Bahamas, is a bustling metropolitan hub full of culture and modern amenities. To the north lies Paradise Island. Its name tells you everything. It's 685 acres of pure euphoria, developed almost exclusively to delight and accommodate visitors. The island boasts resorts, hotels, restaurants, shops, nightlife, a golf course, aquarium and a casino.

Nassau, the capital city of The Bahamas, is located on 21-mile-long New Providence, the Bahamas' 11th-largest island. Nassau's main harbor is protected by Paradise Island. The harbor attracted settlers in the early days, particularly pirates. In fact, Nassau's population consisted mainly of pirates until 1718, when The Bahamas first Royal Governor, Woodes Rogers expelled them, restored order and built Fort Nassau. The Bahamas for centuries adopted Rogers' motto, "Expulsis Piratis, Restituta Commercia," which means, "Pirates Expelled, Commerce Restored." Now, 246,000 people call New Providence Island home, with a large portion of them residing in Nassau.

Junkanoo, a Bahamian national festival, is a kaleidoscope of colors and sound. The rhythmic sounds of cowbells, goat skin drums and whistles, accompanied by an array of brass instruments, create a sweet musical beat that will move you; while brilliantly colored costumes capture your eye, and bring much visual delight. This bi-annual cultural highlight takes place on Bay Street in New Providence and other Family Islands during the early morning hours, from 1-9 am on Boxing Day (the day after Christmas) and New Year's Morning.

GAMEDAY MEDIA TRIBUNE/MEDIA BOOTHS/MEDIA CENTER: Entrance into the Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium Media Tribune and Media Center is by credential only for the news media and communications staff. POSTGAME INTERVIEW POLICY: Following a 10-minute cooling-off period, postgame interviews will take place in the Media Center in the Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium. Only individuals displaying proper credentials will be permitted in the interview area. Security will be posted in these locations and will not allow anyone to obstruct entrances. The runner-up head coach and two student-athletes will go first, followed by the winning institution's head coach and three student-athletes. The game's Offensive and Defensive Players of the Game are required to attend as part of their team's student-athlete contingent. The Prime Minister's Trophy will be presented to the championship team along with awards to the offensive and defensive players of the game on field immediately following the game.

The cooling-off period for the runner-up team begins when the head coach enters the locker room immediately after the game. The winning head coach and student-athletes must proceed directly from the field to the interview room after the postgame trophy presentation unless requested for a short interview (not to exceed four minutes) by ESPN. Both teams' locker rooms are closed to the media.

Regardless of any personal regular-season radio or television contracts, the coach is first obligated to the entire media staffing the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl and must report to the interview room immediately after the 10-minute cooling off period. The coach cannot delay a postgame interview with the covering media to conduct a program for a single radio, newspaper, or television reporter unless requested to grant a short interview (not to exceed four minutes) by ESPN. After fulfilling the commitment to the entire media covering the game, the coach and student-athletes may participate in special interviews.

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HELPFUL HINTS FOR THE MEDIA

PASSPORTS: The Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl reminds all media that all U.S. citizens coming to the Bowl must have a valid United States Passport for the time of travel. It is possible to secure passports on short notice, but costs will be much higher for the individuals involved and delays in receiving passports are possible during the holiday season. For information on how to obtain a U.S. Passport, visit **passports.state.gov**. For obtaining an expedited passport in a hurry, visit **travel.state.gov/content/travel/en/passports/apply-renew-passport/hurry.html**.

UNITED STATES EMBASSY: The United States Embassy in the Bahamas is located at **42 Queen Street** in Nassau. The American Citizen Services Unit stands ready to help American citizens in The Bahamas – and their loved ones – in emergency situations. American citizens overseas, of course, remain subject to the laws of the country they are in. The American Citizens Services Unit can assist in areas, including: illness/injury, lost/stolen U.S. Passport, arrest/detention, victims of crime, etc.

In case of emergencies involving the death, injury, welfare, or arrest of an American citizen in The Bahamas, please call **242-322-1181**, ext. 1 during business hours (8 a.m.-5 p.m., Monday-Thursday; 8 a.m.-3:30 p.m., Friday), or **242-322-1181**, ext 43111 at all other times. (Please note that the Duty Officer who answers this number will not be able to assist with visa or routine passport matters.) The U.S. Embassy website is **bs.usembassy.gov**.

CELL PHONES/INTERNET: The Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl staff reminds media that cell phone roaming rates for voice and data usage in the Bahamas can be extremely high per minute. All participants should check with their cell-phone service provider for pertinent information on current international/roaming rates. Phones can be used in "Airplane Mode" in the Bahamas (no data usage) in order to use phone cameras, etc. Atlantis Bahamas has WiFi in rooms (free)/some public areas (daily fee if not staying at Atlantis). Calling cards for public phones located in the resort can be purchased at the Atlantis. You can also use apps like Facebook Messenger, WhatsApp, etc. while using WiFi.

CURRENCY: The legal tender is the Bahamian dollar, which is equivalent to the U.S. dollar. U.S. currency is accepted throughout the Bahamas, as are most major credit cards and traveler's checks. ATMs are located at both Paradise Island and Cable Beach casinos, Rawson Square, major banks and in most hotels.

ELECTRICITY: With standard North American 120-volt/60-cycle AC electrical current, you will be able to operate American laptops, electronics, hairdryers, shavers and other small electrical appliances without adapters.

GETTING AROUND: From the Lynden Pindling International Airport, taxi rates are approximately \$32 to downtown Nassau, \$22 to Cable Beach and \$38 to Paradise Island (plus the \$2 bridge toll to PI) - based on two passengers (extra bags/passengers will cost more). Taxi service is available from the Atlantis to take you into Nassau to visit tourist areas, restaurants, etc. Shared van rides into downtown Nassau from the Atlantis run \$5 per person (you will be dropped off in downtown Nassau near the Government House), while solo taxi rides run \$13 to downtown with higher rates outside the downtown zone. Unshared rides from downtown Nassau back to the Atlantis are \$13 per person (not including the \$2 bridge toll for taxis to get back to Paradise Island).

Ferry boats (water taxis) can take you between Nassau and Paradise Island while at the same time giving you a waterfront view of Nassau Harbour. Tickets can be purchased at the tour desk at Festival Place and at Woodes Rogers Wharf right next door. Tickets cost \$6 per person (plus a suggested \$1 tip for the storyteller who usually accompanies the ride) and the trip is approximately 10 minutes each way. Ferries leave every half hour on the hour from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

City buses, known locally as "jitneys", run in downtown Nassau and Cable Beach several times a day. The cost for a one-way ride is \$1.50 per person, and exact change is required. Pay as you exit the bus.

TIPPING: Restaurants and hotels **automatically add 15%** to all food and beverage checks in lieu of gratuity. For exceptional service you may wish to leave something extra. Bellboys, doormen and porters usually receive \$3 per bag. Taxi drivers should be tipped about 15% of the fare.

CUSTOMS: U.S. citizens out of the country for 48 hours are allowed up to \$800 worth of duty-free merchandise. Less than 48 hours, the duty-free exemption is \$200. Limitations include 32 ounces of tobacco for those over 21 and no more than two liters of alcohol. To make traveling easier, consider packing things you're going to declare separately and keep all your sales receipts.

MEDICAL FACILITIES: Internationally trained doctors are available at the hotels and throughout the Nassau Paradise Island. Two hospitals are fully equipped to respond to emergency medical situations. Princess Margaret Hospital (public) and Doctor's Hospital (private) are both located in Nassau.

Go north on US Departures Rd. (0.2 miles), at the roundabout, take first exit onto Windsor Field Rd. (0.4 miles), go through one roundabout (0.4 miles) and stay on Windsor Field Rd., at the next roundabout (0.7 miles), take the first exit to John F. Kennedy Drive and go through two roundabouts, at the third roundabout (4.3 miles), take the first exit onto Prospect Ridge Rd., at the next roundabout (0.8 miles), take the first exit onto West Bay St., continue on West Bay St. (1.9 miles), at the next roundabout, continue on West Bay St. (1.1 miles), turn left onto Marlborough St. (0.1 miles), road becomes Navy Lion Rd. (213 feet), turn right onto Bay St. (1.2 miles), turn left and cross the Sir Sidney Poitier Bridge (0.5 miles), take first right onto Paradise Beach Rd., at the roundabout (0.1 miles), take the first exit and continue (0.2 miles), Atlantis Resort will be on the left.

Honorary Ambassador

Ed Smith, who was a college All-American, the first native Bahamian drafted by an NFL club and played two seasons for the Denver Broncos, is the 2018 Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl Honorary Ambassador.

Smith assisted with the bowl's annual Youth Football Clinic on December 19 and will be recognized by the bowl during today's game.

"I am looking forward to serve as the Honorary Ambassador for the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl this year," said Smith. "Football has come a long way, and the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl is a stepping stone for the growth of the game in the Bahamas. There is so much potential for the game of football to continue to grow in the Bahamas, and the bowl and the youth football clinic encourages more kids to enjoy and partake in the game. The speed and athleticism that Bahamian athletes naturally possess can't be taught, but the other skills needed in the game can, so they can have opportunities to play the game at higher levels."

A native of Nassau, Smith went to school at St. Augustine's College, where he was a multi-sport athlete for The Big Red Machine. He moved to the United States in 1965 at age 15 and attended Denver's George Washington High School, where he began to play football competitively. He became a three-year starter at defensive end at nearby Colorado College, and he was selected by the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) as a 1972 College Division I Kodak All-American.





Smith was selected in the 13th round (No. 319 overall) of the 1973 NFL Draft by the Broncos.

The 6-5, 241-pound defensive end played in five games in his rookie season, and he made his first NFL tackle against the Cincinnati Bengals in the 1973 season opener.

In 1974, Smith saw action in 13 games with three starts as he played on the defense alongside a pair of future Broncos Ring of Honor members in Randy Gradishar and Tom Jackson with Lyle Alzado, who would all be cornerstones of the Broncos late-1970s famed Orange Crush units. During that season, he got his first NFL interception.

Smith tore a knee ligament just prior to the 1975 season opener, which effectively ended his pro football career. He officially retired from the NFL before the 1977 season.

Smith was inducted into the Colorado College Athletic Hall of Fame in 2003, and he was also inducted

into the Bahamas National Sports Hall of Fame in 2009.

Smith's son, Alex, followed in his footsteps as he played in the NFL for 11 seasons (2005-15) as a tight end with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Philadelphia Eagles, Cleveland Browns, Cincinnati Bengals and Washington Redskins.

The Smiths regularly held summer clinics for local Bahamian football players seeking scholarship opportunities in the United States while Alex was an active NFL player.

2014 POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL: WKU 49, CENTRAL MICHIGAN 48 (DEC. 24, 2014)

WKU survived a furious Central Michigan fourth-quarter comeback, which included a 75-yard last-gasp relay play for a touchdown as time expired, but a broken-up 2-point conversion attempt following the improbable TD gave the Hilltoppers a 49-48 victory and the inaugural Popeyes Bahamas Bowl title.

The four-person relay by the Chippewas was an immediate hit on ESPN and social media. The final TD was named the play of the bowl season by ESPN's SportsCenter and was a finalist for a Best Play ESPY.

WKU (8-6) finally put an end to Central Michigan's 34-point fourth quarter with a defensive stop in the back corner of the end zone.

Trailing 49-42 with one second remaining, the Central Michigan offense lined up for one final prayer from its 25 that was answered.

Quarterback **Cooper Rush** heaved one last gasp pass 47 yards down the field where it was caught by Jesse Kroll at the Hilltoppers 28. Then chaos ensued. After laterals from Kroll, **Deon Butler** and **Courtney Williams**, **Titus Davis** raced 15 yards, dove and grazed the pylon – launching the crowd into pandemonium.

With the WKU lead trimmed to an unimaginably thin 49-48, the Chippewas (7-6) threw caution to the wind and tried for a 2-point conversion in hopes of winning the game. Rush threw for Kroll, but WKU defensive back **Wonderful Terry** broke up the fade-route pass to give WKU its first FBS bowl victory in school history under first-year head coach Jeff Brohm.

CMU head coach **Dan Enos** discussed the decision to go for two and the victory. "We didn't want to go to overtime because we had had trouble stopping them all day," explained Enos. "I looked at the players and said, 'What do you got?' and they said, 'Let's do it. Let's win this game."

Popeyes Bahamas Bowl Player of the Game honors went to WKU's **Brandon Doughty** (offense) and WKU defensive end **Derik Overstreet** (defense). Doughty threw for 486 yards, 350 in the first half with five touchdowns, all to different receivers. Overstreet recorded five tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss that included two second-half sacks.

Before the nightmarish fourth quarter, the Hilltoppers played as crisp and dominant a game as they had all season long.

Doughty threw five touchdown passes in the first half to Jared Dangerfield, Joel German, Antwane Grant, Mitchell Henry and Willie McNeal to go with a rushing TD from Leon Allen as WKU scored on each of their six first-half possessions against the MAC's top defense for a 42-14 halftime lead. Rush also threw for a pair of scores to Davis and Williams in the half.

That Hilltopper advantage was extended to 49-14 after Allen scored on a 21-yard run midway through the third quarter.

The fourth quarter was a different story, as Rush connected with Davis for touchdowns twice to cut WKU's lead to 49-28. Then defensive end **Joe Ostman** flipped a 52-yard completion to WKU's McNeal inside out by forcing a fumble at the Central Michigan 13, which was recovered by Chippewas corner **Tony Annese**. Annese returned the fumble back to the CMU 36, and from there, Central Michigan marched down the field to score on a Rush TD pass to Williams to trail by 14.

WKU was forced to punt on their ensuing possession, and a four-play, 55-second drive capped by a 7-yard TD strike from Rush to **Anthony Garland** with 1:09 left gave Central Michigan hope.

WKU successfully recovered the CMU onside kick after the score and milked the clock before being forced to punt, which set up the final frenzied play for the Chippewas that left the stadium breathless and WKU in possession of the inaugural Popeyes Bahamas Bowl trophy.

Rush set FBS bowl records for touchdown passes with seven and most net passing yards with 255 in the fourth quarter alone. The combined 971 passing yards and 12 TD passes for Doughty and Rush also broke FBS two-team bowl records.

2015 POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL: WESTERN MICHIGAN 45, MIDDLE TENNESSEE 31 (DEC. 24, 2015)

Jamauri Bogan rushed 19 times for a career-high 215 yards and four touchdowns to power Western Michigan to a 45-31 victory over Middle Tennessee in the 2015 Popeyes Bahamas Bowl.

It was one big play after another in the contest, as the two teams combined for 1,055 yards of total offense and seven scoring plays of 29 or more vards.

But it was a pair of 1-yard plunges just 1:12 apart in the fourth quarter by the redshirt freshman Bogan that made the difference.

After his 61-yard run set Western Michigan (8-5) up in the red zone, Bogan banged in from a yard out with 6:12 left in the game to give the Broncos a 38-31 advantage.

Three plays later, safety **Rontavious Atkins** intercepted MTSU quarterback **Brent Stockstill** and returned the ball 29 yards to the 4-yard line. It took two runs for Bogan to find the end zone, gaining three yards on first down before finding paydirt on second down with 5:00 left to play.

The Bronco defense held on downs on Middle Tennessee's ensuing possession and the WMU offense ran out the clock to seal the victory.

"This is what 'Row the Boat' is all about," WMU head coach **P.J. Fleck** said. "This is why it was invented. This is what it's for. There was all types of adversity in that football game that our kids could have given up, could have folded. Two years ago, we probably would have. Last year, we would have done it some of the time. This year, no way."

Bogan was named the Offensive Player of the Game of the game for his efforts, while WMU linebacker **Grant DePalma** was named the game's Defensive Player of the Game. DePalma led all tacklers with 12 stops (five solo) and a tackle for loss.

WMU quarterback **Zach Terrell** was 18-of-26 passing for 297 yards and a pair of touchdowns. **Corey Davis** caught eight balls for 183 yards and a TD.

Stockstill had a solid day for Middle Tennessee (7-6), completing 26-of-39 passes for 327 yards and three scores to lead the Blue Raider offens. His top target was **James Richie**, who caught eight passes for 126 yards and two scores and ran twice for 61 yards and a third touchdown.

The two teams combined for 475 yards of total offense and 34 points in the first quarter.

It took MTSU only 1:17 to get on the board when James scored the first of his three touchdowns on a 46-yard run to quickly make it 7-0.

Bogan answered just three plays later, running up the middle for 62 yards and a TD, and it was 7-7 with only 2:17 gone in the contest.

Stockstill hit James on a 44-yard scoring pass just 1:39 later to put Middle Tennessee back on top 14-7.

Andrew Haldeman drilled a 47-yard field goal with 3:23 left in the first quarter to pull Western Michigan within 14-10.

Cody Clark kicked a 23-yard field goal on the Blue Raiders' next possession to extend the lead to 17-10 with 1:04 left in the quarter.

The Broncos quickly tied the game at 17-all when Terrell hit Davis on an 80-yard pass and run with three seconds left in the opening quarter. Davis caught the ball on a 5-yard hitch pattern, broke a tackle and raced the remaining 75 yards down the sideline for the score.

WMU struck quickly in the second half on another 46-yard run by Bogan to go up 24-17 with 2:57 gone.

After a short punt set MTSU up at the Western Michigan 32-yard line, it took just two plays for the Blue Raiders to tie the game. Stockstill hit **Christian Collis** on a 17-yard pass with 28 seconds left in the third quarter to tie the game at 24-24.

Terrell hit Braverman on a 68-yard scoring pass to put WMU back on top 31-24 with 12:47 to play in the game.

Again, MTSU answered when Stockstill hit James on a 29-yard pass with 9:41 left in the game to tie it at 31-31.

Western Michigan finished the day with an impressive 613 yards of total offense, and the Broncos, second in FBS in time of possession, held the ball for nearly 35 minutes.

2016 POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL: OLD DOMINION 24, EASTERN MICHIGAN 20 (DEC. 23, 2016)

Old Dominion, making the school's first bowl appearance since the football program restarted in 2009, held off Eastern Michigan 24-20 to win the 2016 Popeyes Bahamas Bowl.

"I just want to say how excited we are to win the game, but number two how grateful we are for how we were treated this week by everybody associated with the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl – all the wonderful people we met," ODU head coach **Bobby Wilder** said. "This was a life-changing experience. We made memories to last a lifetime, and to win the game makes it that much more special."

Led by Offensive Player of the Game running back **Ray Lawry** and his 133 rushing yards, the Monarchs (10-3) left the Bahamas with a six-game win streak and their first bowl trophy. Quarterback **David Washington** added 188 passing yards and three touchdowns for ODU.

"He's really good, obviously tough to tackle," EMU head coach **Chris Creighton** said of Lawry. "We've become a pretty good tackling team, and I think today, he had a lot to do with several missed tackles. Their running game obviously didn't trip today."

Eastern Michigan quarterback **Brogan Roback** did all he could to keep the Eagles (7-6) in the game, throwing for 300 yards and two second-half touchdowns, but it was not enough to help EMU to a title in their first bowl game in 29 years.

Eastern Michigan dominated the time of possession, holding the ball 32:30 to the Monarchs' 27:30, and converted on a season-high 13 third-downs, but it was the Old Dominion defense that made one final stand late in the fourth quarter.

ODU senior linebacker **TJ Ricks** was named Defensive Player of the Game after finishing with nine tackles, including one for a loss.

"The defense ... we just came to the sideline and talked to each other and just told each other to trust each other," Ricks said of the entire ODU defensive performance. "You're our 1/11th on the field. If one guy does his job, and everybody else does their job, we'll be good on defense."

Through the first 30 minutes, Old Dominion was the only team able to put points on the board, holding a 10-0 lead at the half.

ODU scored first when **Brad Davis** connected on a 34-yard field goal for a 3-0 lead with 7:43 remaining in the first quarter. The 16-play, 58-yard drive appeared to stall at midfield when the Monarchs faced a fourth-and-two situation. Wilder dialed up a fake punt, calling a direct snap to running back **Jeremy Cox**, who drove the ball three yards for the first down.

Old Dominion extended its lead to 10-0 behind a 47-yard touchdown pass from Washington to **Zach Pascal**. The six-play, 80-yard drive began with **Anthony Wilson** picking off Roback in the end zone for a touchback, and the drive took just 2:23.

After receiving the kickoff to start the second half, Roback put the Eagles on the board, driving his team 76 yards in 2:50, capped off by a five-yard strike to wide receiver **Sergio Bailey** to cut the Old Dominion lead to 10-7.

It didn't take long for the Monarchs to respond, as Washington found **Travis Fulgham** downfield for a 31-yard touchdown with no defender in sight to push the ODU lead to 17-7 with 9:50 remaining in the third quarter.

Roback hit **Johnnie Niupalau** for a five-yard touchdown pass, capitalizing on another quick drive to pull to 17-14 with 7:25 left in the third quarter.

A 24-yard field goal by Eastern Michigan's **Paul Fricano** with 12 seconds remaining in the third tied the game at 17-17.

Opening the fourth quarter, Washington drove Old Dominion 72 yards in 2:09 to put the Monarchs back on top 24-17 after hitting **Jonathan Duhart** on a five-yard TD pass in the corner of the end zone – his third passing touchdown of the game.

Fricano connected on a 19-yard field goal with 9:08 to play to cut the Monarchs lead to 24-20.

The Eagles had a chance late, driving the ball to midfield, but couldn't keep their drive going, punting the ball back to Old Dominion. ODU ran out the final 5:21 to secure the victory.

Linebacker Kyle Rachwal led the Eagles defense with eight tackles.

2017 BAHAMAS BOWL: OHIO 41, UAB 6 (DEC. 22, 2017)

Dorian Brown tied a Bahamas Bowl record with four touchdown runs to lead Ohio to a 41-6 victory over UAB in the 2017 Bahamas Bowl at Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium.

The Bobcats (9-4) posted their first bowl game win since 2012 and the third bowl game win in the history of the Ohio program.

The Blazers, who reinstated their football program this year after a two-year hiatus, finished with an 8-5 record.

Ohio swept the postgame awards as Brown was named the Offensive Player of the Game and safety **Javon Hagan** was named the Defensive Player of the Game.

Brown scored on runs of 74, 9, 25 and 14 yards and ended the day with 152 yards rushing on just 12 carries. Hagan had a game-high nine tackles (six solo) and a forced fumble to lead the stout Ohio defense.

"It was a great win," Ohio head coach **Frank Solich** said. "We certainly appreciate all this team has been about – the way they've gone through the season, the way they started to prepare for the Bahamas Bowl at home and then continue the preparation here. To end up playing a very, very good football game, I couldn't be any more pleased. I feel like eight wins were not enough with this football team, so this ninth win puts a little icing on the cake."

The Bobcats scored on their opening possession, marching 75 yards in 11 plays. **Nathan Rourke** hit **D.L. Knock** on a 2-yard touchdown pass with 6:41 gone in the contest.

Rourke then hit **Papi White** on a 56-yard TD strike on Ohio's second possession with 3:40 left in the first quarter. White led all receivers in the contest with four catches for 106 yards and a score. Ohio missed the PAT as the Bobcats led 13-0.

Ohio made it 20-0 when Brown raced 74 yards for his first touchdown of the day with 12:26 left in the first half.

UAB got on the board with a 34-yard field goal by **Nick Vogel** to pull within 20-3 at the 7:28 mark of the second quarter.

Brown got his second touchdown of the game on an 9-yard run with 1:17 left in the first half. **Louie Zervos** made the PAT, and Ohio's lead was 27.3 at intermission.

UAB took the second-half kickoff, marched 83 yards in 11 plays and converted on a 25-yard field goal by Vogel to pull within 27-6 with 10:46 left in the third quarter.

After a 34-yard punt return by **Kylan Nelson** gave OU the ball at the UAB 25, Brown raced in on the next play to make it 34-6 with 7:45 to play in the third period.

Brown's fourth and final score of the day was a 14-yard scamper with 4:05 left in the third to wrap up the scoring.

"I missed two games last time we played," Brown said. "It actually motivated me. I give a lot of props to the O-line as well, because they did a tremendous job blocking and making it easy for me to run the ball."

A.J. Erdely completed 24-of-45 passes for 254 yards for the Blazers. Rourke finished the day 12-of-18 passing for 185 yards and two touchdowns and ran three times for 30 yards to finish with 215 yards of total offense.

Ohio's **A.J. Ouellette** ran eight times for 26 yards, which put him over the 1,000-yard mark for the season at 1,006 yards in 13 games.

Ohio out-gained UAB 459-353 in total offense as the Bobcats evened the Bahamas Bowl series at 2-2 between the Mid-American Conference and Conference USA.

"This was not our day today," UAB head coach **Bill Clark** said. "But this won't take anything away from what this group has done. It was a historic year, our group has set the bar very high for the next UAB teams to come."

Defensively for UAB, **Anthony Rush** and **Tevin Crews** had a team-high seven tackles each.

"Being from Florida, it felt good to get the heat again because it's so cold in Ohio," Hagan said. "The food was fantastic. This bowl is just a great experience. It's definitely one of the best bowls I've experienced so far. The atmosphere, the water, the beach, the slides, it was just so fun. I felt like a little kid again."






pation in the Melbourne Olympics and before he could see the facility that bears his name in use.

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ESPN'S STEVE LEVY, DESMOND HOWARD & LAURA RUTLEDGE TO CALL 2018 MAKERS WANTED BAHAMAS BOWL

NASSAU, Bahamas – Veteran ESPN *SportsCenter* anchor and college football commentator **Steve Levy**, 1991 Heisman Trophy winner and Super Bowl XXXI MVP **Desmond Howard** and sideline reporter **Laura Rutledge** will call the 2018 Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl between FIU (8-4) and Toledo (7-5) for ESPN on Friday, Dec. 21 in Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium at 12:30 p.m. ET.

Levy has been ESPN's play-by-play voice for every game in the bowl's history. Howard (analyst) will work his second-straight assignment at the bowl (2017), and Rutledge (sideline) will work for the third time in the Bahamas (2014, 2017).

Steve Levy is one of ESPN's longest-running *SportsCenter* anchors, having joined the network in August 1993. He is most often seen on the 11 p.m. ET edition or other late-night shows, as well as on the *SportsCenter* program on the ESPN App. In addition to his *SportsCenter* duties, in 2016, Levy returned to the college football play-by-play booth to work a weekly ABC/ESPN afternoon game.

Levy has hosted *SportsCenter* from many of the biggest events in sports, including the Super Bowl, NBA Finals, Final Four, College Football Playoff and more. He and ESPN hockey analyst **Barry Melrose** have covered the Stanley Cup Finals for ESPN every year since 1995.

Along the way, he has also handled play-by-play on the NHL (1995–2005) on ESPN, ESPN2 and ABC Sports, college football on ESPN2 (1999–2002) and the NCAA Division I men's hockey semifinals and finals – "The Frozen Four" – in 1998 and '99. The versatile Levy has also served as the studio host for ESPN's NHL telecasts and co-hosted The NFL on ESPN Radio – previewing, reviewing and updating National Football League games all day on Sundays throughout the season. He and Melrose teamed to call ESPN's telecasts of the World Cup of Hockey in 2016.

Desmond Howard joined ESPN in 2005 as a college football analyst. The 1991 Heisman Trophy winner and Super Bowl XXXI MVP joined the network a few years after his remarkable 11 seasons in the NFL. He has been an analyst on the eight-time Emmy-Award winning *College GameDay*, the network's signature Saturday morning show originating from the site of one of the day's best games, since 2005 and also calls ESPN's mid-week games.

At Michigan from 1988-1991, Howard was the first receiver in Big Ten history to lead the conference in scoring as he set or tied five NCAA records and 12 single-season Michigan records. In 1991, the All-American won the Heisman by the second largest margin of victory in the trophy's history (85 percent of the vote). He was also awarded the Walter Camp Trophy and the Maxwell Award that year, finishing with 950 receiving yards and 19 touchdown passes. By the end of his college career, Howard had scored 37 touchdowns.

The Washington Redskins selected Howard fourth overall in the 1992 NFL Draft. Howard spent three years with Washington, then moved on to the Jacksonville Jaguars – with whom he scored the first game-winning touchdown in team history – the Green Bay Packers, Oakland Raiders and Detroit Lions. He was selected to the Pro Bowl in 2000 while playing with the Lions.

Howard had 92 receptions as a wide receiver in his first four years. His 870 punt return yards in a single season remain a NFL record. With a memorable postseason kickoff return of 99-yards in the 1997 Super Bowl, he became the first and only player on special teams to be named Super Bowl MVP. Also in 1996, Howard led the NFL in punt returns, punt return average and punt returns for touchdowns.

In 2011, Howard was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame.

Laura Rutledge joined ESPN's coverage of the Southeastern Conference in 2014 as a reporter on SEC Network and ESPN. She recently signed a multiyear contract extension in summer 2018.

Rutledge has expanded her portfolio at the network over the past year to include co-hosting *Get Up!*, regular stints as a *SportsCenter* anchor and a red carpet host at the *Home Depot College Football Awards* and the *ESPYs*. Rutledge finished her first year as *SEC Nation* host last fall and her second year with the show overall. She also contributes to ESPN and SEC Network's live-event programming for college football, basketball, gymnastics, baseball and softball. She was a mainstay in ESPN's extensive championship coverage surrounding the College Football Playoff, NCAA Women's Gymnastics Championships, and both the Women's College World Series and College World Series.

The 2018 Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl is the Panthers second-straight bowl appearance and FIU's fourth bowl appearance overall. Davis served as head coach at Miami (Fla.) from 1995-2000 and North Carolina from 2007-10. He was the NFL's Cleveland Browns head coach (2001-04) and an assistant coach for the Dallas Cowboys (1989-94), where he was part of back-to-back Super Bowl-winning teams (XXVII and XXVIII). Davis also was a college assistant coach at Miami (1984-88), where he was part of the Hurricanes' 1987 National Championship team, and Oklahoma State (1979-83).
- JASON CANDLE is in his third full season as a collegiate head coach (all at Toledo), and he has a 28-12 career record. The 2018 Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl is the Rockets' fifth-straight bowl appearance and Toledo's 11th bowl appearance overall. Candle was an assistant coach at Mount Union (2002-08) and Toledo (2009-15). He played wide receiver at Geneva College (1998-99) and Mount Union (2000-01).







C-USA BOWL INFORMATION

C-USA SENDING SIX TEAMS TO BOWLS

Conference USA will be sending six schools to play in bowl games this holiday season. C-USA Champion UAB leads the group of six, joined in the postseason by East Champion Middle Tennessee, FIU, Louisiana Tech, Marshall and North Texas.

UAB enters postseason play with a school-record 10 wins when it represents C-USA in the Cheribundi Boca Raton Bowl in Boca Raton, Florida. The Blazers will face Mid-American Conference Champion Northern Illinois in the fifth annual game, which kicks off on Tuesday, Dec. 18 at 7 p.m. EST/6 p.m. CST on ESPN. This will be the first time in school history that UAB will be making back-to-back bowl appearances. The Boca Raton Bowl is one of just three bowls that match conference champions this bowl season.

Middle Tennessee will make its fourth consecutive bowl appearance when it plays in the R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl. The Blue Raiders will face Sun Belt Conference Champion Appalachian State on Saturday, Dec. 15 at 9 p.m. EST/8 p.m. CST on ESPN. This will be the Blue Raiders first appearance in the New Orleans Bowl since 2009.

FIU will make its second straight bowl appearance under head coach **Butch Davis** with an appearance in the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl in Nassau on Friday, Dec. 21 (12:30 p.m. EST/11:30 a.m. CST). This will be the fourth bowl trip in Panthers history and the second time that it will face Toledo in the postseason (FIU defeated Toledo, 34-32, in the 2010 Little Caesars Pizza Bowl). A Panthers victory would set an FIU single-season program record for victories.

Louisiana Tech will be in a bowl game for the fifth straight season when it participates in the SoFi Hawai'i Bowl on Saturday, Dec. 22 at 10:30 p.m. EST/9:30 p.m. CST on ESPN). The Bulldogs, who are one of four FBS programs to have bowl wins the last four seasons will face home-standing Hawai'i in the game. C-USA teams have won six of their last seven games in the Hawai'i Bowl.

North Texas will kick off the 2018-19 bowl season when it faces Utah State in the New Mexico Bowl on Saturday, Dec. 15 at 2 p.m. EST/1 p.m. CST on ESPN. The Mean Green will be looking to match the school record for victories with 10, a figure last reached in 1977.

Marshall will represent C-USA in the Bad Boy Mowers Gasparilla Bowl on Thursday, Dec. 20 at 8 p.m. EST/7 p.m. CST on ESPN. The Tampa Bay area bowl will play its game at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa for this first time, a venue that happens to be the home stadium for the Thundering Herd's opponent, South Florida. Marshall is 11-2 all-time in bowl games and this will be its third appearance in this bowl since 2011.

Conference USA is 26-16 (.619) over the past six years in bowl games, which included five straight winning seasons from 2013-17.

C-USA BOWL OPPONENT NOTES

NOTES ON C-USA BOWL OPPONENTS

*C-USA will face three of the top 20 FBS teams in scoring offense in bowl games: No. 3 Utah State, No. 11 Toledo and No. 20 Appalachian State.

*Conference USA joins the Pac-12 and SEC in playing multiple conference champions this bowl season. C-USA Championship Game participants UAB and Middle Tennessee will play the champs of the MAC (Northern Illinois) and Sun Belt (Appalachian State), respectively.

No. 23 UTAH STATE

*Utah State has already set school records this season with its 72 touchdowns and 566 points scored, bettering the previous marks of 60 touchdowns in 2011 and 454 points scored in 2012. The Mountain West record for points scored in a season is 608 by BYU in 2001.

*Utah State ranks among the top 20 teams in the nation in 19 statistical categories and leads the nation in three of those, including scoring drives under one minute (24), kickoff returns (29.68 yards per return) and passes intercepted (18)

*After leading USU to 44 wins and five bowls in six seasons, Matt Wells has accepted the Texas Tech head coaching job and co-Defensive Coordinator/Defensive Line coach Frank Maile will serve as the Aggies interim coach for the bowl game.

*Appalachian State is the only program with a bowl win in each of its first three eligible seasons after the complete transition to the FBS level.

*Head coach Scott Satterfield (51-24 in six seasons) was named head coach at Louisville on Dec. 4. Defensive line coach Mark Ivey will serve as the interim coach for

*The Mountaineers are sixth in the FBS in total defense, allowing 279.3 yards per game, and third in passing defense, surrendering 148.1 yards per game through the air. Only Mississippi State (5) has allowed less TD passes than Appalachian State (5). The Mountaineers allowed 10 points or less in seven games.

NORTHERN ILLINOIS

*Sophomore DE Sutton Smith is the 2018 Mid-American Conference Player of the Year and Defensive Player of the Year and was named one of four finalists for the Ted Hendricks Defensive End of the Year. Smith leads the FBS in sacks with 15 and is second in tackles for loss with 24.5.

*The NIU defense has been stout vs. the run this season, allowing just 2.7 yards per rush (tied for first in the country with Clemson and Michigan State) and just 107 yards per game on the ground (14th in the FBS).

*NIU appeared in the inaugural Boca Raton Bowl in 2014 after winning the MAC Championship, falling to C-USA Champion Marshall. The Huskies matchup with UAB this season makes the Boca Raton Bowl one of three bowls (Orange, Rose) to feature a matchup of conference champions.

SOUTH FLORIDA

*The Bulls opened the year at 7-0 but lost the final five games of the regular season. *USF starting QB Blake Barnett has missed two of the last three games battling ankle and shoulder injuries. Barnett, a transfer from Alabama, has thrown for 294.8 yards per game and 11 touchdowns, while rushing for 308 yards and eight scores.

*Jordan Cronkrite rushed for 1,095 yards this season, becoming just the fifth player in school history to reach the 1,000-yard mark.

*Toledo topped the 45-point mark in all seven of their victories, scoring 50 or more six times and topping the 60-point mark twice.

*Four different Rockets have returned punts for touchdowns this season, including Reggie Gilliam, who also has a talent for blocking kicks. He is currently the national leader in blocks, having tamped down four attempts this season.

*The Toledo defense ranks in the top 25 in both sacks and tackles for loss produced. The Rockets get to the quarterback an average of 2.8 times per game and pile up more than seven tackles for loss each outing.

HAWAI'I

*Junior WR John Ursua had an FBS-leading 16 TD catches. while ranking in the top 10 in receptions (89), receiving yards (1,343) and receiving yards per game (103.3). *Sophomore QB Cole McDonald is among the nation's leaders in six categories. His 3,790 passing yards is the ninth-best single-season total in program history while his 35 touchdown passes is tied for fifth-best.

*The Rainbow Warriors will be making their eighth appearance in the Hawai'i Bowl. UH has faced a C-USA team in the Hawai'i Bowl five times, posting a 3-2 record..

Dec. 15: Raycom Media Camellia Bowl – Montgomery, Ala., 5:30 pm ET (ESPN); Eastern Michigan (7-5, 5-3) vs. Georgia Southern (9-3, 6-2, Sun Belt)
Eastern Michigan closed the regular season by winning five consecutive MAC games, the program's best league winning streak since 1989. The Eagles finished in a tie for second in the MAC West with a 5-3 league record, 7-5 overall. Head coach Chris Creighton has the Eagles in their second bowl game in the last three years.

Dec. 18: Cheribundi Boca Raton Bowl – Boca Raton, Fla. 7:00 pm ET (ESPN) Northern Illinois (8-5, 6-2) vs. UAB (10-3, 7-1, Conference USA)

Northern Illinois won the 2018 Marathon MAC Football Championship Game with a 30-29 win over Buffalo. NIU is bowl eligible for the 10th time in the last 11 years. NIU had an eight-year consecutive bowl streak (2008-15) snapped in 2016. Last year NIU had a 36-14 loss to Duke in the 2017 Quick Lane Bowl. Six-year head coach Rod Carey is leading the Huskies to its 13th bowl appearance (4-8 record).

Dec. 19: DXL Frisco Bowl – Frisco, Texas 8:00 pm ET (ESPN)
Ohio (8-4, 6-2) vs. San Diego State (7-4, 4-4, Mountain West Conference)
Ohio ended the regular season second in the MAC East with a 6-2 league-record, 8-4 overall. Ohio head coach Frank Solich is in his 14th year leading the program and is the third-winningest head coach in MAC history (105-75 record). Last season Ohio defeated UAB 41-6 in the Bahamas Bowl. The Bobcats have been bowl eligible in 12 of the 14 years under Solich and will be making their 10th bowl appearance during his tenure. Ohio will be making its 12th bowl appearance.

Dec. 21: Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl – Nassau, Bahamas 12:30 pm ET (ESPN); Toledo (7-5, 5-3) vs. Florida International (8-4, 6-2, Conference USA) Toledo tied for second in the MAC West with a 5-3 league record, 7-5 overall. Third-year head coach Jason Candle will be leading the Rockets to his fourth-bowl game, Toledo will be making its fifth consecutive bowl appearance and its eighth bowl game in the last nine years. Toledo will be making its Conference leading 18th bowl appearance in program history (11-6 record in bowl games).

Dec. 21: Famous Idaho Potato Bowl – Boise, Ida. 4:00 pm ET (ESPN) Western Michigan (7-5, 5-3) vs. BYU (6-6, Independent)

Western Michigan finished in a tie for second place in the MAC West with a 5-3 league record, 7-5 overall. Second-year head coach Tim Lester has the Broncos bowl eligible for the fifth consecutive year. Western Michigan appeared in the 2014 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl; 2015 Popeyes Bahamas Bowl and the 2016 Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic.

Dec. 22: Dollar General Bowl – Mobile, Ala. 7:00 pm ET (ESPN) Buffalo (10-3, 7-1) vs. Troy (9-3, 7-1, Sun Belt Conference)
Buffalo suffered a 30-29 loss to NIU in the 2018 Marathon MAC Football Championship Game. Buffalo set a program record with its 10 wins in a single season since moving to FBS and joining the MAC in 1999. Fourth-year head coach Lance Leipold has the Bulls bowl eligible for the second consecutive year. Buffalo will be making its third bowl appearance in program history.

MAC Storylines

- Northern Illinois won the 2018 Marathon MAC Football Championship Game with a thrilling 30-29 win over Buffalo on Nov. 30. The win was NIU's first championship since 2014 and the fifth championship in program history (2018, 2014, 2012, 2011, 1983). The Huskies have been a model of consistency in winning as NIU has won the MAC West Division seven times in the last nine years and the Huskies have been bowl eligible for the 10th time in the last 11 years.
- Six MAC programs received bowl invitations this 2018 bowl season -- Northern Illinois (8-5), Buffalo (10-3), Ohio (8-4), Toledo (7-5), Western Michigan (7-5) and Eastern Michigan (7-5). The MAC record for bowl invitations in a single-season is seven in both the 2012 and 2015 bowl seasons. Miami (6-6) was one of four FBS teams to not receive a bowl invitation.
- Northern Illinois (Cheribundi Boca Raton Bowl), Buffalo (Dollar General Bowl), Ohio (DXL Frisco Bowl), Toledo (Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl), Western Michigan (Famous Idaho Potato Bowl) and Eastern Michigan (Raycom Media Camellia Bowl) will represent the MAC this 2018 bowl season.
- This marks the 11th time in MAC history to have five or more programs receive a bowl invitation (2004, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017 and 2018) in a single-season.
- In the previous seven bowl seasons, the MAC has a record of 12-28 in 40 bowl games 2017 (1-4); 2016 (0-6); 2015 (3-4); 2014 (2-3); 2013 (0-5); 2012 (2-5); 2011 (4-1) as all 12 MAC programs have appeared in a bowl game during this span (2011-17).
- Buffalo (10-3, 7-1 MAC) won the MAC East Division for the first time since 2008. Buffalo's 10 wins this year are the most since moving to FBS and joining the MAC in 1999. Buffalo is also bowl eligible for the second consecutive year. The Bulls will be making their third overall bowl game in program history.
- Over the last three seasons, the MAC had six different programs participate in the Marathon MAC Football Championship Game. In 2016 Western Michigan defeated Ohio, 29-23, while 2017 witnessed Toledo with a 45-28 win over Akron and this year NIU defeated Buffalo, 30-29.
- This year the MAC has eight FBS wins, including three wins over Big Ten opponents (Northwestern, Purdue and Rutgers).
- In MAC crossover games this season, the East and West Divisions tied 9-9 in 18 games. Over the previous 11 years (2008-2018), the MAC West has had the upper hand in crossover regular season games against the MAC East, winning the head-to-head regular season series in nine of the last 11 years. The West holds a 129-69 (.652%) regular season record in crossover games over the East during that span.

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MAC BOWL HISTORY

Since the conference inception in 1946, the MAC has played in 111 bowl games with a 43-68 (.387) overall bowl record. In the early years, bowl games were few and far between before the consistency of a single-bowl game became into existence in 1981. However, over the last decade the MAC has witnessed a significant increase in the number of bowl invitations both from primary and secondary bowl partnerships, but also several at-large bowl selections as well.

From 1946 to 1980, the MAC appeared in a total of 17 bowl games in the first 35 years of the Conference in operation. Then from 1981 to 2000, the MAC witnessed twenty consecutive years of receiving only one bowl invitation each football season.

The MAC forged a bowl partnership with Detroit from 1997-2013 (Motor City Bowl and Little Caesars Pizza Bowl). The MAC added Mobile in 2001 (GMAC Bowl, GoDaddy Bowl and now Dollar General Bowl) and Boise in 2010 (Humanitarian, now named Famous Idaho Potato Bowl) as primary bowl partners.

Beginning in 2004, the Conference witnessed increased bowl participation in atlarge selections as the 2004 bowl season witnessed five MAC programs receive a bowl invitation and that number was matched during the 2008, 2009, 2011, 2013 and 2014 bowl seasons. The Conference sent four programs to bowls in 2006 and 2010. The MAC set a Conference record with seven bowl invitations in both the 2012 and 2015 bowl seasons.

MAC Commissioner Dr. Jon Steinbrecher joined the Conference in 2009 and added Boise as a primary bowl partner in 2010, while adding secondary bowl agreements ranging from Gildan New Mexico; St. Petersburg and the Birmingham Bowl in order to provide MAC members the opportunity to represent the Conference and receive additional bowl invitations.

The 2012 bowl season witnessed the conference earn its first BCS Bowl invitation with Northern Illinois gaining a No. 15 BCS ranking and an invite to the Discover Orange Bowl to face Florida State.

In 2014, the MAC announced primary bowl partnerships with the newly created Raycom Media Camellia Bowl (Montgomery, Ala.), Bahamas Bowl (Nassau, Bahamas) and the Boca Raton Bowl (Boca Raton, Fla.). In addition, the MAC secured a secondary bowl partnership with the Quick Lane Bowl (Detroit) during this span.

In 2016, Western Michigan's invitation to the Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic to face Wisconsin on Jan. 2nd was the MAC's second New Year's Six Bowl Game appearance.

In the last seven bowl seasons, the MAC has a 12-28 overall bowl record in 40 bowl games -- 2017 (1-4); 2016 (0-6); 2015 (3-4); 2014 (2-3); 2013 (0-5); 2012 (2-5); 2011 (4-1). In 2011 the MAC won the ESPN Challenge Cup with a 4-1 record for the best FBS Conference record in bowl games.

NIU WINS MARATHON MAC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

Trailing by as many as 19 points late in the third quarter, Northern Illinois rallied to win the Marathon MAC Football Championship game over Buffalo, 30-29, on Nov. 30 at Ford Field. NIU took its first lead of the game with 1:09 to play as the Huskies captured their fourth MAC title in eight seasons.

NIU scored the final 20 points of the game, culminating in a 35-yard touch-down pass from quarterback Marcus Childers to wide recevier D.J. Brown as the Huskies completed the comeback. Childers finished 21-of-33 passing for a career high 300 yards and four touchdowns while also gaining 58 yards on 15 carries, and was named the game's Offensive MVP. NIU defensive end Sutton Smith was named the MAC Championship Game Defensive MVP after finishing with 10 tackles, including a pair of sacks and 3.5 tackles for loss.

Trailing 29-10 late in the third quarter, Childers hit Brown for their first touchdown connection of the night, a 28-yard score, as the Huskies pulled within a dozen with 17 seconds left in the third.

NIU's defense allowed only 46 yards in the fourth quarter, came up with a three-and-out to give the ball right back to the offense, which needed four plays to score. Spencer Tears hauled in a 32-yard touchdown pass from Childers as NIU cut the Buffalo lead to 29-24 with 12:51 to play.

The Huskies got the ball back with 3:20 to play at their own 30-yard line. Childers looked to Brown down the right side and hauled in a 35-yard score as NIU took its first lead, 30-29, with 1:09 to play. Needing to go 75 yards in 69 seconds, Buffalo picked up a pair of first downs and reached the NIU 41, but the Huskie defense forced four-straight incompletions as the Bulls turned the ball over on downs and NIU claimed its fifth MAC Championship.

MAC PROGRAMS WITH SUSTAINED FOOTBALL SUCCESS

Three MAC programs – NIU, Ohio and Toledo -- have sustained success over a 10 and 15-year period and currently rank among the FBS leaders in the MAC and college football, while a fourth program, Western Michigan, joins these MAC programs among the FBS leaders in college football and the MAC over the recent five-year period.

All four programs have been no stranger to college football's postseason bowl system. NIU (8-5) is bowl eligible for the 10th time in the last 11 years, while Ohio (8-4) is bowl eligible for the 10th consecutive year. Toledo (7-5) is bowl eligible for the ninth consecutive year, with eight bowl invitations. Western Michigan (7-5) has been bowl eligible in each of the last five straight years.

MYRTLE BEACH BOWL TO BEGIN IN 2020 BOWL SEASON

The MAC announced on Nov. 13 the creation of a newly created bowl game in Myrtle Beach, S.C. for a six-year period (2020-2025), which will be owned and operated by ESPN. The Myrtle Beach Bowl will be televised nationally on ESPN networks and will be played at Brooks Stadium, an open-air stadium opened in 2003 which seats nearly 21,000 fans on the campus of Coastal Carolina University.

The creation of the Myrtle Beach Bowl is an agreement with ESPN Events and the Mid-American Conference, Conference USA and the Sun Belt Conference, with each Conference participating in the bowl game four times during the six-year span. With the addition of the Myrtle Beach Bowl, the MAC has expanded its bowl opportunities during the next six-year cycle beginning in 2020. The MAC will have a minimum six guaranteed bowl opportunities.

Leipold is in his fourth season in leading the Buffalo program and led the Bulls to the Marathon MAC Football Championship Game for the first time since 2008. Leipold has led the program to its first-ever 10-win season since making the move to FBS and joining the MAC in 1999. Leipold has the Bulls bowl eligible for the second consecutive season as the program's win total has increased from two wins in 2016, six wins in 2017 and 10 wins in 2018.

Smith exploded on the college football scene in 2017 and led the nation in both sacks and tackles for loss as a sophomore as he earned consensus All-American status. Smith responded once again in 2018 as he has started in all 13 games and ranks first in the nation with 15.0 sacks and second in the country with 24.5 tackles for loss.

Jackson started all 13 games this season for Buffalo and led the Bulls offense with 2,857 yards passing and 27 touchdowns on his 205-372 passing for a 55.1 completion percentage. His 2,857 yards and 27 passing touchdowns both ranked first in the MAC.

Patterson led Buffalo and ranked fourth in the MAC with 946 yards rushing and his 13 touchdowns were tied for first in the league. Patterson appeared in all 13 games as a freshman and averaged 5.6 yards per carry and averaged 72.8 yards per game.

Johnson led the MAC in punt return average with 18.3 yards per return on 12 returns for 220 yards and one touchdown, an 83-yard punt return for a touchdown at Kent State on Nov. 15. Johnson also ranked second in the league with a 25.8 kickoff return average on his 16 returns for 412 yards and one touchdown, a 98-yard kickoff return for a score. For his career, Johnson has four returns for touchdowns – two punt returns and two kickoff returns.

2018 MAC ALL-AMERICAN HONORS

Since the conclusion of the regular season, the MAC has been represented with post-season All-American honors for Northern Illinois junior defensive end **Sutton Smith**. A native of St. Charles, Mo., Smith leads the FBS in sacks with a school-record 15 and is second in the country in tackles for loss with 24.5. Smith was named the MAC's 2018 Vern Smith Award winner as league MVP.

Smith led an NIU defense that set the school record for team sacks in a season with 50. In addition to his ability to stop opposing offenses, Smith, who earned MAC Defensive Player of the Year honors for the second-consecutive year, also scored a pair of touchdowns in 2018. His first came after he blocked his second punt of the year in NIU's win over Toledo, while his second, an 85-yard fumble return for a touchdown, came at Western Michigan. Smith ranks third on NIU's all-time sacks list with 30, while his 56 career tackles for loss ranks second to Larry English, who amassed 63 in his four-year career at NIU. English is also NIU's all-time sack leader with 31.5.

JIM McELWAIN NAMED CHIPPEWAS HEAD COACH

Central Michigan named Jim McElwain as the program's 29th head coach in program history on Dec. 2, 2018. McElwain comes to Mount Pleasant with nearly 30 years of coaching experience and was previously named the 2015 Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year and 2014 Mountain West Coach of the Year.

McElwain and Central Michigan Director of Athletics Michael Alford crossed paths at Alabama, where McElwain served as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach for the Crimson Tide from 2008-2011, winning two national titles.

McElwain's coaching highlights include:

- Led Florida to 19 wins and back-to-back SEC East titles during his first two seasons. Those titles made him the first coach in league history to reach the SEC Championship Game in his first two seasons as head coach. Just two other coaches reached the title game in their first season.
 - Led Colorado State to a 10-2 record in 2014.
- Coached 2009 Heisman Trophy winner Mark Ingram.
- Was wide receivers coach this year at the University of Michigan, helping them to a 10-2 record and a top 10 ranking.

BOWLING GREEN NAMES SCOT LOEFFLER HEAD COACH

Bowling Green Director of Athletics Bob Moosbrugger announced Scot Loeffler as the 20th head coach of the Bowling Green football program on Nov. 28. Loeffler comes to Bowling Green after serving as Deputy Head Coach and Offensive Coordinator at Boston College.

Loeffler's coaching career, which spans back to his time as a student assistant at Michigan during the 1996 season, includes stops at Michigan, Central Michigan, Florida, Temple, Auburn, Virginia Tech and Boston College. He also spent a year coaching quarterbacks for the Detroit Lions.

Loeffler has coached seven quarterbacks who went on to play in the NFL – Tom Brady, Tim Tebow, Brian Griese, Chad Henne, Drew Henson, John Navarre and Logan Thomas. He has also directed a potent rushing attack behind sophomore AJ Dillon, who is 12th nationally in rushing yards per game this year. Dillon was the ACC Rookie of the Year in 2017 and the nation's second-leading rusher among freshmen.

In 2018, Boston College scored 40+ points in four of its first five games, including an average of 52.7 points in consecutive wins over Massachusetts, Holy Cross and Wake Forest. The Eagles then defeated Temple 45-35 and Louisville 38-20. The team ended the regular season at 7-5 overall. Including 2018, Loeffler's teams will have played in 15 bowl games in the past 16 seasons he has been a college coach.

SCHARPING & THOMPSON HONORED BY CoSIDA

Northern Illinois senior offensive tackle **Max Scharping** was named First Team Google Cloud Academic All-American and Toledo senior wide receiver **Cody Thompson** was named Second Team by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

Scharping, who was a second team Academic All-American a year ago, is the first Huskie football player to be named to the organization's first team since Alan Baxter in 2012 and is just the third NIU football player to receive first team recognition, joining Thomas Hammock (2000 and 2001) and Baxter. He is the first Huskie to be recognized in back-to-back seasons since Hammock. A three-time First Team All-MAC performer who has started 52 consecutive games and helped lead NIU to the 2018 MAC Championship, Scharping will complete his master's degree in exercise physiology and fitness leadership. He earned his undergraduate degree in kinesiology with a 3.99 grade point average, and currently has a 3.89 mark in his master's coursework.

Thompson, who earned Academic All-District honors in 2017, graduated last year with a 3.66 GPA in marketing. He is currently pursuing his master's degree in recreation & leisure and holds a 3.83 graduate GPA. Thompson has 43 receptions for 592 yards and 10 touchdowns this season, earning First-Team All-MAC honors for the second time in his career. He is Toledo's all-time leader in career touchdown receptions (30) and ranks second all-time in receiving yards (3,257). Thompson was a First-Team All-MAC selection in 2016, catching 64 passes for a then school-record 1,269 yards and 11 touchdowns.

Toledo Notes:

Toledo will make their eighth bowl appearance in the past nine years when they travel to the Caribbean to face Florida International in the 2018 Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl on Friday, Dec. 21 (12:30 p.m. / ESPN). Toledo (7-5, 5-3 MAC) won four of its last five games, finishing out the season with a 56-34 road victory at Kent State on Nov. 15 and a 51-13 drubbing of Central Michigan in the season finale on Nov. 23.

Toledo has relied on its high-powered offense all season, cracking the 50-point barrier a school-record six times. The Rockets are second in the MAC in scoring offense (41.2) and total offense (448.5). Head Coach Jason Candle's crew features a balanced attack, with three running backs with over 500 yards rushing and three receivers with over 500 yards receiving. Junior Diontae Johnson earned first-team All-MAC at wide receiver and punt return, and second-team at kickoff return. He caught 43 passes for 663 yards and seven touchdowns. Senior Cody Thompson, another first-team pick at wide receiver, matched Johnson with 43 receptions to go with 592 yards and 10 scores.

The Rocket defense grew stronger as the season progressed, pitching a shutout vs. Central Michigan until a fumble recovery was returned for a touchdown in the final four minutes. Toledo was second in the league with 34 sacks, paced by 8.5 by senior Tuzar Skipper. Senior cornerback Ka'dar Hollman led the MAC with 12 pass breakups, while senior safety Josh Teachey was right behind with 11 breakups.

Rocket Roundup:

- Toledo's seven wins made it bowl eligible for the ninth consecutive season. The Rockets have gone bowling in eight of the last nine seasons. This will be Toledo's 18th bowl. The Rockets have an all-time bowl record of 11-6.
- Toledo is one of only nine FBS programs to have a winning record in each of the past nine seasons.
- Toledo and FIU has met three times before. The two teams split a homeand-home series in 2008 and 2009, with each team taking a road victory. FIU also knocked off the Rockets in a dramatic 34-32 contest at the 2010 Little Caesars Pizza Bowl.
- Toledo is second in the MAC in scoring (41.1), just a single point behind Ohio's 41.2. The Rockets are also second in the league in total offense (448.5) and rushing offense (223.6).
- Toledo had eight players make All-MAC at 10 positions, including two first-team selections, Diontae Johnson (WR/PR) and Cody Thompson (WR). Johnson also was named MAC Special Teams Player of the Year.
- Redshirt freshman Bryant Koback's 875 yards rushing was the third-most by a Rocket freshman and the most since Morgan Williams set the school mark of 1,010 in 2008.
- Toledo head coach Jason Candle has participated in four bowls as a head coach and four as an assistant coach. Candle coached in six NCAA Division III national championship games as an assistant at Mount Union from 2002-08, winning the title in 2002, 2005, 2006 & 2008.

<u>Consistent Winners:</u> Toledo is one of only nine schools who have had a winning record in each of the past nine seasons. Toledo also has had at least nine wins in six of the last eight years. Over the past five years, Toledo ranks eighth in the FBS in overall wins (46).

Thompson Sets Career Receiving Mark: Toledo senior wide receiver Cody Thompson set the school record for career receiving touchdowns this season with 30 career receiving touchdowns. Thompson also ranks second in school history with 3,257 career receiving yards, which also marks third most among active NCAA career receiving yards leaders.

Florida International Notes:

- FIU will be going bowling for the second-straight season and fourth time overall as the Panthers take on Toledo on Dec. 21 in the Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl.
- FIU finished the regular season 8-4, tying the school record for most wins in a season for the second-straight year.
- FIU leads the all-time series over Toledo, with the Panthers owning a 2-1 mark over the Rockets.
- The matchup will be the second between FIU and Toledo at a bowl game, with the Panthers winning the 2010 Little Caesars Pizza Bowl in Detroit, 34-32.
- FIU has scored a program-best 415 points this season, breaking 2010's total of 374. Head coach Butch Davis' squad scored 333 points in 2017, ranking third in the FIU record books.
- QB James Morgan needs only 34 passing yards to break Alex McGough's single-season passing yard record of 2,798 from 2017.
- LB Sage Lewis has earned 126 tackles this season, which is the most for a single-year at FIU.

Morgan Leads Panther Offense: FIU quarterback James Morgan, who transferred to FIU after graduating from Bowling Green last spring, has lit up the C-USA with his passing prowess. The redshirt junior shattered FIU's single-season passing touchdown mark, after tossing 26 scores for the year. Morgan also threw for 2,727 yards in 2018, which ranks second-most for a single-season at FIU. The quarterback ranks first in the C-USA for passer efficiency rating (157.6) and passing yards per attempt (8.4).

Morgan has been showered with honors throughout the season, earning C-USA Newcomer of the Year and C-USA Honorable Mention. The Green Bay, Wisconsin native also earned a spot on the Johnny Unitas Watch List before being named a Top 30 quarterback by the award. Morgan was also a member of the Wuerffel Trophy Watch List, Manning Stars of the Week and Davy O'Brien Great 8 List.

FIU Earns School-Record 17 All-Conference Selections:

The FIU Panthers earned a school-record 17 C-USA selections this season, with two first team, two second team and 13 honorable mention members comprising the list. The pair of first teamers earned for FIU is the most for any Panther team since 2015. The Panthers hauled in 11 selections in Butch Davis' first season at the helm in 2017.

The junior duo of Sage Lewis and Maurice Alexander highlighted the C-USA First Team list for FIU. Lewis earned a school-record 126 tackles in 2018, while Alexander was electric in the punt return game after averaging a league-best 13.6 yards per return. Jordan Budwig made a return to the C-USA Second Team, while Stone Wilson earned his first appearance on the All-Conference Second Team list.

FIU had 13 selections on the C-USA Honorable Mention Team, with James Morgan, Anthony Jones, Dallas Connell, D'Antne Demery, Shane McGough, Austin Maloney, Noah Curtis, Anthony Johnson, Richard Dames, Stantley Thomas-Oliver III, Jose Borregales and Tommy Zozus earning the distinction. Maloney was awarded honorable mention on offense and special teams.

Additionally, FIU had four players earn C-USA All-Freshman Team honors on Tuesday, with that total also being a school-record high. Sterling Palmer, Dorian Hall, Jason Mercier and Rocky Jacques-Louis were named to the freshman list. The four honorees were also a league-high total, tying only Charlotte and Western Kentucky.

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
