2022 MATCHUP: MIAMI vs. UAB

This year's match-up is the first time a school returning to the Bahamas Bowl (UAB, 2017) faces a school making its first trip to the islands (Miami). The teams have never faced one another in football. Both earned bowl eligibility in their final regular season games. Miami edged Ball State, 18-17, on a 34-yard TD pass from Avon Smith to Miles Marshall with 1:42 left in the game. UAB went on the road to defeat Louisiana Tech, 37-27, behind a school record 272 rushing yards (on just 16 carries) by DeWayne McBride.

LONG-RUNNING SHOW

The Bahamas Bowl is the longest-running FBS international bowl game in college football history as the bowl celebrates its eighth edition in 2022. The inaugural 2014 Bahamas Bowl was the first FBS bowl game played outside of the U.S. or Canada since the 1937 Bacardi Bowl in Havana, Cuba (Jan. 1, 1937), a 7-7 tie between Auburn and Villanova. The last international bowl game outside the U.S. before the Bahamas Bowl was the 2010 International Bowl in Toronto, won by South Florida 27-3 over Northern Illinois. The International Bowl was contested four times.

BAHAMAS AT 50

The nation of the Bahamas approaches a milestone year in 2023, marking the 50th anniversary of Bahamian independence. Festivities will be held throughout the islands leading up to the official independence day on July 10.

THE PRIME MINISTER'S TROPHY

The Bahamas Bowl renamed its championship trophy to the Prime Minister's Trophy in 2016, in honor of the highest elected office in the Bahamas. A new championship trophy made its debut in 2018. Designed and manufactured by Levy Recognition of Tampa, Fla. (who designed

the original trophy that was used from 2014-16), the Prime Minister's Trophy stands 30 inches tall, weighs nearly 30 pounds and features the flags of the United States and The Bahamas. The winners of the Offensive and Defensive Player of the Game awards will receive a specially designed football from Big Game USA in Dallas.

UNI-WATCH

UAB is the designated home team and will wear old gold helmets with the Blazers logo on the sides, forest green jerseys and pants. Miami, as the visitor, will wear white helmets with script "Miami" on the sides, white jerseys and white pants. Both teams will wear the flag stickers of the United States and the Bahamas on the rear of the helmets in a nod to the host country.

FROM SATURDAYS TO SUNDAYS

A total of 51 Bahamas Bowl alumni have played at least one game in the NFL, including two players who made their debuts so far this season: 49ers CB Samuel Womack (Toledo, 2021) and Eagles S Reed Blankenship (MTSU, 2021). A total of 30 Bahamas Bowl alumni have been drafted by NFL teams.

AN "UNOFFICIAL" HONOR

To celebrate the return of play-by-play announcer Steve Levy, who called the first six Bahamas Bowls, the ESPN broadcast booth will once again be named the Steve Levy Broadcast Booth for 2022. Steve is a great friend of the bowl, and in his Twitter bio (@espnSteveLevy), he refers to himself as the "unofficial, official voice of @TheBahamasBowl". So in that spirit, the bowl has extended an "unofficial' honor to him for his contributions to our game.

Levy's broadcast partners Joey Galloway and Kris Budden are both making their Bahamas Bowl debuts this week.

MEDIA INFORMATION

MEDIA CREDENTIAL DISTRIBUTION & WORKROOM: The HomeTown Lenders Bahamas Bowl Media Information Center will be located at Atlantis – Minos/Neptune (located in the Convention Center). Hours of operation are as follows:

- Monday, Dec. 12......9:00 a.m. 5:00 p.m. (Lite fare/snacks available Noon-2 p.m.)
- Tuesday, Dec. 139:00 a.m. 5:00 p.m. (Lite fare/snacks available Noon-2 p.m.)

Both press and photo credentials and other information must be picked up at the Bahamas Bowl Media Center during hours of operation.

In order to serve the media in an efficient manner, the Media Information Center is equipped with a copier. Drinks and snacks will be available. There will be workstations available and ample electrical power for computers and other electrical equipment. Internet service will be available. **Snacks & refreshments will be available each afternoon at times listed above**.

MEDIA HOSPITALITY SUITE: Media hospitality will be located at Atlantis (**Room TBD**). Drinks & snacks will be provided for credentialed media. Hours of operation are **9 p.m.-Midnight from Dec. 12-15**.

MEDIA HOTEL/TRANSPORTATION: The Atlantis Bahamas is the official media hotel of the Bahamas Bowl. All media must make their requests for rooms through the online media credentialing process. There are an extremely limited number of media rooms at the Atlantis, and beat writers who staff their team's games during the 2022 season will have priority in the Atlantis media block.

The Bahamas Bowl recommends using taxis or tour companies to travel throughout Nassau. All driving in the Bahamas is done from the left-hand side of the road.

The Bahamas Bowl will provide transportation for traveling U.S. media representatives to key events: the **Bahamas Bowl Press Conference** on **December 15** at Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium (leave for stadium at 10:45 a.m. and return to Atlantis at 2:00 p.m.) and the **2022 Bahamas Bowl** on **December 16** (leave for stadium at 8:30 a.m. and return to Atlantis 3 hours after the conclusion of the game - approximately 6:00 p.m.). **Media buses will be staged at the Atlantis (Coral Towers lobby)**. All media members must show their credentials in order to use the transportation service.

GAMEDAY MEDIA TRIBUNE/MEDIA BOOTHS/MEDIA CENTER: Entrance into the Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium Media Tribune and Media Center is by credential only for the news media and communications staff. A limited number of telephones (restricted long distance) and email/copy service will be available to the working press.

The media tribune, press booths and media center will be open to the media at 8:30 a.m. Press releases, statistics, media guides and flip cards will be available. A pregame meal will be served only to accredited media approximately one hour prior to kickoff (10:30 am) in the Media Center, located in the Southwest corner of the stadium below the media tribune. Beverages and snacks will be available throughout the game.

MEDIA INFORMATION

The Media Tribune at Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium is outside and under cover (similar to auxiliary press setups at Super Bowls and other major sporting events). Power, wireless and wired internet will be available to each individual seated in the media tribune. Booths for coaches, ESPN, radio networks and instant replay are located at the top of the Western Grandstand in the Media Booths. Seat and booth assignments will be made by the bowl.

The media workroom at Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium will remain open no more than **three hours** after the conclusion of the game. The media bus will leave the stadium heading back to Atlantis Coral Towers at **approximately 6:00 p.m.**

GAMEDAY MEDIA SERVICES: Flip cards, stats and game notes will be available prior to the start of the Bahamas Bowl in the main press areas. Complete box scores and play-by-play will distributed to the media at the end of each quarter. Coaches and student-athlete quotes will be distributed shortly after the conclusion of the press conferences.

INTERNET ACCESS: Wireless and wired access will be available to the media in Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium. The wireless access network and password will be distributed to the media on game day at the stadium. Media are encouraged to use the Ethernet cords…be sure to bring an adapter if needed.

LIVE STATISTICS: The Bahamas Bowl has contracted with StatBroadcast to provide instant stats information during the bowl to media in attendance in Nassau and back in the United States. To access the stat feed, point your browser to **bahamas.statbroadcast.com**.

PHOTOGRAPHERS/VIDEO: Bahamas Bowl photo credentials must be visible at all times. Bowl organizers will adhere to the NCAA's sideline control policy, which states that:

Sideline photographers are restricted outside the 20-yard lines in the areas designated and are reminded to stay behind the dotted restraining line around the field. No media personnel, including journalists, radio and television personnel or their equipment, shall be in the team area or coaching box.

POSTGAME INTERVIEW POLICY: Following a 10-minute cooling-off period, postgame interviews will take place in the Media Center in the Thomas A. Robinson National Stadium. Only individuals displaying proper credentials will be permitted in the interview area. The runner-up head coach and two student-athletes will go first, followed by the winning institution's head coach and two student-athletes. The game's Offensive and Defensive Players of the Game are required to attend as part of their team's student-athlete contingent. The Prime Minister's Trophy will be presented to the championship team along with awards to the offensive and defensive players of the game on field immediately following the game.

The cooling-off period for the runner-up team begins when the head coach enters the locker room immediately after the game. The winning head coach and student-athletes must proceed directly from the field to the interview room after the postgame trophy presentation unless requested for a short interview (not to exceed four minutes) by ESPN. Both teams' locker rooms are closed to the media.

Regardless of any personal regular-season radio or television contracts, the coach is first obligated to the entire media staffing the Bahamas Bowl and must report to the interview room immediately after the 10-minute cooling off period. The coach cannot delay a postgame interview with the covering media to conduct a program for a single radio, newspaper, or television reporter unless requested to grant a short interview (not to exceed four minutes) by ESPN.

Nassau & Paradise Island

With the lure of a big city and the ease of a tropical utopia, Nassau & Paradise Island are considered by many as, well, paradise. Nassau, the capital of The Bahamas, is a bustling metropolitan hub full of culture and modern amenities. To the north lies Paradise Island. Its name tells you everything. It's 685 acres of pure euphoria, developed almost exclusively to delight and accommodate visitors. The island boasts resorts, hotels, restaurants, shops, nightlife, a golf course, aquarium and a casino.

Nassau, the capital city of The Bahamas, is located on 21-mile-long New Providence, the Bahamas' 11th-largest island. Nassau's main harbor is protected by Paradise Island. The harbor attracted settlers in the early days, particularly pirates. In fact, Nassau's population consisted mainly of pirates until 1718, when The Bahamas first Royal Governor, Woodes Rogers expelled them, restored order and built Fort Nassau. The Bahamas for centuries adopted Rogers' motto, "Expulsis Piratis, Restituta Commercia," which means, "Pirates Expelled, Commerce Restored." Now, 246,000 people call New Providence Island home, with a large portion of them residing in Nassau.

Junkanoo, a Bahamian national festival, is a kaleidoscope of colors and sound. The rhythmic sounds of cowbells, goat skin drums and whistles, accompanied by an array of brass instruments, create a sweet musical beat that will move you; while brilliantly colored costumes capture your eye, and bring much visual delight. This bi-annual cultural highlight takes place on Bay Street in New Providence and other Family Islands during the early morning hours, from 1-9 am on Boxing Day (the day after Christmas) and New Year's Morning.



HELPFUL HINTS FOR THE MEDIA

PASSPORTS: The Bahamas Bowl reminds all media that all U.S. citizens coming to the Bowl must have a valid United States Passport for the time of travel. It is possible to secure passports on short notice, but costs will be much higher for the individuals involved and delays in receiving passports are possible during the holiday season. For information on how to obtain a U.S. Passport, visit **passports. state.gov**. For obtaining an expedited passport in a hurry, visit **travel.state.gov/content/travel/en/passports/apply-renew-passport/hurry.html**.

REQUIRED BAHAMAS TRAVEL HEALTH VISA: ALL visitors must obtain a Bahamas Travel Health Visa prior to traveling to the Bahamas. For more information on current Bahamas COVID-19 protocols and the Bahamas Travel Health Visa, please visit **travel.gov.bs**.

COVID-19 TEST BEFORE RETURNING TO U.S.: You will need to get a COVID-19 viral test (regardless of vaccination status or citizenship) **no more than 1 day** before you travel by air into the United States. You must show your negative result to the airline before you board your flight.

UNITED STATES EMBASSY: The United States Embassy in the Bahamas is located at **42 Queen Street** in Nassau. The American Citizen Services Unit stands ready to help American citizens in The Bahamas – and their loved ones – in emergency situations. American citizens overseas, of course, remain subject to the laws of the country they are in. The American Citizens Services Unit can assist in areas, including: illness/injury, lost/stolen U.S. Passport, arrest/detention, victims of crime, etc.

In case of emergencies involving the death, injury, welfare, or arrest of an American citizen in The Bahamas, please call **242-322-1181**, ext. 1 during business hours (8 a.m.-5 p.m., Monday-Thursday; 8 a.m.-3:30 p.m., Friday), or **242-322-1181**, ext 43111 at all other times. (Please note that the Duty Officer who answers this number will not be able to assist with visa or routine passport matters.) The U.S. Embassy website is **bs.usembassy.gov**.

CELL PHONES/INTERNET: The Bahamas Bowl staff reminds media that cell phone roaming rates for voice and data usage in the Bahamas can be extremely high per minute. All participants should check with their cell-phone service provider for pertinent information on current international/roaming rates. Phones can be used in "Airplane Mode" in the Bahamas (no data usage) in order to use phone cameras, etc. Atlantis Bahamas has WiFi in rooms (free)/some public areas (daily fee if not staying at Atlantis). Calling cards for public phones located in the resort can be purchased at the Atlantis. You can also use apps like Facebook Messenger, WhatsApp, etc. while using WiFi.

CURRENCY: The legal tender is the Bahamian dollar, which is equivalent to the U.S. dollar. U.S. currency is accepted throughout the Bahamas, as are most major credit cards and traveler's checks. ATMs are located at both Paradise Island and Cable Beach casinos, Rawson Square, major banks and in most hotels.

ELECTRICITY: With standard North American 120-volt/60-cycle AC electrical current, you will be able to operate American laptops, electronics, hairdryers, shavers and other small electrical appliances without adapters.

GETTING AROUND: From the Lynden Pindling International Airport, taxi rates are approximately \$32 to downtown Nassau, \$22 to Cable Beach and \$38 to Paradise Island (plus the \$2 bridge toll to PI) - based on two passengers (extra bags/passengers will cost more). Taxi service is available from the Atlantis to take you into Nassau to visit tourist areas, restaurants, etc. Shared van rides into downtown Nassau from the Atlantis run \$5 per person (you will be dropped off in downtown Nassau near the Government House), while solo taxi rides run \$13 to downtown with higher rates outside the downtown zone. Unshared rides from downtown Nassau back to the Atlantis are \$13 per person (not including the \$2 bridge toll for taxis to get back to Paradise Island).

Ferry boats (water taxis) can take you between Nassau and Paradise Island while at the same time giving you a waterfront view of Nassau Harbour. Tickets can be purchased at the tour desk at Festival Place and at Woodes Rogers Wharf right next door. Tickets cost \$6 per person (plus a suggested \$1 tip for the storyteller who usually accompanies the ride) and the trip is approximately 10 minutes each way. Ferries leave every half hour on the hour from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

City buses, known locally as "jitneys", run in downtown Nassau and Cable Beach several times a day. The cost for a one-way ride is \$1.50 per person, and exact change is required. Pay as you exit the bus.

TIPPING: Restaurants and hotels **automatically add 15%** to all food and beverage checks in lieu of gratuity. For exceptional service you may wish to leave something extra. Bellboys, doormen and porters usually receive \$3 per bag. Taxi drivers should be tipped about 15% of the fare.

CUSTOMS: U.S. citizens out of the country for 48 hours are allowed up to \$800 worth of duty-free merchandise. Less than 48 hours, the duty-free exemption is \$200. Limitations include 32 ounces of tobacco for those over 21 and no more than two liters of alcohol. To make traveling easier, consider packing things you're going to declare separately and keep all your sales receipts.

MEDICAL FACILITIES: Internationally trained doctors are available at the hotels and throughout the Nassau Paradise Island. Two hospitals are fully equipped to respond to emergency medical situations. Princess Margaret Hospital (public) and Doctor's Hospital (private) are both located in Nassau.

DRIVING DIRECTIONS

Driving Directions From Lynden Pindling International Airport to the Atlantis Bahamas (11.8 miles):

Go north on US Departures Rd. (0.2 miles), at the roundabout, take first exit onto Windsor Field Rd. (0.4 miles), go through one roundabout (0.4 miles) and stay on Windsor Field Rd., at the next roundabout (0.7 miles), take the first exit to John F. Kennedy Drive and go through two roundabouts, at the third roundabout (4.3 miles), take the first exit onto Prospect Ridge Rd., at the next roundabout (0.8 miles), take the first exit onto West Bay St., continue on West Bay St. (1.9 miles), at the next roundabout, continue on West Bay St. (1.1 miles), turn left onto Marlborough St. (0.1 miles), road becomes Navy Lion Rd. (213 feet), turn right onto Bay St. (1.2 miles), turn left and cross the Sir Sidney Poitier Bridge (0.5 miles), take first right onto Paradise Beach Rd., at the roundabout (0.1 miles), take the first exit and continue (0.2 miles), Atlantis Resort will be on the left.

2014 POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL: WKU 49, CENTRAL MICHIGAN 48 (DECEMBER 24, 2014)

WKU survived a furious Central Michigan fourth-quarter comeback, which included a 75-yard last-gasp relay play for a touchdown as time expired, but a broken-up 2-point conversion attempt following the improbable TD gave the Hilltoppers a 49-48 victory and the inaugural Popeyes Bahamas Bowl title.

The four-person relay by the Chippewas was an immediate hit on ESPN and social media. The final TD was named the play of the bowl season by ESPN's SportsCenter and was a finalist for a Best Play ESPY.

WKU (8-6) finally put an end to Central Michigan's 34-point fourth quarter with a defensive stop in the back corner of the end zone.

Trailing 49-42 with one second remaining, the Central Michigan offense lined up for one final prayer from its 25 that was answered.

Quarterback **Cooper Rush** heaved one last gasp pass 47 yards down the field where it was caught by **Jesse Kroll** at the Hilltoppers 28. Then chaos ensued. After laterals from Kroll, **Deon Butler** and **Courtney Williams, Titus Davis** raced 15 yards, dove and grazed the pylon – launching the crowd into pandemonium.

With the WKU lead trimmed to an unimaginably thin 49-48, the Chippewas (7-6) threw caution to the wind and tried for a 2-point conversion in hopes of winning the game. Rush threw for Kroll, but WKU defensive back **Wonderful Terry** broke up the fade-route pass to give WKU its first FBS bowl victory in school history under first-year head coach Jeff Brohm.

CMU head coach **Dan Enos** discussed the decision to go for two and the victory. "We didn't want to go to overtime because we had had trouble stopping them all day," explained Enos. "I looked at the players and said, 'What do you got?' and they said, 'Let's do it. Let's win this game.'"

Popeyes Bahamas Bowl Player of the Game honors went to WKU's **Brandon Doughty** (offense) and WKU defensive end **Derik Overstreet** (defense). Doughty threw for 486 yards, 350 in the first half with five touchdowns, all to different receivers. Overstreet recorded five tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss that included two second-half sacks.

Before the nightmarish fourth quarter, the Hilltoppers played as crisp and dominant a game as they had all season long.

Doughty threw five touchdown passes in the first half to Jared Dangerfield, Joel German, Antwane Grant, Mitchell Henry and Willie McNeal to go with a rushing TD from Leon Allen as WKU scored on each of their six first-half possessions against the MAC's top defense for a 42-14 halftime lead. Rush also threw for a pair of scores to Davis and Williams in the half.

That Hilltopper advantage was extended to 49-14 after Allen scored on a 21-yard run midway through the third quarter.

The fourth quarter was a different story, as Rush connected with Davis for touchdowns twice to cut WKU's lead to 49-28. Then defensive end **Joe Ostman** flipped a 52-yard completion to WKU's McNeal inside out by forcing a fumble at the Central Michigan 13, which was recovered by Chippewas corner **Tony Annese**. Annese returned the fumble back to the CMU 36, and from there, Central Michigan marched down the field to score on a Rush TD pass to Williams to trail by 14.

WKU was forced to punt on their ensuing possession, and a four-play, 55-second drive capped by a 7-yard TD strike from Rush to **Anthony Garland** with 1:09 left gave Central Michigan hope.

WKU successfully recovered the CMU onside kick after the score and milked the clock before being forced to punt, which set up the final frenzied play for the Chippewas that left the stadium breathless and WKU in possession of the inaugural Popeyes Bahamas Bowl trophy.

Rush set FBS bowl records for touchdown passes with seven and most net passing yards with 255 in the fourth quarter alone. The combined 971 passing yards and 12 TD passes for Doughty and Rush also broke FBS two-team bowl records.

2015 POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL: WESTERN MICHIGAN 45, MIDDLE TENNESSEE 31 (DECEMBER 24, 2015)

Jamauri Bogan rushed 19 times for a career-high 215 yards and four touchdowns to power Western Michigan to a 45-31 victory over Middle Tennessee in the 2015 Popeyes Bahamas Bowl.

It was one big play after another in the contest, as the two teams combined for 1,055 yards of total offense and seven scoring plays of 29 or more yards.

But it was a pair of 1-yard plunges just 1:12 apart in the fourth quarter by the redshirt freshman Bogan that made the difference.

After his 61-yard run set Western Michigan (8-5) up in the red zone, Bogan banged in from a yard out with 6:12 left in the game to give the Broncos a 38-31 advantage.

Three plays later, safety **Rontavious Atkins** intercepted MTSU quarterback **Brent Stockstill** and returned the ball 29 yards to the 4-yard line. It took two runs for Bogan to find the end zone, gaining three yards on first down before finding paydirt on second down with 5:00 left to play.

The Bronco defense held on downs on Middle Tennessee's ensuing possession and the WMU offense ran out the clock to seal the victory.

"This is what 'Row the Boat' is all about," WMU head coach **P.J. Fleck** said. "This is why it was invented. This is what it's for. There was all types of adversity in that football game that our kids could have given up, could have folded. Two years ago, we probably would have. Last year, we would have done it some of the time. This year, no way."

Bogan was named the Offensive Player of the Game of the game for his efforts, while WMU linebacker **Grant DePalma** was named the game's Defensive Player of the Game. DePalma led all tacklers with 12 stops (five solo) and a tackle for loss.

WMU quarterback **Zach Terrell** was 18-of-26 passing for 297 yards and a pair of touchdowns. **Corey Davis** caught eight balls for 183 yards and a TD.

Stockstill had a solid day for Middle Tennessee (7-6), completing 26-of-39 passes for 327 yards and three scores to lead the Blue Raider offens. His top target was **James Richie**, who caught eight passes for 126 yards and two scores and ran twice for 61 yards and a third touchdown.

The two teams combined for 475 yards of total offense and 34 points in the first quarter.

It took MTSU only 1:17 to get on the board when James scored the first of his three touchdowns on a 46-yard run to quickly make it 7-0.

Bogan answered just three plays later, running up the middle for 62 yards and a TD, and it was 7-7 with only 2:17 gone in the contest.

Stockstill hit James on a 44-yard scoring pass just 1:39 later to put Middle Tennessee back on top 14-7.

Andrew Haldeman drilled a 47-yard field goal with 3:23 left in the first quarter to pull Western Michigan within 14-10.

Cody Clark kicked a 23-yard field goal on the Blue Raiders' next possession to extend the lead to 17-10 with 1:04 left in the quarter.

The Broncos quickly tied the game at 17-all when Terrell hit Davis on an 80-yard pass and run with three seconds left in the opening quarter. Davis caught the ball on a 5-yard hitch pattern, broke a tackle and raced the remaining 75 yards down the sideline for the score.

WMU struck quickly in the second half on another 46-yard run by Bogan to go up 24-17 with 2:57 gone.

After a short punt set MTSU up at the Western Michigan 32-yard line, it took just two plays for the Blue Raiders to tie the game. Stockstill hit **Christian Collis** on a 17-yard pass with 28 seconds left in the third quarter to tie the game at 24-24.

Terrell hit **Daniel Braverman** on a 68-yard scoring pass to put WMU back on top 31-24 with 12:47 to play in the game.

Again, MTSU answered when Stockstill hit James on a 29-yard pass with 9:41 left in the game to tie it at 31-31.

Western Michigan finished the day with an impressive 613 yards of total offense, and the Broncos, second in FBS in time of possession, held the ball for nearly 35 minutes.

2016 POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL: OLD DOMINION 24, EASTERN MICHIGAN 20 (DECEMBER 23, 2016)

Old Dominion, making the school's first bowl appearance since the football program restarted in 2009, held off Eastern Michigan 24-20 to win the 2016 Popeyes Bahamas Bowl.

"I just want to say how excited we are to win the game, but number two how grateful we are for how we were treated this week by everybody associated with the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl – all the wonderful people we met," ODU head coach **Bobby Wilder** said. "This was a life-changing experience. We made memories to last a lifetime, and to win the game makes it that much more special."

Led by Offensive Player of the Game running back **Ray Lawry** and his 133 rushing yards, the Monarchs (10-3) left the Bahamas with a six-game win streak and their first bowl trophy. Quarterback **David Washington** added 188 passing yards and three touchdowns for ODU.

"He's really good, obviously tough to tackle," EMU head coach **Chris Creighton** said of Lawry. "We've become a pretty good tackling team, and I think today, he had a lot to do with several missed tackles. Their running game obviously didn't trip today."

Eastern Michigan quarterback **Brogan Roback** did all he could to keep the Eagles (7-6) in the game, throwing for 300 yards and two second-half touchdowns, but it was not enough to help EMU to a title in their first bowl game in 29 years.

Eastern Michigan dominated the time of possession, holding the ball 32:30 to the Monarchs' 27:30, and converted on a season-high 13 third-downs, but it was the Old Dominion defense that made one final stand late in the fourth quarter.

ODU senior linebacker **TJ Ricks** was named Defensive Player of the Game after finishing with nine tackles, including one for a loss.

"The defense ... we just came to the sideline and talked to each other and just told each other to trust each other," Ricks said of the entire ODU defensive performance. "You're our 1/11th on the field. If one guy does his job, and everybody else does their job, we'll be good on defense."

Through the first 30 minutes, Old Dominion was the only team able to put points on the board, holding a 10-0 lead at the half.

ODU scored first when **Brad Davis** connected on a 34-yard field goal for a 3-0 lead with 7:43 remaining in the first quarter. The 16-play, 58-yard drive appeared to stall at midfield when the Monarchs faced a fourth-and-two situation. Wilder dialed up a fake punt, calling a direct snap to running back **Jeremy Cox**, who drove the ball three yards for the first down.

Old Dominion extended its lead to 10-0 behind a 47-yard touchdown pass from Washington to **Zach Pascal**. The six-play, 80-yard drive began with **Anthony Wilson** picking off Roback in the end zone for a touchback, and the drive took just 2:23.

After receiving the kickoff to start the second half, Roback put the Eagles on the board, driving his team 76 yards in 2:50, capped off by a five-yard strike to wide receiver **Sergio Bailey** to cut the Old Dominion lead to 10-7.

It didn't take long for the Monarchs to respond, as Washington found **Travis Fulgham** downfield for a 31-yard touchdown with no defender in sight to push the ODU lead to 17-7 with 9:50 remaining in the third quarter.

Roback hit **Johnnie Niupalau** for a five-yard touchdown pass, capitalizing on another quick drive to pull to 17-14 with 7:25 left in the third quarter.

A 24-yard field goal by Eastern Michigan's **Paul Fricano** with 12 seconds remaining in the third tied the game at 17-17.

Opening the fourth quarter, Washington drove Old Dominion 72 yards in 2:09 to put the Monarchs back on top 24-17 after hitting **Jonathan Duhart** on a five-yard TD pass in the corner of the end zone – his third passing touchdown of the game.

Fricano connected on a 19-yard field goal with 9:08 to play to cut the Monarchs lead to 24-20.

The Eagles had a chance late, driving the ball to midfield, but couldn't keep their drive going, punting the ball back to Old Dominion. ODU ran out the final 5:21 to secure the victory.

Linebacker Kyle Rachwal led the Eagles defense with eight tackles.

2017 BAHAMAS BOWL: OHIO 41, UAB 6 (DECEMBER 22, 2017)

Dorian Brown tied a Bahamas Bowl record with four touchdown runs to lead Ohio to a 41-6 victory over UAB in the 2017 Bahamas Bowl.

The Bobcats (9-4) posted their first bowl game win since 2012 and the third bowl game win in the history of the Ohio program.

The Blazers, who reinstated their football program this year after a two-year hiatus, finished with an 8-5 record.

Ohio swept the postgame awards as Brown was named the Offensive Player of the Game and safety **Javon Hagan** was named the Defensive Player of the Game.

Brown scored on runs of 74, 9, 25 and 14 yards and ended the day with 152 yards rushing on just 12 carries. Hagan had a game-high nine tackles (six solo) and a forced fumble to lead the stout Ohio defense.

"It was a great win," Ohio head coach **Frank Solich** said. "We certainly appreciate all this team has been about – the way they've gone through the season, the way they started to prepare for the Bahamas Bowl at home and then continue the preparation here. To end up playing a very, very good football game, I couldn't be any more pleased. I feel like eight wins were not enough with this football team, so this ninth win puts a little icing on the cake."

The Bobcats scored on their opening possession, marching 75 yards in 11 plays. **Nathan Rourke** hit **D.L. Knock** on a 2-yard touchdown pass with 6:41 gone in the contest.

Rourke then hit **Papi White** on a 56-yard TD strike on Ohio's second possession with 3:40 left in the first quarter. White led all receivers in the contest with four catches for 106 yards and a score. Ohio missed the PAT as the Bobcats led 13-0.

Ohio made it 20-0 when Brown raced 74 yards for his first touchdown of the day with 12:26 left in the first half.

UAB got on the board with a 34-yard field goal by **Nick Vogel** to pull within 20-3 at the 7:28 mark of the second quarter.

Brown got his second touchdown of the game on an 9-yard run with 1:17 left in the first half. **Louie Zervos** made the PAT, and Ohio's lead was 27-3 at intermission

UAB took the second-half kickoff, marched 83 yards in 11 plays and converted on a 25-yard field goal by Vogel to pull within 27-6 with 10:46 left in the third quarter.

After a 34-yard punt return by **Kylan Nelson** gave OU the ball at the UAB 25, Brown raced in on the next play to make it 34-6 with 7:45 to play in the third period.

Brown's fourth and final score of the day was a 14-yard scamper with 4:05 left in the third to wrap up the scoring.

"I missed two games last time we played," Brown said. "It actually motivated me. I give a lot of props to the O-line as well, because they did a tremendous job blocking and making it easy for me to run the ball."

A.J. Erdely completed 24-of-45 passes for 254 yards for the Blazers. Rourke finished the day 12-of-18 passing for 185 yards and two touchdowns and ran three times for 30 yards to finish with 215 yards of total offense.

Ohio's **A.J. Ouellette** ran eight times for 26 yards, which put him over the 1,000-yard mark for the season at 1,006 yards in 13 games.

Ohio out-gained UAB 459-353 in total offense as the Bobcats evened the Bahamas Bowl series at 2-2 between the Mid-American Conference and Conference USA.

"This was not our day today," UAB head coach **Bill Clark** said. "But this won't take anything away from what this group has done. It was a historic year, our group has set the bar very high for the next UAB teams to come."

Defensively for UAB, **Anthony Rush** and **Tevin Crews** had a team-high seven tackles each.

"Being from Florida, it felt good to get the heat again because it's so cold in Ohio," Hagan said. "The food was fantastic. This bowl is just a great experience. It's definitely one of the best bowls I've experienced so far. The atmosphere, the water, the beach, the slides, it was just so fun. I felt like a little kid again."

2018 MAKERS WANTED BAHAMAS BOWL: FIU 35, TOLEDO 32 (DECEMBER 21, 2018)

FIU erased a 10-0 first-quarter deficit by halftime, and the Panthers held on for a 35-32 victory over Toledo in the 2018 Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl.

The bowl game was played in a strong tropical breeze between 15-20 MPH and near-perfect field conditions at kickoff after early-morning storms blew over New Providence Island several hours before game time.

FIU quarterback **Christian Alexander** was named the Offensive Player of the Game, going 17-for-26 through the air for 209 yards and a touchdown. He also added 87 yards on 10 carries, which set the bowl's record for a quarterback.

Panther running back **Anthony Jones** carried the ball 15 times for 92 yards and three touchdowns to lead FIU in rushing. The Panthers had a 236-124 advantage in rushing yards.

FIU linebacker **Edwin Freeman** was selected as the Defensive Player of the Game as he led the Panthers with eight tackles, including five unassisted stops.

FIU (9-4) closed the season with a school-record nine victories.

"It's spectacular to have won this game. These kids, the things that our entire football team has done for the last 10 or 11 months have been amazing," said FIU head coach **Butch Davis**. "The hard work, the dedication, the unselfishness – you don't win nine football games and set a school record for the most victories or win a bowl game without an awful lot of great plays."

The Toledo (7-6) scoring offense also flexed its muscles at times, led by quarterback **Eli Peters**, who threw for 264 yards and three touchdowns and was the Rockets' rushing leader with five carries for 43 yards. **Jon'Vea Johnson** caught two of the touchdown tosses, while **Diontae Johnson** had six receptions for 98 yards and a score.

Toledo stole the momentum right away when **Terrance Taylor** forced a fumble on the opening kickoff that was recovered and returned to the FIU 3 by **DeDarallo Blue**. Two plays later, **Bryant Koback** powered three yards for a touchdown to give the Rockets a 7-0 lead just 23 seconds into the game – the fastest touchdown in the bowl's history.

The Rockets extended their lead to 10-0 on a 28-yard field goal by **Jameson Vest** with 12 seconds left in the first quarter.

The second quarter belonged to FIU, as the Panthers took a 14-10 lead into halftime, thanks to a pair of lengthy touchdown drives. The Panthers got on the board on an eight-play, 75-yard drive capped off by a six-yard run by Jones to cut Toledo's lead to 10-7 with 12:44 left in the half.

Alexander then connected on a 36-yard touchdown pass to **Sterling Palmer** to complete a seven-play, 96-yard scoring drive, the longest scoring drive by yards in the bowl's history.

The Rockets marched down the field on their first possession of the third quarter and scored on a Peters seven-yard touchdown pass to Jon'Vea Johnson for Toledo's final lead of the game at 17-14.

Jones scored his second touchdown of the day on a 30-yard sprint with 3:47 left in the third quarter to put FIU up for good at 21-17.

The fourth quarter saw plenty of scoring as FIU worked to hold off a Toledo comeback. **Maurice Alexander** extended the Panthers' lead to 28-17 with 11:12 remaining in the game on a 16-yard TD run.

Toledo made it interesting midway through the final quarter by closing the gap to 28-25 with 7:21 to go. Peters connected with Diontae Johnson for a two-yard touchdown and then followed it up with a 2-point conversion on a pass to **Cody Thompson**.

The Panthers iced the game with a drive that took 6:40 off the clock. Jones' third TD run of the game, an 18-yard scamper with 41 seconds to play, pushed the FIU advantage to 35-25.

Peters hit Jon'Vea Johnson for a 43-yard TD pass with two seconds left for Toledo to cut the margin to 35-32, but the Panthers recovered the ensuing onside kick to seal the victory, and FIU raised the Prime Minister's Trophy as a bowl champion for the first time since 2010.

Maurice Alexander led the Panthers with five catches for 30 yards, while **Tony Gaiter IV** had four catches for 52 yards.

Linebacker **Richard Olekanma** and defensive end **Tuzar Skipper** each had eight total tackles to lead Toledo.

2019 MAKERS WANTED BAHAMAS BOWL: BUFFALO 31, CHARLOTTE 9 (DECEMBER 20, 2019)

Buffalo running back **Jaret Patterson** rushed a bowl-record 32 times for 173 yards and two touchdowns to help secure the program's first-ever bowl victory, as the Bulls defeated Charlotte 31-9 in the 2019 Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl.

Patterson was selected as the Offensive Player of the Game and punctuated the victory with his second touchdown run with 1:43 left in the contest. The Bulls' final drive went for 16 plays and spanned 9:07. Patterson accounted for 81 rushing yards on 13 attempts during the drive, as he was handed the ball on the first nine plays of the possession to ice the game.

Buffalo defensive end **Malcolm Koonce** was awarded Defensive Player of the Game honors thanks to his five tackles, two sacks and one forced fumble. Koonce's strip sack of Charlotte quarterback **Chris Reynolds** was recovered by the Bulls' **Ledarius Mack** with six seconds remaining in the second quarter and helped the Bulls preserve a 17-0 lead heading into halftime.

"I'm really proud of our guys, especially after a layoff, to play as well as we did, as physical as we did," said Buffalo head coach **Lance Leipold**. "We were able to establish the running game. Our defense, especially in the first half, played outstanding. We got some key fourth down stops, created a couple turnovers. It's a team effort, but these three gentlemen sitting next to me (Patterson, Koonce, James Patterson) had great days and great seasons."

Buffalo (8-5) finished the season with three straight victories and five victories in the Bulls' final six games. Charlotte (7-6) fell in the 49ers' first bowl appearance in school history.

Aside from Patterson's performance on the ground, both defenses turned in solid performances. Buffalo held a slight 282-278 advantage in total offense. The combined 560 yards were the fewest in Makers Wanted Bahamas Bowl history, which was a distinction previously held by the 2017 game between Ohio and UAB (812 combined yards).

Charlotte defensive end **Markees Watts** led all players with 11 tackles, while safety **Marquavis Gibbs** tallied an interception for the 49ers. Buffalo linebacker **James Patterson** (Jaret's twin brother) also had an interception for the Bulls.

After forcing a three-and-out on Charlotte's first drive of the game, Buffalo marched 61 yards in seven plays to go up 7-0 at the 9:12 mark of the first quarter. Patterson ran the ball five times for 46 yards on the drive, while Antonio Nunn caught two passes from **Kyle Vantrease** for 15 yards, including a 12-yard touchdown reception along the right sideline of the endzone.

The Bulls went up 14-0 with 3:33 left in the first half on a one-yard sneak by Vantrease. Buffalo moved the ball deliberately down the field for the score, running 15 plays (11 rushes) and taking 8:26 off the clock.

James Patterson intercepted Reynolds on the 49ers' next play from scrimmage and returned it 20 yards to the Charlotte 12, setting up the short field. The 49ers defense held strong, though, holding the Bulls to a 31-yard field goal by **Alex McNulty** that put Buffalo up 17-0 with 1:25 remaining in the half.

Jaret Patterson added to the Bulls' lead at 5:22 in the third with a six-yard touchdown run. Buffalo took over on downs to start the drive at the Charlotte 43-yard line with 9:07 on the clock, and it was a healthy dose of Patterson from there. He rushed the ball on five of the seven plays, including the score to put the Bulls up 24-0.

Charlotte got on the scoreboard with 2:20 left in the third on a 51-yard touchdown strike from Reynolds to **Victor Tucker**. Tucker caught a short crossing route and did the rest with his feet, alluding several Bulls defenders en route to the end zone. The 49ers two-point attempt came up short, keeping the score at 24-6.

On the next Buffalo drive, Charlotte forced a quick three-and-out. After taking over via punt on their own 31-yard line, the 49ers went 54 yards on 10 plays to set up a successful 32-yard field goal by **Jonathan Cruz**. That score cut the deficit to 24-9 with 10:50 to go in the game before Patterson and the Bulls put the game away with their final drive.

Nunn led the Bulls with five catches for 53 yards and a score, while Charlotte's **Tyler Ringwood** had five receptions for 64 yards.

2021 BAHAMAS BOWL: MIDDLE TENNESSEE 31, TOLEDO 24 (DECEMBER 17, 2021)

Freshman quarterback **Nicholas Vattiato** completed 23 of 35 passes for 270 yards and two scores to lead Middle Tennessee past Toledo 31-24 in the 2021 Bahamas Bowl.

Trailing 17-14 after three quarters, the Blue Raiders (7-6) scored 17 consecutive points in the fourth quarter to rally for a 31-17 lead.

Vattiato earned the Offensive Player of the Game award for the victors, while Middle Tennessee senior linebacker **DQ Thomas** won Defensive Player of the Game honors. Thomas finished the game with a team-high eight tackles (three solo), 1.5 tackles for loss and a pass breakup.

The victory evened the Blue Raiders' Bahamas Bowl record at 1-1. Middle Tennessee lost in their first trip to Nassau in 2015 against Western Michigan.

"I'm really proud of our team," Middle Tennessee head coach **Rick Stockstill** said. "The toughness, the guts, the competitiveness, the resilience, the mental toughness they showed today, was fun to watch. I told them at halftime that I believed in them, and I believed they were made of the right stuff. We had some opportunities that got away from us in the first half, and the score could have been a little bit different. I'm really proud of this team because that was a heck of a fight, and the defense, man, made stop after stop"

The Rockets (7-6) fell to 0-2 in their Bahamas Bowl history. The Rockets lost to FIU in the 2018 game.

Toledo was led by quarterback **Dequan Finn**, who completed 18 of 39 passes for 212 yards and two touchdowns and ran 12 times for 83 yards and a third score, and **Bryant Koback**, who ran 18 times for 126 yards.

Middle Tennessee got on the board first on a 6-yard TD pass from Vattiato to **Yusuf Ali** to make it 7-0 with 1:30 left in the first quarter. It was one of a game-high nine receptions for Ali in the game.

Toledo evened the score at 7-7 when Finn kept the ball for a 40-yard touchdown run on a fourth-and-1 play with 1:08 gone in the second quarter.

After a Blue Raider punt, Finn connected with **Matt Landers** on a Bahamas Bowl-record 90-yard touchdown pass to make it 14-7 with 11:11 left in the half. Landers finished with four receptions for a game-high 137 yards and a TD for the Rockets.

Middle Tennessee tied the game at 14-all with 8:58 to go in the half when **Frank Peasant** scored from a yard out.

A 32-yard field goal by **Thomas Cluckey** with 1:05 left in the half gave Toledo a 17-14 lead at intermission.

After a scoreless third quarter, backup quarterback **Mike DiLiello** scampered up the middle for a 17-yard touchdown run on the first play of the fourth quarter to give Middle Tennessee a 21-17 advantage.

Vattiato extended the Blue Raiders lead to 28-17 when he connected with Jarrin Pierce on a 59-yard touchdown strike with 6:24 left in the game. It was one of four receptions for 114 yards for Pierce.

An interception by defensive tackle **Zaylin Wood** set up a 35-yard field goal by **Zeke Rankin** to push the Blue Raiders lead to 31-17 with 4:34 left.

The Rockets marched 83 yards in 15 plays to pull within 31-24 on a 13-yard pass from Finn to **DeMeer Blankumsee** with 1:08 to go.

Ali recovered the ensuing onside kick, and Middle Tennessee was able to run out the clock.

"I'm just so happy for our seniors," Stockstill said. "They're going out as champions and winners. When you go to a bowl game, that's the objective: stay on the field and hold that trophy up."

Toledo held a slight 447-435 advantage in total offense over Middle Tennessee, but the Blue Raiders held the ball for 33:44.

Toledo led 235-159 in rushing yardage. It was the first time in Bahamas Bowl history that the team that rushed for more yards did not win the contest.

Peasant led Middle Tennessee in rushing with 64 yards on 15 carries with a touchdown.

Toledo linebacker **Dyontae Johnson** led the Rockets in tackles with 10 total (five solo).
