2021 BAHAMAS BOWL: After a year off, the Bahamas Bowl - the longest-running international bowl game in college football history - returns as the first game of the Bowl Season schedule. The 2021 Bahamas Bowl features Middle Tennessee (6-6) from Conference USA and Toledo (7-5) from the Mid-American Conference. The game will be played Friday, Dec. 17 (12:00 p.m. ET) in Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium (15,000). The game will be televised on ESPN (**Matt Barrie** - play by play; analyst **Booger McFarland**; sideline reporter **Katie George**), ESPN Deportes (**Kenneth Garay** - play by play; analyst **Sebastián Martínez-Christensen**) and carried on the Bowl Season Radio Network (**Kyle Wiggs** - play by play; color analyst **Elvis Gallegos**).

BAHAMAS BOWL STORYLINES

2021 MATCHUP: MIDDLE TENNESSEE VS. TOLEDO

The Bahamas Bowl kicks off the 2021 Bowl Season across the U.S. and the Bahamas on December 27. This is the second time in the bowl's history it is the first bowl game played (also first in 2019).

For the seventh time, the Bahamas Bowl features a Conference USA vs. Mid-American Conference matchup as the Middle Tennessee Blue Raiders (6-6. 4-4 C-USA) take on the Toledo Rockets (7-5, 5-3 MAC). The all-time Bahamas Bowl series between the conferences is tied 3-3, as WKU (C-USA) won the 2014 title with a thrilling 49-48 victory over Central Michigan, Western Michigan (MAC) captured the 2015 bowl with a 45-31 victory over Middle Tennessee, Old Dominion (C-USA) held off Eastern Michigan 24-20 in the 2016 game, Ohio (MAC) beat UAB 41-6 in 2017, FIU (C-USA) rallied to beat Toledo 35-32 in 2019 and Buffalo (MAC) defeated Charlotte (C-USA) 31-9 in 2019.

This is the first time that Middle Tennessee and Toledo have met in football.

NICE TO SEE YOU AGAIN

Both Middle Tennessee (2015) and Toledo (2018) are the first schools to make a second visit to the Bahamas in the bowl's seven-year history. Both teams lost in their initial Bahamas appearance as the Blue Raiders were defeated by Western Michigan, and the Rockets were beaten by FIU.

LONG-RUNNING SHOW

The Bahamas Bowl is the longest-running FBS international bowl game in college football history as the bowl celebrates its seventh edition in 2021. The inaugural 2014 Bahamas Bowl was the first FBS bowl game played outside of the U.S. or Canada since the 1937 Bacardi Bowl in Havana, Cuba (Jan. 1, 1937), a 7-7 tie between Auburn and Villanova. The last international bowl game outside the U.S. before the Bahamas Bowl was the 2010 International Bowl in Toronto, won by South Florida 27-3 over Northern Illinois. The International Bowl was contested four times.

RECENT SCORING FIREWORKS

Toledo scored 216 points in the last five games (4-1 record) before the Bahamas Bowl, an average of 43.2 points per game - that includes three games with 49 points scored in each. Middle Tennessee scored 44 or more points in three of the Blue Raiders' six victories. In the first six years of the Bahamas Bowl, there have been **371** points scored, an average of **61.8** combined points per game.

BLUE RAIDERS LOVE TURNOVERS

Middle Tennessee enters the 2021 Bahamas Bowl with FBS-bests in turnovers gained (31) and fumbles recovered (15). The Blue Raiders' turnover margin of +0.92 per game (31 gained/20 lost in 12 games) is 6th-best in FBS.

BUT ON THE OTHER HAND ...

Toledo leads the FBS in fewest turnovers (six in 12 games) and fewest interceptions thrown two in 12 games).

HONORED TO BE HERE

Middle Tennessee had eight players honored by Conference USA on the league's All-Conference Teams. The Blue Raiders had three first team selections, two on the second team, and four honorable mention picks.

S **Reed Blankenship**, DB **Quincy Riley** and PR **Jaylin Lane** were the three Blue Raiders on the first unit.

The C-USA second team included DE Jordan Ferguson and LB DQ Thomas.

TE Jimmy Marshall, DB Greg Grate, OL Jordan Palmer and KR Jaylin Lane all earned honorable mention recognition.

Middle Tennessee was represented on the C-USA All-Freshman Team by QB **Nick Vattiato** and S **Deidrick Stanley**.

A total of 11 Toledo student-athletes earned All-MAC honors, the most since placing 12 players on All-MAC teams in 2016. Leading the way were five first-team selections, the most since 2017. Senior OL **Bryce Harris**, senior DBs **Tycen Anderson** and **Samuel Womack**, junior RB **Bryant Koback**, and

junior OLB **Jamal Hines** were all placed on the first team. Anderson, Womack, and Hines make up the first defensive first-team trio for Toledo since 1997.

Senior LB **Jonathan Jones** and junior DE **Desjuan Johnson** were placed on the second team, as was sophomore WR **Devin Maddox**, who was named All-MAC as a return specialist.

Representing the Rockets on the third team are senior OL Vitaliy Gurman, junior LB Dyontae Johnson and freshman S Maxen Hook.

THE PRIME MINISTER'S TROPHY

The Bahamas Bowl renamed its championship trophy to the Prime Minister's Trophy in 2016, in honor of the highest elected office in the Bahamas. A new championship trophy made its debut in 2018. Designed and manufactured by Levy Recognition of Tampa, Fla. (who designed the original trophy that was used from 2014-16), the Prime Minister's Trophy stands 30 inches tall, weighs nearly 30 pounds and features the flags of the United States and The Bahamas. The media attending the bowl select an Offensive and Defensive Player of the Game. The winners of those awards will receive a specially designed football from Big Game USA in Dallas.

UNI-WATCH

Toledo is the designated home team and will wear gold helmets with the Rockets logo on the sides, midnight blue jerseys and midnight blue pants. Middle Tennessee, as the visitor, will wear white helmets with the Blue Raiders logo on the sides, white jerseys and royal blue pants. Both teams will wear the flag stickers of the United States and the Bahamas on the rear of the helmets in a nod to the host country.

FROM SATURDAYS TO SUNDAYS

A total of **49** Bahamas Bowl alumni have played at least one game in the NFL, including **seven** players who made their debuts so far this season: UAB RB **Spencer Brown** (Carolina); Buffalo DE **Malcolm Koonce** (Las Vegas); Buffalo DE **Ledarius Mack** (Chicago); Buffalo RB **Jaret Patterson** (Washington); Ohio T **Austen Pleasants** (Carolina); Old Dominion DE **Bunmi Rotimi** (Washington) and Toledo WR **Cody Thompson** (Seattle). All but Koonce, who was drafted by the Las Vegas Raiders in the third round of the 2021 NFL Draft, made the rosters as undrafted free agents.

At least six Bahamas Bowl alumni have made NFL debuts each year since the start of the 2016 season, including a bowl-high 10 players in 2020.

A total of 28 Bahamas Bowl alumni have been drafted by NFL teams.

AN "UNOFFICIAL" HONOR

In recognition of ESPN Monday Night Football play-by-play announcer **Steve Levy**, who called the first six Bahamas Bowls, the ESPN broadcast booth has renamed the **Steve Levy Broadcast Booth** for 2021. Steve is a great friend of the bowl, and in his Twitter bio, he refers to himself as the "unofficial, official voice of @TheBahamasBowl". So in that spirit, the bowl has extended an "unoficial' honor to him for his contributions to our game.

IN MEMORIAM

The Bahamas Bowl lost two great friends of the game since the last time the game was played in 2019. Coach **Rob Best**, who had a long career as a college and high school coach, was the color analyst on the national radio broadcasts of the Bahamas Bowl from 2015-19. Coach Best died in October 2020, and the bowl re-named the Bowl Season Radio booth as the **Coach Rob Best Memorial Radio Booth** in his honor for today's game.

Also, Conference USA Assistant Commissioner **Russ Anderson**, who publicized C-USA from the league's inception in 1995, died in April 2021. Russ was a part of our game in 2018, worked tirelessly to promote C-USA's teams and players over the years and was a great friend of the bowl, The Bahamas Bowl communications staff has marked a seat in RDA's honor at today's game.

BAHAMAS BOWL TOP 10 MOMENTS (2014-19)

As part of a look back at the first six Bahamas Bowls (2014-19), the Bahamas Bowl staff put together a list of the top 10 moments in bowl history.

TOP 10 MOMENTS

Bahamas Bowl Top 10 Moment - #10 - 2016: ODU's David Washington to Zach Pascal 47-yard TD pass The No. 10 moment in Bahamas Bowl history was a key play from the 2016 game between Old Dominion and Eastern Michigan. Midway through the second quarter, ODU led 3-0 against a tough EMU defense. Quarterback David Washington scrambled away from heavy pressure and found Zach Pascal all alone for a 47-yard TD to extend the lead to 10-0. It was one of three TD passes for Washington on the day as the Monarchs beat the Eagles 24-20 in Nassau for ODU's first bowl victory.

Bahamas Bowl Top 10 Moment - #9 - 2015: Late Western Michigan pick leads to Bogan's 4th TD run

The No. 9 moment in Bahamas Bowl history was a key play from the 2015 game between Western Michigan and Middle Tennessee. Late in the fourth quarter, Western Michigan led Middle Tennessee 38-31 in a see-saw affair. WMU safety Rontavious Atkins intercepted MTSU quarterback Brent Stockstill at the Middle Tennessee 33, and he returned the ball 29 yards to the Blue Raiders' 4-yard line. It took two runs for Jamauri Bogan to find the end zone, gaining three yards on first down before finding paydirt on second down with 5:00 left to play as the Broncos stretched the lead to the final margin of 45-31. It was Bogan's fourth touchdown run of the game, which set the Bahamas Bowl record for most rushing TDs.

Bahamas Bowl Top 10 Moment - #8 - 2019: Charlotte's Tucker 51-yard catch and run for a touchdown The No. 8 moment in Bahamas Bowl history was a long touchdown play from the 2019 game between Buffalo and Charlotte. Late in the third quarter, Buffalo led Charlotte, 24-0, and the 49ers were trying to get back in the game. From their 49-yard line, Charlotte quarterback Chris Reynolds found wide receiver Victor Tucker with a pass at the Buffalo 35. Tucker crossed the field to elude several Bulls defenders, and found some help from his squad to head to the end zone. He broke three attempted tackles to score with 2:20 left in the quarter for the 49ers' first points of the contest. Bahamas Bowl Top 10 Moment - #7 - 2015: Western Michigan's Braverman 51-yard catch and run for a TD The No. 7 moment in Bahamas Bowl history was a 68-yard catch and run for a touchdown from the 2015 game between Middle Tennessee and Western Michigan. The game was tied 24-24 early in the fourth quarter in a see-saw game. Western Michigan quarterback Zach Terrell and the Broncos faced a second-and-15 from their 32. Terrell threw toward the right side of the field, where Daniel Braverman caught the pass at midfield, avoiding two Blue Raider defenders while racing down the sideline for a touchdown with 12:47 remaining in the game for a 31-24 lead.

Bahamas Bowl Top 10 Moment - #6 - 2019: Buffalo's defense stifles Charlotte

The No. 6 moment in Bahamas Bowl history were actually several in the 2019 game between Buffalo and Charlotte. The Buffalo defense made life difficult for Charlotte all day long in a dominating effort. The Bulls' James Patterson intercepted a pass late in the first half that set up a field goal and a 17-0 lead, Malcolm Koonce's strip sack of Charlotte QB Chris Reynolds late in the half was recovered by Ledarius Mack, a Koonce sack of Reynolds late in the third quarter and a gameending Mack sack to close out a 31-9 victory.

Bahamas Bowl Top 10 Moment - #5 - 2015: Bogan's four-TD game leads Western Michigan

The No. 5 moment in Bahamas Bowl history was a huge day for Western Michigan running back Jamauri Bogan against Middle Tennessee. Bogan set Bahamas Bowl records with 215 yards rushing and four touch-downs in a 45-31 victory over the Blue Raiders. His 62-yard scamper up the middle tied the game at 7-7 early in the first quarter, and his 46-yard run early in the third pushed the Broncos a 24-17 lead. But, it was his pair of barreling 1-yard TD runs in the fourth quarter that broke a 31-31 tie and gave WMU the victory.

Bahamas Bowl Top 10 Moment - #4 - 2015: Western Michigan's Davis has a big day against Middle Tennessee

The No. 4 moment in Bahamas Bowl history was the performance put on by Western Michigan wide receiver Corey Davis in the 2015 game against Middle Tennessee. Davis set a pair of Bahamas Bowl records with eight receptions for 183 yards, an average of 22.9 yards per reception. His 80-yard TD reception near the end of the first quarter is the longest receiving touchdown in the history of the Bahamas Bowl.

Bahamas Bowl Top 10 Moment - #3 - 2017: Ohio's Brown scores four in rout of UAB

The No. 3 moment in Bahamas Bowl history was a record-tying day for Ohio running back Dorian Brown. Brown scored on runs of 74, 9, 25 and 14 yards and ended the day with 152 yards rushing on just 12 carries on the way to Offensive Player of the Game honors. The 74-yard TD run in the second quarter is the longest TD run in the history of the bowl, and his 12.7 yards per rush remains a bowl record.

Bahamas Bowl Top 10 Moment - #2 - 2014: WKU goes wild in the first three quarters

The No. 2 moment in Bahamas Bowl history was the offensive explosion by the WKU Hilltoppers in the inaugural game in 2014 against Central Michigan. Western Kentucky quarterback Brandon Doughty threw five TD passes in the first half to Jared Dangerfield, Joel German, Antwane Grant, Mitchell Henry and Willie McNeal to go with a rushing TD from Leon Allen as WKU scored on each of their six first-half possessions against the MAC's top defense for a 42-14 halftime lead. Allen's 21-yard TD in the third quarter pushed the WKU lead to what looked like an unsurmountable 49-14 over the Chippewas.

Bahamas Bowl Top 10 Moment - #1 - 2014: Central Michigan's furious comeback and "Bahamas Relay" finish

The No. 1 moment in Bahamas Bowl history was the comeback that brought the bowl its' greatest highlight. Central Michigan trailed Western Kentucky 49-14 going into the fourth quarter. The Chippewas rallied for 34 points - including an improbable 75-yard, three-relay touchdown on the final play. CMU quarterback Cooper Rush heaved one last gasp pass 47 yards down the field where it was caught by Jesse Kroll at the Hilltoppers 28. Then chaos ensued. After laterals from Kroll, Deon Butler and Courtney Williams, Titus Davis raced 15 yards, dove and grazed the pylon – launching the crowd into pandemonium and the 2014 Bahamas Bowl into history. Only a well-defended 2-point conversion attempt by WKU preserved the Hilltoppers' victory.

Nassau & Paradise Island



With the lure of a big city and the ease of a tropical utopia, Nassau & Paradise Island are considered by many as, well, paradise. Nassau, the capital of The Bahamas, is a bustling metropolitan hub full of culture and modern amenities. To the north lies Paradise Island. Its name tells you everything. It's 685 acres of pure euphoria, developed almost exclusively to delight and accommodate visitors. The island boasts resorts, hotels, restaurants, shops, nightlife, a golf course, aquarium and a casino.

Junkanoo, a Bahamian national festival, is a kaleidoscope of colors and sound. The rhythmic sounds of cowbells, goat skin drums and whistles, accompanied by an array of brass instruments, create a sweet musical beat that will move you; while brilliantly colored costumes capture your eye, and bring much visual delight. This bi-annual cultural highlight takes place on Bay Street in New Providence and other Family Islands during the early morning hours, from 1-9 am on Boxing Day (the day after Christmas) and New Year's Morning.

Both press and photo credentials and other information must be picked up at the Bahamas Bowl Media Center during hours of operation.

In order to serve the media in an efficient manner, the Media Information Center is equipped with a copier. Drinks and snacks will be available. There will be workstations available and ample electrical power for computers and other electrical equipment. Internet service will be available. **Snacks & refreshments will be available each afternoon at times listed above**.

MEDIA HOSPITALITY SUITE: Media hospitality will be located at Atlantis (**Coral Towers - Room 9-225**). Drinks & snacks will be provided for credentialed media. Hours of operation are **9 p.m.-Midnight from Dec. 13-16**.

MEDIA HOTEL/TRANSPORTATION: The Atlantis Bahamas is the official media hotel of the Bahamas Bowl. All media must make their requests for rooms through the online media credentialing process. There are an extremely limited number of media rooms at the Atlantis, and beat writers who staff their team's games during the 2021 season will have priority in the Atlantis media block.

The Bahamas Bowl recommends using taxis or tour companies to travel throughout Nassau. All driving in the Bahamas is done from the left-hand side of the road.

The Bahamas Bowl will provide transportation for traveling U.S. media representatives to key events: the **Bahamas Bowl Press Conference** on **December 15** at Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium (leave for stadium at 10:45 a.m. and return to Atlantis at 2:00 p.m.) and the **2021 Bahamas Bowl** on **December 17** (leave for stadium at 8:30 a.m. and return to Atlantis 3 hours after the conclusion of the game - approximately 7:00 p.m.). **Media buses will be staged at the At-Iantis (Coral Towers lobby)**. All media members must show their credentials in order to use the transportation service.

GAMEDAY MEDIA TRIBUNE/MEDIA BOOTHS/MEDIA CENTER: Entrance into the Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium Media Tribune and Media Center is by credential only for the news media and communications staff. A limited number of telephones (restricted long distance) and email/copy service will be available to the working press.

The media tribune, press booths and media center will be open to the media at 8:30 a.m. Press releases, statistics, media guides and flip cards will be available. A pregame meal will be served only to accredited media approximately two hours prior to kickoff (Noon) in the Media Center, located in the Southwest corner of the stadium below the media tribune. Beverages and snacks will be available throughout the game.

The Media Tribune at Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium is outside and under cover (similar to auxiliary press setups at Super Bowls and other major sporting events). Power, wireless and wired internet will be available to each individual seated in the media tribune. Booths for coaches, ESPN, radio networks and instant replay are located at the top of the Western Grandstand in the Media Booths. Seat and booth assignments will be made by the bowl.

The media workroom at Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium will remain open until **three hours** after the conclusion of the game. The media bus will leave the stadium heading back to Atlantis Coral Towers at **approximately 7:00 p.m.**

GAMEDAY MEDIA SERVICES: Flip cards, stats and game notes will be available prior to the start of the Bahamas Bowl in the main press areas. Complete box scores and play-by-play will distributed to the media at the end of each quarter. Coaches and student-athlete quotes will be distributed shortly after the conclusion of the press conferences. If you need a box score emailed to your news organization, make a request to a Communications staffer.

INTERNET ACCESS: Wireless and wired access will be available to the media in Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium. The wireless access network and password will be distributed to the media on gameday at the stadium.

LIVE STATISTICS: The Bahamas Bowl has contracted with StatBroadcast to provide instant stats information during the bowl to media in attendance in Nassau and back in the United States. To access the stat feed, point your browser to **bahamas.statbroadcast.com**.

PHOTOGRAPHERS/VIDEO: Bahamas Bowl photo credentials must be visible at all times. Bowl organizers will adhere to the NCAA's sideline control policy, which states that:

Sideline photographers are restricted outside the 20-yard lines in the areas designated and are reminded to stay behind the dotted restraining line around the field. No media personnel, including journalists, radio and television personnel or their equipment, shall be in the team area or coaching box.

POSTGAME INTERVIEW POLICY: Following a 10-minute cooling-off period, postgame interviews will take place in the Media Center in the Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium. Only individuals displaying proper credentials will be permitted in the interview area. Security will be posted in these locations and will not allow anyone to obstruct entrances. The runner-up head coach and two student-athletes will go first, followed by the winning institution's head coach and three student-athletes. The game's Offensive and Defensive Players of the Game are required to attend as part of their team's student-athlete contingent. The Prime Minister's Trophy will be presented to the championship team along with awards to the offensive and defensive players of the game on field immediately following the game.

The cooling-off period for the runner-up team begins when the head coach enters the locker room immediately after the game. The winning head coach and student-athletes must proceed directly from the field to the interview room after the postgame trophy presentation unless requested for a short interview (not to exceed four minutes) by ESPN. Both teams' locker rooms are closed to the media.

Regardless of any personal regular-season radio or television contracts, the coach is first obligated to the entire media staffing the Bahamas Bowl and must report to the interview room immediately after the 10-minute cooling off period. The coach cannot delay a postgame interview with the covering media to conduct a program for a single radio, news-paper, or television reporter unless requested to grant a short interview (not to exceed four minutes) by ESPN. After fulfilling the commitment to the entire media covering the game, the coach and student-athletes may participate in special interviews.

HELPFUL HINTS FOR THE MEDIA

PASSPORTS: The Bahamas Bowl reminds all media that all U.S. citizens coming to the Bowl must have a valid United States Passport for the time of travel. It is possible to secure passports on short notice, but costs will be much higher for the individuals involved and delays in receiving passports are possible during the holiday season. For information on how to obtain a U.S. Passport, visit **passports. state.gov**. For obtaining an expedited passport in a hurry, visit **travel.state.gov/content/travel/en/passports/apply-renew-passport/ hurry.html**.

REQUIRED BAHAMAS TRAVEL HEALTH VISA: ALL visitors must obtain a Bahamas Travel Health Visa prior to traveling to the Bahamas. For more information on current Bahamas COVID-19 protocols and the Bahamas Travel Health Visa, please visit **travel.gov.bs**.

COVID-19 TEST BEFORE RETURNING TO U.S.: You will need to get a COVID-19 viral test (regardless of vaccination status or citizenship) **no more than 1 day** before you travel by air into the United States. You must show your negative result to the airline before you board your flight.

UNITED STATES EMBASSY: The United States Embassy in the Bahamas is located at **42 Queen Street** in Nassau. The American Citizen Services Unit stands ready to help American citizens in The Bahamas – and their loved ones – in emergency situations. American citizens overseas, of course, remain subject to the laws of the country they are in. The American Citizens Services Unit can assist in areas, including: illness/injury, lost/stolen U.S. Passport, arrest/detention, victims of crime, etc.

In case of emergencies involving the death, injury, welfare, or arrest of an American citizen in The Bahamas, please call **242-322-1181**, ext. 1 during business hours (8 a.m.-5 p.m., Monday-Thursday; 8 a.m.-3:30 p.m., Friday), or **242-322-1181**, ext 43111 at all other times. (Please note that the Duty Officer who answers this number will not be able to assist with visa or routine passport matters.) The U.S. Embassy website is **bs.usembassy.gov**.

CELL PHONES/INTERNET: The Bahamas Bowl staff reminds media that cell phone roaming rates for voice and data usage in the Bahamas can be extremely high per minute. All participants should check with their cell-phone service provider for pertinent information on current international/roaming rates. Phones can be used in "Airplane Mode" in the Bahamas (no data usage) in order to use phone cameras, etc. Atlantis Bahamas has WiFi in rooms (free)/some public areas (daily fee if not staying at Atlantis). Calling cards for public phones located in the resort can be purchased at the Atlantis. You can also use apps like Facebook Messenger, WhatsApp, etc. while using WiFi.

CURRENCY: The legal tender is the Bahamian dollar, which is equivalent to the U.S. dollar. U.S. currency is accepted throughout the Bahamas, as are most major credit cards and traveler's checks. ATMs are located at both Paradise Island and Cable Beach casinos, Rawson Square, major banks and in most hotels.

ELECTRICITY: With standard North American 120-volt/60-cycle AC electrical current, you will be able to operate American laptops, electronics, hairdryers, shavers and other small electrical appliances without adapters.

GETTING AROUND: From the Lynden Pindling International Airport, taxi rates are approximately \$32 to downtown Nassau, \$22 to Cable Beach and \$38 to Paradise Island (plus the \$2 bridge toll to PI) - based on two passengers (extra bags/passengers will cost more). Taxi service is available from the Atlantis to take you into Nassau to visit tourist areas, restaurants, etc. Shared van rides into downtown Nassau from the Atlantis run \$5 per person (you will be dropped off in downtown Nassau near the Government House), while solo taxi rides run \$13 to downtown with higher rates outside the downtown zone. Unshared rides from downtown Nassau back to the Atlantis are \$13 per person (not including the \$2 bridge toll for taxis to get back to Paradise Island).

Ferry boats (water taxis) can take you between Nassau and Paradise Island while at the same time giving you a waterfront view of Nassau Harbour. Tickets can be purchased at the tour desk at Festival Place and at Woodes Rogers Wharf right next door. Tickets cost \$6 per person (plus a suggested \$1 tip for the storyteller who usually accompanies the ride) and the trip is approximately 10 minutes each way. Ferries leave every half hour on the hour from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

City buses, known locally as "jitneys", run in downtown Nassau and Cable Beach several times a day. The cost for a one-way ride is \$1.50 per person, and exact change is required. Pay as you exit the bus.

TIPPING: Restaurants and hotels **automatically add 15%** to all food and beverage checks in lieu of gratuity. For exceptional service you may wish to leave something extra. Bellboys, doormen and porters usually receive \$3 per bag. Taxi drivers should be tipped about 15% of the fare.

CUSTOMS: U.S. citizens out of the country for 48 hours are allowed up to \$800 worth of duty-free merchandise. Less than 48 hours, the duty-free exemption is \$200. Limitations include 32 ounces of tobacco for those over 21 and no more than two liters of alcohol. To make traveling easier, consider packing things you're going to declare separately and keep all your sales receipts.

MEDICAL FACILITIES: Internationally trained doctors are available at the hotels and throughout the Nassau Paradise Island. Two hospitals are fully equipped to respond to emergency medical situations. Princess Margaret Hospital (public) and Doctor's Hospital (private) are both located in Nassau.

Go north on US Departures Rd. (0.2 miles), at the roundabout, take first exit onto Windsor Field Rd. (0.4 miles), go through one roundabout (0.4 miles) and stay on Windsor Field Rd., at the next roundabout (0.7 miles), take the first exit to John F. Kennedy Drive and go through two roundabouts, at the third roundabout (4.3 miles), take the first exit onto Prospect Ridge Rd., at the next roundabout (0.8 miles), take the first exit onto West Bay St., continue on West Bay St. (1.9 miles), at the next roundabout, continue on West Bay St. (1.1 miles), turn left onto Marlborough St. (0.1 miles), road becomes Navy Lion Rd. (213 feet), turn right onto Bay St. (1.2 miles), turn left and cross the Sir Sidney Poitier Bridge (0.5 miles), take first right onto Paradise Beach Rd., at the roundabout (0.1 miles), take the first exit and continue (0.2 miles), Atlantis Resort will be on the left.



2014 POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL: WKU 49, CENTRAL MICHIGAN 48 (DEC. 24, 2014)

WKU survived a furious Central Michigan fourth-quarter comeback, which included a 75-yard last-gasp relay play for a touchdown as time expired, but a broken-up 2-point conversion attempt following the improbable TD gave the Hilltoppers a 49-48 victory and the inaugural Popeyes Bahamas Bowl title.

The four-person relay by the Chippewas was an immediate hit on ESPN and social media. The final TD was named the play of the bowl season by ESPN's SportsCenter and was a finalist for a Best Play ESPY.

WKU (8-6) finally put an end to Central Michigan's 34-point fourth quarter with a defensive stop in the back corner of the end zone.

Trailing 49-42 with one second remaining, the Central Michigan offense lined up for one final prayer from its 25 that was answered.

Quarterback **Cooper Rush** heaved one last gasp pass 47 yards down the field where it was caught by **Jesse Kroll** at the Hilltoppers 28. Then chaos ensued. After laterals from Kroll, **Deon Butler** and **Courtney Williams**, **Titus Davis** raced 15 yards, dove and grazed the pylon – launching the crowd into pandemonium.

With the WKU lead trimmed to an unimaginably thin 49-48, the Chippewas (7-6) threw caution to the wind and tried for a 2-point conversion in hopes of winning the game. Rush threw for Kroll, but WKU defensive back **Wonderful Terry** broke up the fade-route pass to give WKU its first FBS bowl victory in school history under first-year head coach Jeff Brohm.

CMU head coach **Dan Enos** discussed the decision to go for two and the victory. "We didn't want to go to overtime because we had had trouble stopping them all day," explained Enos. "I looked at the players and said, 'What do you got?' and they said, 'Let's do it. Let's win this game.'"

Popeyes Bahamas Bowl Player of the Game honors went to WKU's **Brandon Doughty** (offense) and WKU defensive end **Derik Overstreet** (defense). Doughty threw for 486 yards, 350 in the first half with five touch-downs, all to different receivers. Overstreet recorded five tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss that included two second-half sacks.

Before the nightmarish fourth quarter, the Hilltoppers played as crisp and dominant a game as they had all season long.

Doughty threw five touchdown passes in the first half to Jared Dangerfield, Joel German, Antwane Grant, Mitchell Henry and Willie McNeal to go with a rushing TD from Leon Allen as WKU scored on each of their six first-half possessions against the MAC's top defense for a 42-14 halftime lead. Rush also threw for a pair of scores to Davis and Williams in the half.

That Hilltopper advantage was extended to 49-14 after Allen scored on a 21-yard run midway through the third quarter.

The fourth quarter was a different story, as Rush connected with Davis for touchdowns twice to cut WKU's lead to 49-28. Then defensive end **Joe Ostman** flipped a 52-yard completion to WKU's McNeal inside out by forcing a fumble at the Central Michigan 13, which was recovered by Chippewas corner **Tony Annese**. Annese returned the fumble back to the CMU 36, and from there, Central Michigan marched down the field to score on a Rush TD pass to Williams to trail by 14.

WKU was forced to punt on their ensuing possession, and a four-play, 55-second drive capped by a 7-yard TD strike from Rush to **Anthony Gar-land** with 1:09 left gave Central Michigan hope.

WKU successfully recovered the CMU onside kick after the score and milked the clock before being forced to punt, which set up the final frenzied play for the Chippewas that left the stadium breathless and WKU in possession of the inaugural Popeyes Bahamas Bowl trophy.

Rush set FBS bowl records for touchdown passes with seven and most net passing yards with 255 in the fourth quarter alone. The combined 971 passing yards and 12 TD passes for Doughty and Rush also broke FBS twoteam bowl records.

2015 POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL: WESTERN MICHIGAN 45, MIDDLE TENNESSEE 31 (DEC. 24, 2015)

Jamauri Bogan rushed 19 times for a career-high 215 yards and four touchdowns to power Western Michigan to a 45-31 victory over Middle Tennessee in the 2015 Popeyes Bahamas Bowl.

It was one big play after another in the contest, as the two teams combined for 1,055 yards of total offense and seven scoring plays of 29 or more yards.

But it was a pair of 1-yard plunges just 1:12 apart in the fourth quarter by the redshirt freshman Bogan that made the difference.

After his 61-yard run set Western Michigan (8-5) up in the red zone, Bogan banged in from a yard out with 6:12 left in the game to give the Broncos a 38-31 advantage.

Three plays later, safety **Rontavious Atkins** intercepted MTSU quarterback **Brent Stockstill** and returned the ball 29 yards to the 4-yard line. It took two runs for Bogan to find the end zone, gaining three yards on first down before finding paydirt on second down with 5:00 left to play.

The Bronco defense held on downs on Middle Tennessee's ensuing possession and the WMU offense ran out the clock to seal the victory.

"This is what 'Row the Boat' is all about," WMU head coach **P.J. Fleck** said. "This is why it was invented. This is what it's for. There was all types of adversity in that football game that our kids could have given up, could have folded. Two years ago, we probably would have. Last year, we would have done it some of the time. This year, no way."

Bogan was named the Offensive Player of the Game of the game for his efforts, while WMU linebacker **Grant DePalma** was named the game's Defensive Player of the Game. DePalma led all tacklers with 12 stops (five solo) and a tackle for loss.

WMU quarterback **Zach Terrell** was 18-of-26 passing for 297 yards and a pair of touchdowns. **Corey Davis** caught eight balls for 183 yards and a TD.

Stockstill had a solid day for Middle Tennessee (7-6), completing 26of-39 passes for 327 yards and three scores to lead the Blue Raider offens. His top target was **James Richie**, who caught eight passes for 126 yards and two scores and ran twice for 61 yards and a third touchdown.

The two teams combined for 475 yards of total offense and 34 points in the first quarter.

It took MTSU only 1:17 to get on the board when James scored the first of his three touchdowns on a 46-yard run to quickly make it 7-0.

Bogan answered just three plays later, running up the middle for 62 yards and a TD, and it was 7-7 with only 2:17 gone in the contest.

Stockstill hit James on a 44-yard scoring pass just 1:39 later to put Middle Tennessee back on top 14-7.

Andrew Haldeman drilled a 47-yard field goal with 3:23 left in the first quarter to pull Western Michigan within 14-10.

Cody Clark kicked a 23-yard field goal on the Blue Raiders' next possession to extend the lead to 17-10 with 1:04 left in the quarter.

The Broncos quickly tied the game at 17-all when Terrell hit Davis on an 80-yard pass and run with three seconds left in the opening quarter. Davis caught the ball on a 5-yard hitch pattern, broke a tackle and raced the remaining 75 yards down the sideline for the score.

WMU struck quickly in the second half on another 46-yard run by Bogan to go up 24-17 with 2:57 gone.

After a short punt set MTSU up at the Western Michigan 32-yard line, it took just two plays for the Blue Raiders to tie the game. Stockstill hit **Christian Collis** on a 17-yard pass with 28 seconds left in the third quarter to tie the game at 24-24.

Terrell hit **Daniel Braverman** on a 68-yard scoring pass to put WMU back on top 31-24 with 12:47 to play in the game.

Again, MTSU answered when Stockstill hit James on a 29-yard pass with 9:41 left in the game to tie it at 31-31.

Western Michigan finished the day with an impressive 613 yards of total offense, and the Broncos, second in FBS in time of possession, held the ball for nearly 35 minutes.

2016 POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL: OLD DOMINION 24, EASTERN MICHIGAN 20 (DEC. 23, 2016)

Old Dominion, making the school's first bowl appearance since the football program restarted in 2009, held off Eastern Michigan 24-20 to win the 2016 Popeyes Bahamas Bowl.

"I just want to say how excited we are to win the game, but number two how grateful we are for how we were treated this week by everybody associated with the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl – all the wonderful people we met," ODU head coach **Bobby Wilder** said. "This was a life-changing experience. We made memories to last a lifetime, and to win the game makes it that much more special."

Led by Offensive Player of the Game running back **Ray Lawry** and his 133 rushing yards, the Monarchs (10-3) left the Bahamas with a six-game win streak and their first bowl trophy. Quarterback **David Washington** added 188 passing yards and three touchdowns for ODU.

"He's really good, obviously tough to tackle," EMU head coach **Chris Creighton** said of Lawry. "We've become a pretty good tackling team, and I think today, he had a lot to do with several missed tackles. Their running game obviously didn't trip today."

Eastern Michigan quarterback **Brogan Roback** did all he could to keep the Eagles (7-6) in the game, throwing for 300 yards and two second-half touchdowns, but it was not enough to help EMU to a title in their first bowl game in 29 years.

Eastern Michigan dominated the time of possession, holding the ball 32:30 to the Monarchs' 27:30, and converted on a season-high 13 thirddowns, but it was the Old Dominion defense that made one final stand late in the fourth quarter.

ODU senior linebacker **TJ Ricks** was named Defensive Player of the Game after finishing with nine tackles, including one for a loss.

"The defense ... we just came to the sideline and talked to each other and just told each other to trust each other," Ricks said of the entire ODU defensive performance. "You're our 1/11th on the field. If one guy does his job, and everybody else does their job, we'll be good on defense."

Through the first 30 minutes, Old Dominion was the only team able to put points on the board, holding a 10-0 lead at the half.

ODU scored first when **Brad Davis** connected on a 34-yard field goal for a 3-0 lead with 7:43 remaining in the first quarter. The 16-play, 58-yard drive appeared to stall at midfield when the Monarchs faced a fourth-andtwo situation. Wilder dialed up a fake punt, calling a direct snap to running back **Jeremy Cox**, who drove the ball three yards for the first down.

Old Dominion extended its lead to 10-0 behind a 47-yard touchdown pass from Washington to **Zach Pascal**. The six-play, 80-yard drive began with **Anthony Wilson** picking off Roback in the end zone for a touchback, and the drive took just 2:23.

After receiving the kickoff to start the second half, Roback put the Eagles on the board, driving his team 76 yards in 2:50, capped off by a fiveyard strike to wide receiver **Sergio Bailey** to cut the Old Dominion lead to 10-7.

It didn't take long for the Monarchs to respond, as Washington found **Travis Fulgham** downfield for a 31-yard touchdown with no defender in sight to push the ODU lead to 17-7 with 9:50 remaining in the third quarter.

Roback hit **Johnnie Niupalau** for a five-yard touchdown pass, capitalizing on another quick drive to pull to 17-14 with 7:25 left in the third quarter.

A 24-yard field goal by Eastern Michigan's **Paul Fricano** with 12 seconds remaining in the third tied the game at 17-17.

Opening the fourth quarter, Washington drove Old Dominion 72 yards in 2:09 to put the Monarchs back on top 24-17 after hitting **Jonathan Duhart** on a five-yard TD pass in the corner of the end zone – his third passing touchdown of the game.

Fricano connected on a 19-yard field goal with 9:08 to play to cut the Monarchs lead to 24-20.

The Eagles had a chance late, driving the ball to midfield, but couldn't keep their drive going, punting the ball back to Old Dominion. ODU ran out the final 5:21 to secure the victory.

Linebacker Kyle Rachwal led the Eagles defense with eight tackles.

2017 BAHAMAS BOWL: OHIO 41, UAB 6 (DEC. 22, 2017)

Dorian Brown tied a Bahamas Bowl record with four touchdown runs to lead Ohio to a 41-6 victory over UAB in the 2017 Bahamas Bowl.

The Bobcats (9-4) posted their first bowl game win since 2012 and the third bowl game win in the history of the Ohio program.

The Blazers, who reinstated their football program this year after a two-year hiatus, finished with an 8-5 record.

Ohio swept the postgame awards as Brown was named the Offensive Player of the Game and safety **Javon Hagan** was named the Defensive Player of the Game.

Brown scored on runs of 74, 9, 25 and 14 yards and ended the day with 152 yards rushing on just 12 carries. Hagan had a game-high nine tackles (six solo) and a forced fumble to lead the stout Ohio defense.

"It was a great win," Ohio head coach **Frank Solich** said. "We certainly appreciate all this team has been about – the way they've gone through the season, the way they started to prepare for the Bahamas Bowl at home and then continue the preparation here. To end up playing a very, very good football game, I couldn't be any more pleased. I feel like eight wins were not enough with this football team, so this ninth win puts a little icing on the cake."

The Bobcats scored on their opening possession, marching 75 yards in 11 plays. **Nathan Rourke** hit **D.L. Knock** on a 2-yard touchdown pass with 6:41 gone in the contest.

Rourke then hit **Papi White** on a 56-yard TD strike on Ohio's second possession with 3:40 left in the first quarter. White led all receivers in the contest with four catches for 106 yards and a score. Ohio missed the PAT as the Bobcats led 13-0.

Ohio made it 20-0 when Brown raced 74 yards for his first touchdown of the day with 12:26 left in the first half.

UAB got on the board with a 34-yard field goal by **Nick Vogel** to pull within 20-3 at the 7:28 mark of the second quarter.

Brown got his second touchdown of the game on an 9-yard run with 1:17 left in the first half. **Louie Zervos** made the PAT, and Ohio's lead was 27-3 at intermission.

UAB took the second-half kickoff, marched 83 yards in 11 plays and converted on a 25-yard field goal by Vogel to pull within 27-6 with 10:46 left in the third quarter.

After a 34-yard punt return by **Kylan Nelson** gave OU the ball at the UAB 25, Brown raced in on the next play to make it 34-6 with 7:45 to play in the third period.

Brown's fourth and final score of the day was a 14-yard scamper with 4:05 left in the third to wrap up the scoring.

"I missed two games last time we played," Brown said. "It actually motivated me. I give a lot of props to the O-line as well, because they did a tremendous job blocking and making it easy for me to run the ball."

A.J. Erdely completed 24-of-45 passes for 254 yards for the Blazers.

Rourke finished the day 12-of-18 passing for 185 yards and two touchdowns and ran three times for 30 yards to finish with 215 yards of total offense

Ohio's **A.J. Ouellette** ran eight times for 26 yards, which put him over the 1,000-yard mark for the season at 1,006 yards in 13 games.

Ohio out-gained UAB 459-353 in total offense as the Bobcats evened the Bahamas Bowl series at 2-2 between the Mid-American Conference and Conference USA.

"This was not our day today," UAB head coach **Bill Clark** said. "But this won't take anything away from what this group has done. It was a historic year, our group has set the bar yery high for the next UAB teams to come."

Defensively for UAB, **Anthony Rush** and **Tevin Crews** had a team-high seven tackles each.

"Being from Florida, it felt good to get the heat again because it's so cold in Ohio," Hagan said. "The food was fantastic. This bowl is just a great experience. It's definitely one of the best bowls I've experienced so far. The atmosphere, the water, the beach, the slides, it was just so fun. I felt like a little kid again."

2018 MAKERS WANTED BAHAMAS BOWL: FIU 35, TOLEDO 32 (DEC. 21, 2018)

FIU erased a 10-0 first-quarter deficit by halftime, and the Panthers held on for a 35-32 victory over Toledo in the 2018 Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl.

The bowl game was played in a strong tropical breeze between 15-20 MPH and near-perfect field conditions at kickoff after early-morning storms blew over New Providence Island several hours before game time.

FIU quarterback **Christian Alexander** was named the Offensive Player of the Game, going 17-for-26 through the air for 209 yards and a touch-down. He also added 87 yards on 10 carries, which set the bowl's record for a quarterback.

Panther running back **Anthony Jones** carried the ball 15 times for 92 yards and three touchdowns to lead FIU in rushing. The Panthers had a 236-124 advantage in rushing yards.

FIU linebacker **Edwin Freeman** was selected as the Defensive Player of the Game as he led the Panthers with eight tackles, including five unassisted stops.

FIU (9-4) closed the season with a school-record nine victories.

"It's spectacular to have won this game. These kids, the things that our entire football team has done for the last 10 or 11 months have been amazing," said FIU head coach **Butch Davis**. "The hard work, the dedication, the unselfishness – you don't win nine football games and set a school record for the most victories or win a bowl game without an awful lot of great plays."

The Toledo (7-6) scoring offense also flexed its muscles at times, led by quarterback **Eli Peters**, who threw for 264 yards and three touchdowns and was the Rockets' rushing leader with five carries for 43 yards. **Jon'Vea Johnson** caught two of the touchdown tosses, while **Diontae Johnson** had six receptions for 98 yards and a score.

Toledo stole the momentum right away when **Terrance Taylor** forced a fumble on the opening kickoff that was recovered and returned to the FIU 3 by **DeDarallo Blue**. Two plays later, **Bryant Koback** powered three yards for a touchdown to give the Rockets a 7-0 lead just 23 seconds into the game – the fastest touchdown in the bowl's history.

The Rockets extended their lead to 10-0 on a 28-yard field goal by **Jameson Vest** with 12 seconds left in the first quarter.

The second quarter belonged to FIU, as the Panthers took a 14-10 lead into halftime, thanks to a pair of lengthy touchdown drives. The Panthers got on the board on an eight-play, 75-yard drive capped off by a six-yard run by Jones to cut Toledo's lead to 10-7 with 12:44 left in the half.

Alexander then connected on a 36-yard touchdown pass to **Sterling Palmer** to complete a seven-play, 96-yard scoring drive, the longest scoring drive by yards in the bowl's history.

The Rockets marched down the field on their first possession of the third quarter and scored on a Peters seven-yard touchdown pass to Jon'Vea Johnson for Toledo's final lead of the game at 17-14.

Jones scored his second touchdown of the day on a 30-yard sprint with 3:47 left in the third quarter to put FIU up for good at 21-17.

The fourth quarter saw plenty of scoring as FIU worked to hold off a Toledo comeback. **Maurice Alexander** extended the Panthers' lead to 28-17 with 11:12 remaining in the game on a 16-yard TD run.

Toledo made it interesting midway through the final quarter by closing the gap to 28-25 with 7:21 to go. Peters connected with Diontae Johnson for a two-yard touchdown and then followed it up with a 2-point conversion on a pass to **Cody Thompson**.

The Panthers iced the game with a drive that took 6:40 off the clock. Jones' third TD run of the game, an 18-yard scamper with 41 seconds to play, pushed the FIU advantage to 35-25.

Peters hit Jon'Vea Johnson for a 43-yard TD pass with two seconds left for Toledo to cut the margin to 35-32, but the Panthers recovered the ensuing onside kick to seal the victory, and FIU raised the Prime Minister's Trophy as a bowl champion for the first time since 2010.

Maurice Alexander led the Panthers with five catches for 30 yards, while **Tony Gaiter IV** had four catches for 52 yards.

Linebacker **Richard Olekanma** and defensive end **Tuzar Skipper** each had eight total tackles to lead Toledo.

2019 MAKERS WANTED BAHAMAS BOWL: BUFFALO 31, CHARLOTTE 9 (DEC. 20, 2019)

Buffalo running back **Jaret Patterson** rushed a bowl-record 32 times for 173 yards and two touchdowns to help secure the program's first-ever bowl victory, as the Bulls defeated Charlotte 31-9 in the 2019 Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl.

Patterson was selected as the Offensive Player of the Game and punctuated the victory with his second touchdown run with 1:43 left in the contest. The Bulls' final drive went for 16 plays and spanned 9:07. Patterson accounted for 81 rushing yards on 13 attempts during the drive, as he was handed the ball on the first nine plays of the possession to ice the game.

Buffalo defensive end **Malcolm Koonce** was awarded Defensive Player of the Game honors thanks to his five tackles, two sacks and one forced fumble. Koonce's strip sack of Charlotte quarterback **Chris Reynolds** was recovered by the Bulls' **Ledarius Mack** with six seconds remaining in the second quarter and helped the Bulls preserve a 17-0 lead heading into halftime.

"I'm really proud of our guys, especially after a layoff, to play as well as we did, as physical as we did," said Buffalo head coach **Lance Leipold**. "We were able to establish the running game. Our defense, especially in the first half, played outstanding. We got some key fourth down stops, created a couple turnovers. It's a team effort, but these three gentlemen sitting next to me (Patterson, Koonce, James Patterson) had great days and great seasons."

Buffalo (8-5) finished the season with three straight victories and five victories in the Bulls' final six games. Charlotte (7-6) fell in the 49ers' first bowl appearance in school history.

Aside from Patterson's performance on the ground, both defenses turned in solid performances. Buffalo held a slight 282-278 advantage in total offense. The combined 560 yards were the fewest in Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl history, which was a distinction previously held by the 2017 game between Ohio and UAB (812 combined yards).

Charlotte defensive end **Markees Watts** led all players with 11 tackles, while safety **Marquavis Gibbs** tallied an interception for the 49ers. Buffalo linebacker **James Patterson** (Jaret's twin brother) also had an interception for the Bulls.

After forcing a three-and-out on Charlotte's first drive of the game, Buffalo marched 61 yards in seven plays to go up 7-0 at the 9:12 mark of the first quarter. Patterson ran the ball five times for 46 yards on the drive, while Antonio Nunn caught two passes from **Kyle Vantrease** for 15 yards, including a 12-yard touchdown reception along the right sideline of the endzone.

The Bulls went up 14-0 with 3:33 left in the first half on a one-yard sneak by Vantrease. Buffalo moved the ball deliberately down the field for the score, running 15 plays (11 rushes) and taking 8:26 off the clock.

James Patterson intercepted Reynolds on the 49ers' next play from scrimmage and returned it 20 yards to the Charlotte 12, setting up the short field. The 49ers defense held strong, though, holding the Bulls to a 31-yard field goal by **Alex McNulty** that put Buffalo up 17-0 with 1:25 remaining in the half.

Jaret Patterson added to the Bulls' lead at 5:22 in the third with a sixyard touchdown run. Buffalo took over on downs to start the drive at the Charlotte 43-yard line with 9:07 on the clock, and it was a healthy dose of Patterson from there. He rushed the ball on five of the seven plays, including the score to put the Bulls up 24-0.

Charlotte got on the scoreboard with 2:20 left in the third on a 51-yard touchdown strike from Reynolds to **Victor Tucker**. Tucker caught a short crossing route and did the rest with his feet, alluding several Bulls defenders en route to the end zone. The 49ers two-point attempt came up short, keeping the score at 24-6.

On the next Buffalo drive, Charlotte forced a quick three-and-out. After taking over via punt on their own 31-yard line, the 49ers went 54 yards on 10 plays to set up a successful 32-yard field goal by **Jonathan Cruz**. That score cut the deficit to 24-9 with 10:50 to go in the game before Patterson and the Bulls put the game away with their final drive.

Nunn led the Bulls with five catches for 53 yards and a score, while Charlotte's **Tyler Ringwood** had five receptions for 64 yards.

OFFENSE

QB (tie): Brandon Doughty, WKU (2014): In a shootout that defined the Bahamas Bowl's inaugural game, Doughty threw for 350 yards (bowl record for one half) and five touchdowns -- all in the first half as the Hilltoppers built a 42-14 halftime lead. He finished 31-for-42 passing with 486 yards as the Hilltoppers held off a furious rally by Central Michigan to win 49-48. Doughty, who was the bowl's first Offensive Player of the Game, also holds bowl records for completions (31) and completion percentage (73.8).

QB (tie): Cooper Rush, Central Michigan (2014): Rush set the NCAA all-bowl record with seven touchdown passes and holds the bowl record with 493 yards on 28-of-45 passing in a losing effort to WKU. Rush also set the NCAA all-bowl record with an incredible 255 passing yards in the fourth quarter alone on 13-of-17 passing for five TDs as the Chippewas rallied from a 49-14 deficit to pull to 49-48 after an exhilarating final-play, three-lateral passing touchdown as time expired.

RB: Jamauri Bogan, Western Michigan (2015): Bogan set bowl records for most rushing yards (215), most rushing TDs (four), and most rushing yards in a half (152 in the second half) on 19 carries on the way to Offensive Player of the Game honors as the Broncos beat Middle Tennessee 45-31. Bogan gashed the Blue Raiders defense on scoring runs of 62 and 46 yards and added a 61-yard carry.

RB: Dorian Brown, Ohio (2017): Brown was selected as the bowl's Offensive Player of the Game as he tied the bowl record with four rushing TDs, including the longest TD carry in bowl history -- a 74-yard sprint. He made the most of his 12 carries for 152 yards to set the bowl mark for highest average per rush (12.7) in the Bobcats' dominant 41-6 victory over UAB.

WR: Corey Davis, Western Michigan (2015): A year after his brother, Titus, had a big performance in the Bahamas Bowl for Central Michigan, Corey set records of his own for Western Michigan against Middle Tennessee as he had a bowl-record 183 receiving yards on eight receptions (tied for most in Bahamas Bowl history), including a bowl-record 184 receiving yards in a single half and averaged 22.9 yards per reception in the 45-31 victory over Middle Tennessee. He was selected No. 5 overall by the Tennessee Titans in the 2017 NFL Draft, the highest selection of a Bahamas Bowl alumnus in the game's history.

WR: Titus Davis, Central Michigan (2014): Davis, the older brother of Corey, had a huge day in the inaugural Bahamas Bowl with six receptions for 137 yards and a NCAA all-bowlrecord-tying four TDs -- three in the fourth quarter, including a memorable 15-yard sprint to the goal line to finish off a threelateral play on the final play from scrimmage -- as the Chippewas rallied from a 35-point deficit to fall just short to WKU. He died of renal medullary carcinoma in November 2020 at age 27.

TE: Mitchell Henry, WKU (2014): Henry caught three passes for 47 yards and a second-quarter touchdown in the Hilltoppers' 49-48 victory over Central Michigan. Henry was the first undrafted player in Bahamas Bowl history to play in the NFL, as he saw action in two games with the Denver Broncos in 2015. He died of acute myeloid leukemia in June 2017 at age 24.

C: Mike Novitsky, Buffalo (2019): Novitsky anchored the Bulls' offensive line that led the way to 205 rushing yards and three TDs on 46 carries. The O-line did not give up a sack and allowed only three tackles for loss in a 31-9 victory over Charlotte.

G: Forrest Lamp, WKU (2014): Lamp was a member of the Hilltoppers' offensive line that posted a bowl-record 647 yards of total offense in the 49-48 shootout against Central Michigan. He was selected by the Los Angeles Chargers in the second round (No. 38 overall) in the 2017 NFL Draft.

G: Taylor Moton, Western Michigan (2015): Moton was part of an offensive line that racked up 613 yards of total offense against Middle Tennessee in the Broncos' 45-31 victory, second most in bowl history. He was selected by the Carolina Panthers in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft.

T: Willie Beavers, Western Michigan (2015): Beavers helped the Broncos offense set a record for the highest average yardage per play (9.0) in the 45-31 victory over Middle Tennessee. He was selected by the Minnesota Vikings in the sixth round of the 2016 NFL Draft -- the first offensive lineman in Bahamas Bowl history to be drafted.

T: Chukwuma Okorafor, Western Michigan (2015): Okorafor was a part of the Broncos' offensive line that totaled 613 yards of total offense (second in bowl history) in the 45-31 victory over Middle Tennessee. He was selected by the Pittsburgh Steelers in the third round of the 2018 NFL Draft.

DEFENSE

DE: Malcolm Koonce, Buffalo (2019): Koonce tied the bowl record with two sacks among his five total tackles and added two tackles for loss, a forced fumble and a quarterback hurry to earn the Defensive Player of the Game award in the Bulls' dominant 31-9 victory over Charlotte.

DE: Derik Overstreet, WKU (2014): Overstreet set bowl records with 2.5 tackles for loss and two sacks for minus-13 yards to go along with five total tackles for Defensive Player of the Game honors in the Hilltoppers' 49-48 victory over Central Michigan in the inaugural Bahamas Bowl.

DT: Anthony Rush, UAB (2017): Rush tied for the team lead with seven total tackles (six assisted) in the Blazers' 41-6 defeat to Ohio. The six assists is the most by a defensive tackle in the bowl's history.

DT: Leterrius Walton, Central Michigan (2014): Walton had three tackles (two solo) in the 49-48 defeat to WKU. He was selected in the sixth round of the 2015 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers, and was the first Bahamas Bowl alumnus selected and the first to play in the NFL.

LB: Grant DePalma, Western Michigan (2015): DePalma set the bowl record with 12 total tackles (five solo, seven assisted) in the Broncos' 45-31 victory over Middle Tennessee on the way to Defensive Player of the Game honors.

LB: Edwin Freeman, FIU (2018): Freeman led the Panthers with eight tackles, including five unassisted stops, in the 35-32 victory over Toledo. He was selected as the Defensive Player of the Game.

LB: TJ Ricks, Old Dominion (2016): Ricks led the Monarchs with nine tackles, including one for loss, for Defensive Player of the Game honors in the 24-20 victory over Eastern Michigan. He anchored an ODU defense that posted a bowl-record 90 total tackles and a late stand that preserved the first bowl victory in the school's history.

CB: Jamez Brickhouse, Old Dominion (2016): Brickhouse was all over the field for the Monarchs in the 24-20 victory over Eastern Michigan with 11 total tackles, including a bowl-record eight solo stops.

CB: Wonderful Terry, WKU (2018): Set the bowl record for pass breakups in the inaugural game with four, but his last one was the most important as he tipped away a two-point conversion pass in the back of the end zone on the final play of the game to preserve WKU's 49-48 victory over Central Michigan.

S: Christian Byrum, Old Dominion (2016): Byrum had 11 total tackles, the most by a safety in the bowl's history in the Monarchs' 24-20 victory over Eastern Michigan. He also set a record for assisted tackles with eight.

S: Javon Hagan, Ohio (2017): Hagan posted nine total tackles (six solo; tied for second in bowl history) and a pair of pass breakups in the Bobcats' 41-6 victory over UAB. He was selected as the bowl's Defensive Player of the Game.

SPECIAL TEAMS

P: Matt Bonadies, Middle Tennessee (2015): Bonadies averaged 44.8 yards (40.0 net yards) on five punts for the Blue Raiders, including a 52-yarder, and placed two inside the Western Michigan 20-yard line in the defeat to the the Broncos.

PK: Andrew Haldeman, Western Michigan (2015): Haldeman had a big day in the Broncos' 45-31 victory over Middle Tennessee as he made 6-of-6 extra-point kicks and added a bowl-record 47-yard field goal in the first quarter.

RET: Andre Wilson, UAB (2017): Wilson set two bowl records in his four kickoff returns against Ohio as he gained 102 yards, including a 45-yarder. He averaged 25.5 yards per return, and he returned one punt for five yards. He was also the Blazers' leading receiver with six catches for 58 yards.

COACH

P.J. Fleck, Western Michigan (2015): Fleck's Broncos squad came to the Bahamas with a 7-5 record, and pulled away for a 45-31 victory over Middle Tennessee. Fleck's unbridled enthusiastic mantra of "Row The Boat" got national attention, and the Broncos used the Bahamas Bowl success as a springboard to an undefeated regular season, a MAC title and a New Year's Six bowl berth in 2016.

Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium

The Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl is played in Nassau's state-of-the-



medal at the 1962 Central American and Caribbean Games.

Robinson won nine Big Ten Conference titles as a sprinter at the University of Michigan from 1959-61. He was inducted into Michigan's Hall of Honor in 1985 and the inaugural class of Michigan's Men's Track and Field Hall of Fame in 2006.

Discussions on the new stadium had begun some nine years before, with Robinson himself

chairing the initial and final committee on the stadium. Robinson died November 25, 2012, just two days after the celebration of his partici-

pation in the Melbourne Olympics and before he could see the facility that bears his name in use.

The facility has been the site for track (2013 Carifta Games and the 2014





The Blue Raiders, the national leader in forced turnovers (31) and defensive touchdowns (6), won four of their final six games, including a 27-17 win at Florida Atlantic in the final week of the regular season to earn bowl eligibility. Defensively, the Blue Raiders are paced by **S Reed Blankenship** ranked second in C-USA with 106 total tackles, **DE Jordan Ferguson**, who ranked second in C-USA with 15 5 tackles-for-loss and 8.0 sacks **LB DO Thomas** 15.5 tackles-for-loss and 8.0 sacks, LB DQ Thomas, who also has 15.5 tackles-for-loss and DB Quincy Riley, who is second nationally in interceptions (5)

Toledo enters play having finished 5-3 in MAC play, and the Rockets won their last three games and four of their final five contests. This will be the first-ever meeting between Middle Tennessee and Toledo. Conference USA and the MAC are tied 3-3 all-time in the Bahamas Bowl series, and this marks the second trip to Nassau for each school. One will head home to the United States with their first Bahamas Bowl victory, as Middle Tennessee fell 45-31 to West-ern Michigan in 2015, while Toledo dropped a close contest, 35-32 to FIU in the 2018 edition of the game.

Saturday kicks off with the RoofClaim.com Boca Raton Bowl at 10 a.m. CT on ESPN as the high-flying WKU Hilltoppers (8-5) take on Sun Belt foe Appalachian State (10-3) at FAU Stadium in South Florida.

WKU boasts the second-ranked scoring offense (43.1 ppg) and total offense (527.5) in the nation. The Hill-toppers are led by the top-performing quarterback in the country, **Bailey Zappe**, who is a Manning Award Finalist, was the C-USA MVP and a first-team all-conference performer. Zappe, one of four trans-fers from Houston Baptist, leads the nation in pass-ing yards (5,545), passing yards per game (426.5), and passing touchdowns (56). Zappe is just 278 yards from the FBS single-season record for passing yards (Texas Tech's B.J. Symons in 2003 - 5,833) and four passing touchdowns (LSU's Joe Burrow in 2019 - 60). **WR Jerreth Sterns**, a second-team All-Ameri- - 60). WR Jerreth Sterns, a second-team All-American (Associated Press and Football Writers Associated Press and Football Writers Association of America), and C-USA Newcomer of the Year, also leads the country in major receiving categories with 137 catches (first) for 1,718 yards (first) and 14 touchdwurg (thirth). touchdowns (third).

The Hilltoppers won seven of their last eight games after opening the season 1-4, and fell 49-41 in the 2021 Ryan Conference USA Championship Game in San Antonio to the 12-1 UTSA Roadrunners. Defen-sively, WKU is led by C-USA Defensive Player of the Year, **DE DeAngelo Malone**, who has 88 tackles, a league-leading 16.5 tackles-for-loss, 8.0 sacks and four forced fumbles. WKU also has forced 27 turn-overs, which ranks fourth in the country.

Appalachian State won six of its last seven games, with its only loss coming at No. 23 Louisiana in the Sun Belt Championship Game in Lafayette (24-16). In terms of common opponents, the Mountaineers came back to knock off Marshall 31-30 at home on Sept. 23, while WKU beat the Thundering Herd 51-23 in Huntington, West Virginia, on the road on Nov. 27.

App State also has a high-powered offense, as the Mountaineers are averaging 34.2 points per game, which ranks 23rd nationally. **QB Chase Brice** has over 3,000 yards passing with 26 total touchdowns (23 passing), while **RBs Nate Noel** (1,076 yards and four touchdowns) and **Camerun Peoples** (825 yards and 14 touchdowns). and 14 touchdowns) lead the ground attack.

PUBG MOBILE NEW MEXICO BOWL - SAT., DEC. 18 - 1:15 PM CT UTEP (7-5) is back bowling for the first time since a 2014 trip to the New Mexico Bowl. The Miners are set to take on Mountain West foe Fresno State (9-3) in Albuquerque on ESPN at 1:15 p.m. CT. UTEP com-bined for just five wins between 2017-20, so their incredible turnaround to seven under head coach Dana Dimel in 2021 was one of the brightest story-lines in all of college football this season lines in all of college football this season.

The Miners were impressive defensively, allow-ing just 24.8 points per game and 339.4 yards per game. UTEP was led by **LB Breon Howard**, who led the Miners with 97 total tackles, 6.5 tackles-for-loss, 1.5 sacks and a fumble recovery in 12 starts. **DB Dy'Vonne Inyang** was a focal point in the second-ary for UTEP, and he picked off a team-best three passes and broke up seven passes on the season. The combination of **DEs Praise Amaewhule** and **Jadrian Taylor** totaled 12.0 sacks and 17 quarter-back hurries, wreaking havoc on opposing offensive lines throughout the course of the season. Offensive USA selection, aught 67 passes for 1,330 yards with seven touchdowns, while fellow **WR Justin Garrett** hauled in 49 passes for 659 yards and four scores. Those two targets were key in the development of **QB Gavin Hardison**, who threw for 2,965 yards and 17 touchdowns and enters the bowl appear-ance ranking third nationally in yards per comple-tion (15.94). It is unclear who will be starting under center for the Bulldogs, as **QB Jake Haener** originally entered the transfer portal when DeBoer departed for Washington, but has since returned to the Central Valley following Tedford's appointment. Haener threw for 3,810 yards with 32 touchdowns and just nine intercentions in 12 appear touchdowns and just nine interceptions in 12 appearances, and if he is not the starter, the likeliest possi-bilities include a pair of freshmen in **Logan Fife** and **Jaylen Henderson**. Whoever is throwing the ball, the three-headed monster at receiver of Jalen Cropper (76 catches for 827 yards and 11 touchdowns), **Josh Kelly** (50 catches for 768 yards and three scores) and **Keric Wheatfall** (36 catches for 582 yards and four scores) will be on the receiving end. Defensively, DLs David Perales (13.0 tackles-for-loss and 7.0 sacks) and Kevin Atkins (12.5 tackles-for-loss and 7.0 sacks) have caused teams problems all season, while DB Evan Williams paces the Bulldog defense with 89 total tackles and a team-high three interceptions.

This marks the fifth-straight season that UAB has qualified for a bowl game (did not play in 2020 in the Gasparilla Bowl due to a COVID-related cancellation). This game marks the first meeting between the two programs.

UAB came up just short of its third consecutive C-USA West Division crown, falling in the final seconds at UTSA (34-31) on Nov. 20 at the Alamodome, but again had a very successful season under head

coach Bill Clark. The Blazers opened a brand-new downtown home, in Protective Stadium, where they went 3-2 and concluded the regular season with wins in three of their last four games, including a 42-25 win at home over fellow bowl-bound confer-ence mate UTEP. Defensively, the Blazers boast the second-ranked scoring defense in the conference (22.8 ppg) and 16th-ranked total defense in the FBS (323.3 ypg). **DE Alex Wright** was a handful for op-posing offensive lines, causing havoc in the back-field with a team-high 7.0 sacks, 12 quarterback hur-ries and a pair of forced fumbles. **S Grayson Cash**, and fellow **DBS Keondre Swoopes** and **Starling Thomas V** combined for seven interceptions in the secondary. Offensively, **QB Dylan Hopkins** is one of the most efficient quarterbacks in the country, rank-ing 11th (164.5) and he ranks sixth in the FBS in yards per completion (15.33). His top targets, **WR Trea Shropshire** and **TE Gerit Prince** are game-changers for the Blazers. Prince has 32 catches for 656 yards and eight touchdowns, while Shropshire leads the nation in yards per catch (27.3), with 25 catches for downtown home, in Protective Stadium, where they nation in yards per catch (27.3), with 25 catches for 682 yards and six touchdowns. **RB DeWayne Mc-Bride** ran for 1,188 yards and 12 touchdowns, while **Jermaine Brown, Jr.**, has 584 yards on the ground with seven scores.

BYU had another tremendous season under head coach Kalani Sitake, with a 5-0 record against Pac-12 opponents, including a 26-17 rivalry win over Pac-12 champion Utah in Provo. The Cougars are led by **RB Tyson Allgeier** on the ground, who has 1,409 yards rushing and an FBS-leading 20 touch-downs. **QB Jaren Hall** has been very efficient as well, therwise for 2.527 yards with 20 touch-downs to just the 20 touchthrowing for 2,583 yards with 20 touchdowns to just five interceptions, and his top-two receiving targets WRs Neil Pau'u and Puka Nacua have a combined 12 touchdown grabs. Marshall won five of its last seven under first-year head coach **Charles Huff**, and was in the mix for the East Division title until the final week of the regular season, falling to WKU at home in the finale. This marks the first-ever meeting between the two programs, and Marshall's fifth-straight bowl appear-ance. ance.

The Thundering Herd bring a potent offensive at-tack to the Big Easy, led by **RB Rasheen Ali**, who was a First-Team All-Conference USA selection by the league's head coaches. Ali ran for 1,241 yards (5.4 yards per carry) and 20 touchdowns (tied for the FBS lead), and was also a factor in the passing the FBS lead), and was also a factor in the passing game as the Herd's second-leading receiver with 45 caqtches for 337 yards and a touchdown. **QB Grant Wells**, who left the regular season finale against WKU due to injury, has completed 280-419 passes for 3,433 yards and 16 touchdowns and his top tar-get is **WR Corey Gammage**, who has 69 catches for 828 yards and two touchdowns. Defensively, the Herd are led by **LB Abraham Beauplan**, who is third in C-USA in tackles (104), with 9.5 tackles-for-loss, 2.5 sacks and a forced fumble, while fellow **LB Eli Neal** has 92 tackles with 7.0 tackles-for-loss and a team-high 5.5 sacks with an interception, two fum-ble recoveries and a forced fumble. ble recoveries and a forced fumble.

Louisiana will be without its head coach Billy Napier, who accepted the same position at Florida **pier**, who accepted the same position at Florida in late November. AERIAL ASSAULT IN C-USA

Conference USA has been the home of some of the most prolific passing attacks in the FBS throughout the 2021 season. Two C-USA quarterbacks rank in the top-15 nationally in passing yardage per game - WKU's Bailey Zappe leads the FBS (426.5) and Marshall's Grant Wells is 15th (286.1).

Additionally, three C-USA signal-callers rank inside the top-20 nationally in passing touchdowns - Zappe leads the FBS (56), Charlotte's Chris Reynolds 16th (26) and UTSA's Frank Harris is 18th (25). C-USA quarterbacks also rank 2-3-6 nationally in yards per completion - FIU's Max Bortenschlager (16.49), UTEP's Gavin Hardison (15.94), and UAB's Dylan Hopkins (15.33).

C-USA RECEIVERS LIGHTING IT UP

With all the success of the quarterbacks in C-USA,

someone has to catch those passes, and in turn. C-USA receivers are all over the national leaderboards. In terms of receiving yards per game, three of the top-25 spots belong to receivers who hail from C-USA programs - WKU's Jerreth Sterns leads the way in the league and FBS (132.2), followed by UTEP's Jacob Cowing, who is sixth (110.8) and WKU's Mitchell Tinsley (99.9) is seventh.

Sterns (14), Tinsley (12) and UTSA WR Zakhari Franklin (11), are also inside the top-10 in receiving touchdowns, ranking third, sixth and 11th respectively, while FIU **WR Tyrese Chambers** ranks 24th (9).

Big plays are seen all over the field across C-USA, as four pass-catchers rank inside the national top-12 in terms of yards per reception, while a total of seven are inside the top-25 - UAB WR Trea Shropshire leads the nation (27.28) while Chambers is second (23.87), UAB TE Gerrit Prince is seventh (20.50), Cowing is 11th (19.85), Louisiana Tech WR Bub Means is 13th (19.55), Marshall WR Willie Johnson is 14th (19.53) and FIU WR Bryce Singleton is 24th (18.38).

• A MAC-record eight programs have accepted bowl invitations for the 2021 bowl season. The eight bowl invitations tops the Conference mark of seven set in 2012 and 2015.

• This marks the sixth time in MAC history that six or more programs have received a bowl invitation (2012, 2015, 2016, 2018, 2019 and 2021) in a single season. This also marks the 13th time in MAC history to have five or more programs receive a bowl invitation (2004, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2021) in a single-season.

• The 2021 Northern Illinois University Huskies (9-4, 6-2 MAC) completed a historic "worst to first" journey to the school's sixth MAC title all-time – and fifth win in the MAC Championship game since 2011 – with a 41-23 victory over Kent State at Ford Field in Detroit.

• Northern Illinois University head football coach Thomas Hammock, who led the 2021 Huskies to the Mid-American Conference Championship and a 9-4 record, has been named a finalist for the 2021 Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award, the Football Writer's Association of America (FWAA) and Allstate Sugar Bowl.

• Bowling Green placekicker Nate Needham was named to the 2021 Football Writers Association of America's (FWAA) All-America team, presented by the Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic. He was named to the first team as a placekicker and is the only player from the Mid-American Conference to earn All-America accolades in 2021 from the FWAA.

• The Rockets will be playing in their 19th bowl game in program history and their sixth in the last eight seasons. Toledo is in the Bahamas Bowl for the second time in the last four seasons after accepting an invitation to play in 2018. The Rockts own a record of 11-7 in bowl games. Toledo has now been bowl eligible for 11 straight seasons – every year since 2010, excluding 2020 in which bowl eligibility requirements were waived due to COVID (Toledo was 4-2 in 2020).

• NIU will play in its 14th bowl game as a Division I FBS program and in its 19th bowl all-time. This year's game marks the Huskies' 11th bowl game in the last 14 seasons. The Huskies are looking to become just the second NIU team - and the first since 2011 - to win the MAC Championship Game and a bowl game in the same season.



MAC Coach of the Year Thomas Hammock, Northern Illinois 3rd Season, (NIU, 2002)

Hammock led the Huskies, the second-youngest team in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS), to the MAC West Division title and eight wins in 2021, including seven by one score or less. NIU opened the 2021 season with a 22-21 "Boneyard" win at Georgia Tech after scoring a touchdown and two-point conversion with 38 seconds to play. In all, NIU won four games by two points or less and another in overtime en route to an 8-4 record. The Huskies' third-year mentor is the fourth NIU head coach to be named MAC Coach of the Year, joining a list that includes Bill Mallory (1983), Joe Novak (2002) and Rod Carey (2013).



<u>Vern Smith Leadership Award</u> Dustin Crum, Kent State, Quarterback Graduate, Grafton, Ohio // Midview

Crum joins running back Eric Wilkerson who earned the Player of the Year honor in 1987 as the only Kent State players to win the award and took home first-team all-conference honors as well. Crum has had a stellar season in which he has thrown for 2,794 yards and 15 touchdowns against four interceptions while completing 65 percent of his passes. The quarterback has also been a threat on the ground, running for 565 yards, tops amongst quarterbacks, and 11 rushing touchdowns.



<u>Offensive Player of the Year</u> Lew Nichols III , Central Michigan, Running Back R-Freshman, Detroit, Mich. / Cass Technical

Nichols, a redshirt freshman running back from Detroit, earned the MAC Freshman of the Year Award in 2020. He leads the nation in rushing with 1,710 yards and in all-purpose yardage with 2,010 yards. Nichols is the sixth Chippewa to be named the MAC Offensive Player of the Year and the first since Dan LeFevour in 2009.



Defensive Player of the Year Ali Fayad, Western Michigan, Defensive Line Senior, Dearborn, Mich / Dearborn

Fayad leads the Conference and is seventh in the nation in sacks with 11.5. He also leads the league in tackles for loss with 15.0, good for 21st in the FBS. Overall, Fayad has 35 tackles and has recorded at least half a sack in nine of 12 games.



Freshman of the Year

Jay Ducker, Northern Illinois, Running Back Freshman, Bellevue, Neb. / Bellevue West

Ducker, who leads NIU and ranks fourth in the MAC in rushing with 889 yards on 165 carries, has five 100-yard rushing games since taking over tailback duties in the seventh game of the season. He ran for 210 yards on 33 carries versus Bowling Green on October 16 to record the first 200-yard rushing game by a Huskie since 2013 and followed that with a 183-yard game at Central Michigan. Ducker is the fourth Huskie to be named the MAC Freshman of the Year, but only the second since 1985. He is the first running back to earn the honor for NIU, following quarterbacks Pete Genatempo (1984), Marshall Taylor (1985) and Marcus Childers (2017).



<u>Special Teams Player of the Year</u> Kalil Pimpleton, Central Michigan, Wide Reciever Junior, Muskegon, Mich. / Muskegon

Pimpleton, who hails from Muskegon, leads the MAC in average punt return yardage, 20.25 yards, and returned two punts for touchdowns this season. Both of those returns for touchdowns came in a 42-30 victory at Western Michigan; one covered a CMU-record 97 yards and stands as the third-longest punt return in MAC history. It marks the third time in CMU history that a Chippewa has earned the MAC Special Teams Player of the Year Award. Antonio Brown brought home the honor to Mount Pleasant in 2008-09.

Bahamas Bowl – 12:00 p.m. ET Middle Tennessee (6-6) vs. Toledo (7-5) Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium – Nassau, Bahamas - ESPN

Middle Tennessee (Conference USA)

- Since turning FBS in 1999, the Blue Raiders are 3-4 vs the MAC
- The Bahamas Bowl will mark the 13th bowl Middle Tennessee has participated in during its football history but ninth in the FBS era. They have a 3-9 bowl record.
- The Blue Raiders had three first team selections, two on the second team, and four honorable mention picks. Safety Reed Blankenship, defensive back Quincy Riley and punt returner Jaylin Lane were the three Blue Raiders on the first unit.

Toledo (MAC)

- Toledo is 11-7 all-time in bowl games and has a streak of 12 consecutive seasons without a losing record as well as 11 straight years of being bowl eligible.
- Eleven members of the University of Toledo football team earned All-MAC honors. The 11 honorees are the most for Toledo since placing 12 players on All-MAC teams in 2016.
- For the Rockets, their six turnovers, two interceptions and four lost fumbles, are the fewest lost by any team at the FBS level.
- Toledo had both the number one scoring offense and the number one scoring defense in the MAC.

Odds and Ends

- The Bahamas Bowl is the longest-running international bowl game in college football history. It debuted in 2014.
- This is the first-ever meeting between Middle Tennessee and Toledo.

Northern Illinois (MAC)

- The MAC Champion Huskies are making their fourth trip to the Sunshine State, which includes appearances in the 2012 Orange Bowl, 2014 and 2018 Boca Raton Bowl.
- NIU will make its 19th appearance all-time in a postseason bowl, and its 14th appearance as a FBS team. The Cure Bowl appearance will be NIU's 11th bowl game in the last 14 seasons.
- The Huskies are ranked fifth nationally in rushing offense (234.2), ninth in red zone offense (.920) and 10th in time of possession (33:03).
- NIU completed a "worst to first" regular season in 2021 with an eight-game improvement in the win column, tied for the second-best improvement in FBS.

Coastal Carolina (Sun Belt)

- The Chanticleers are making their second-straight appearance in the Tailgreeter Cure Bowl. They made their postseason debut last season in a Top 25 matchup vs. Liberty.
- The prolific Coastal Carolina offense leads the nation in team passing efficiency (190.63) and third down conversion pct. (.541).
- Quarterback Grayson McCall was selected as the Sun Belt Player of the Year for the secondstraight season after totaling 2,558 yards through the air and 23 touchdowns.

Odds and Ends

- The Cure Bowl is a platform to help raise funds for cancer research. Since 2015, the bowl has raised a collective \$3.88 million.
- This is the first time the two programs are meeting on the football field.
